RECIPE OF THE WEEK

By Mary Lee Taylor

Nut Caramels

1 cup Fat 1/4 teaspoon salt
Evaporated Milk 1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup butter or 1 cup coarsely
margarine broken, unshredded
1 cup sugar nuts
1 cup corn syrup

Heat milk and butter until butter melts. Mix sugar, syrup and salt in a 2-qt. saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat. Then cook to firm ball stage (see note) stirring often. Stir in milk mixture gradually so that sugar mixture does not stop boiling. Cook and stir until candy reaches firm ball stage again. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla and nuts. Pour into a well-greased 8-inch square pan. When firm, turn out on cutting board or waxed paper and cut into inch squares. Makes 5 dozen, or 1 1/2 lbs.

NOTE: Drop a tiny bit of the hot mixture into a bowl of cold (not ice) water. If the candy forms a firm ball and remains firm and round when you lift it out of the water with your fingers, then the candy has cooked long enough. Be sure to take the pan off the heat while testing the candy.

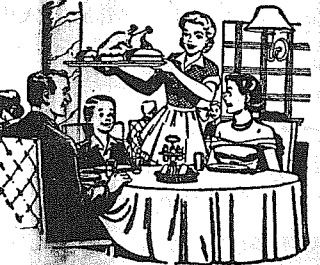

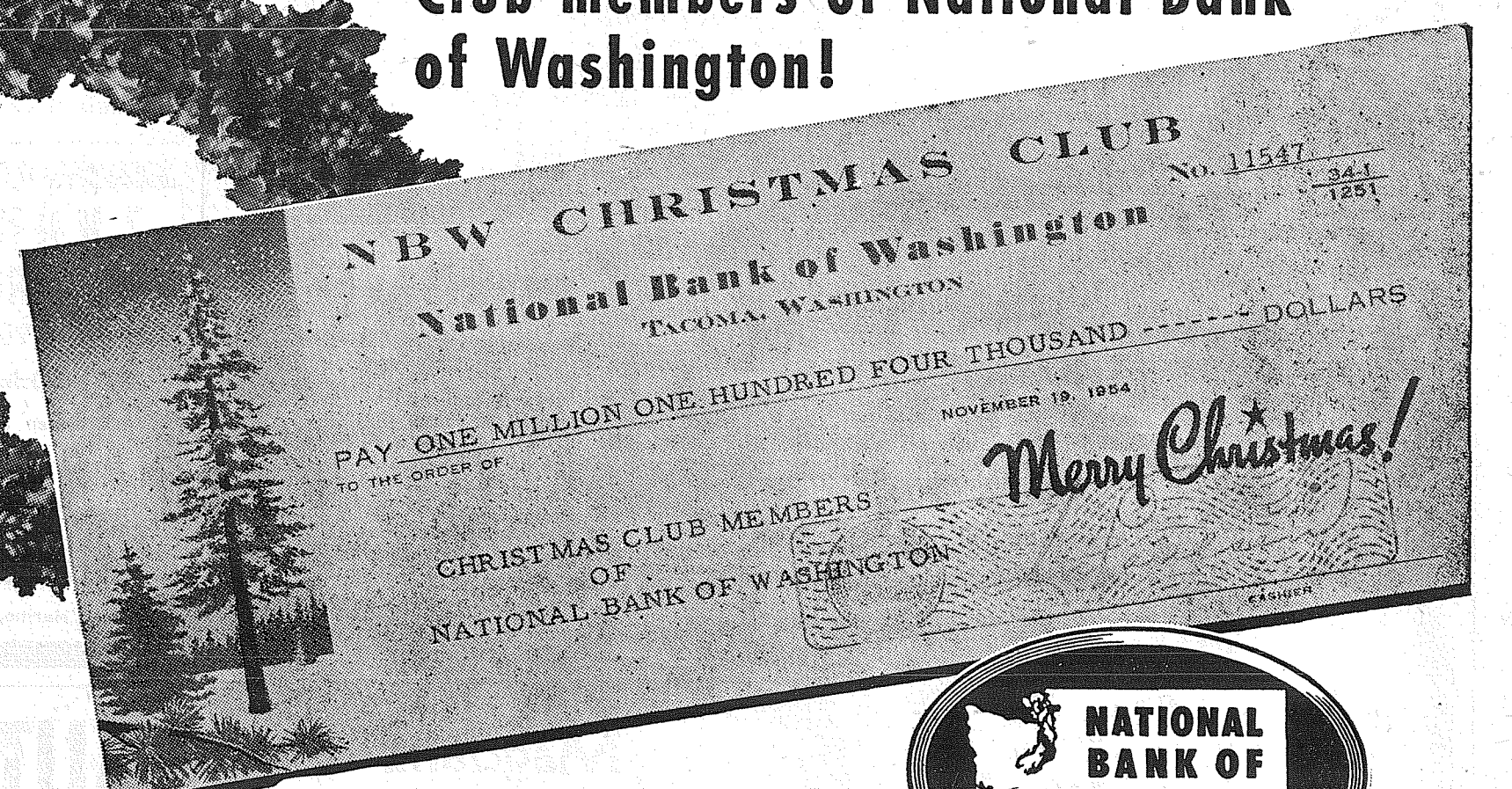

Said Snowden, "It is a great pleasure to be distributing over \$1,000,000 this year to our Christmas Club members. Not only will this mean a merrier and debt-free Christmas for thousands of our members, but this large sum of money in circulation will benefit the community as a whole."

Christmas Club rolls for 1955 are now forming at National Bank of Washington, and will close on January 15.

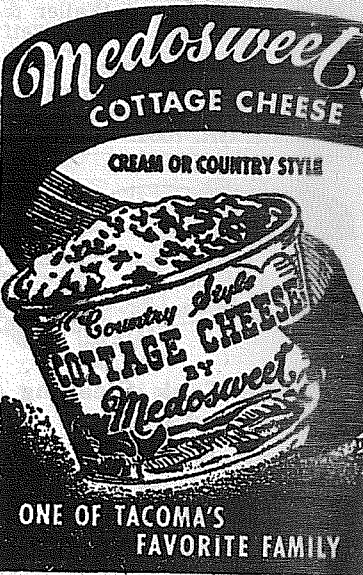

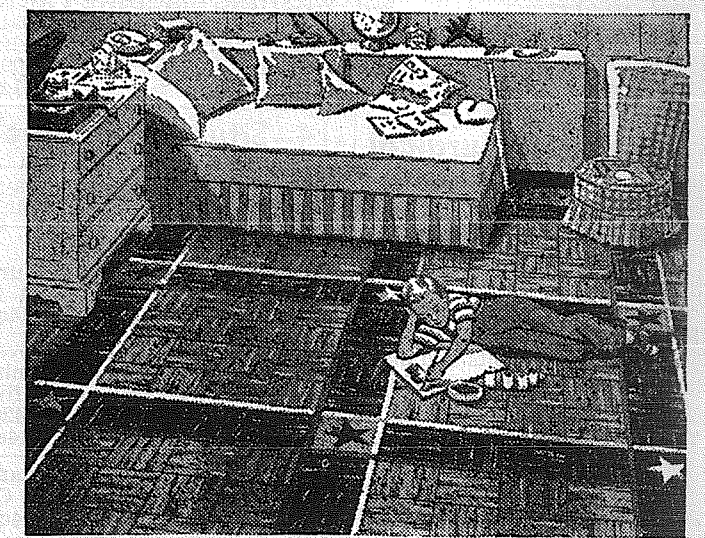

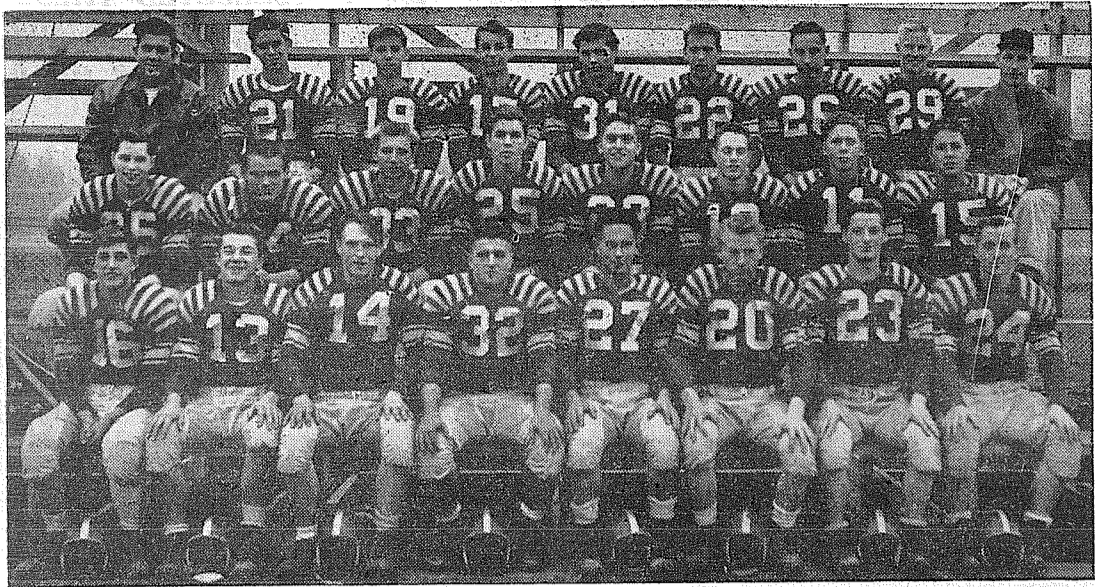
