## Free Ambulance To Start March 8

On Saturday, March 8, the only ambulance with trained rescue squad operated by a volunteer fire department in the state of Washington will go into operation at Spanaway. The service will be free to all communities outside the city limits of Tacoma, serving Yelm, Roy, Elk Plain, Clover Creek, Midland, Summit, Parkland, Spanaway, the Lakeview area and all way points. Since Eatonville is served by a vehicle maintained by the clinic there, it will not be necessary to cover that section from Spanaway.

The Packard ambulance was purchased recently by the Spanaway Community club and turned over to Pierce County Fire District 7 (Spanaway Volunteer Fire Department), which will operate the unit. The rescuator which the Community club bought for the use of the Spanaway firemen some time ago will be carried in the ambulance, together with many other pieces of equipment for rescue work. Thus equipped, the ambulance and its trained crew will be ready for any type of emergency.

Like the fire department, the ambulance service will be on a full 24-hour schedule with trained men available at all times. Martin Gibbons heads the 12-man rescue squad which will operate the ambulance. Several of the men are already trained, all of the others now taking the special Red Cross course for such work. The special course in ambulance operation, also offered by the Red Cross, will be completed by every member of the squad so that any one of them could operate the ambulance and all of its highly technical equipment when necessary. Further details may be learned by calling Mr. Gibbons at his place of business, the Spanaway Food Center, GR. 7512.

As a factor for the security of people of the communities served, the importance of the new ambulance can hardly be appraised at this time. There have been a number of cases within the past year when lives have been lost because it took too long to get an ambulance to the scene from Tacoma. Such emergencies will continue from time to time in the future. There will be automobile accidents, swimmers will go down, people will be overcome by smoke in burning buildings, others will suffer heart attacks—the list of possible casualties is endless. The knowledge that a fully equipped ambulance is instantly available will become part of community consciousness and this speedy aid will many times tip the scales from death to life.

**Fire Permits Required**

It is that time of the year again when we are required by law to obtain a permit before lighting any open fire. With nice weather ahead we all want to clean up and burn debris around the place and also to burn brush and stump piles. Although we may think that any fire would be safe on account of the damp surrounding area, the law still requires that we have a permit between the dates of Feb. 15 and Oct. 15, anywhere within the state of Washington. Rubbish may be burned in an incinerator or a steel barrel with a wire screen spark arrester without a permit.

Harry Lee, fire warden for the Summit-Woodland-Collins Fire district, announces that he will issue permits, free of charge, to those wishing to burn in that district. Mr. Lee may be reached by phone at Puyallup 5-7100 or if you care to drive over to his place, he lives on the south end of Sloat road.

Fire Commissioner Ed Purdue states that the fire hall is receiving many calls about permits, but that many people are calling GR. 5511, the telephone which should be used only to report a fire. He asks that all other calls be made on GR. 7914 or the Puyallup number, 5-7100.

"The operation was successful and the patient will live," state "Doctors" Wes McKewen and Lee Tretter, Parkland Business club chairman for Operation Orient 2000 Plus, last week's blood bank drive at Parkland.

While the "2000" goal of the drive is now realized to have been somewhat out of line, it is also realized that many more than 2,000 people of the Parkland area are more than ever before conscious of the importance of giving blood for the armed forces in Korea and for the security of folks at home. The local blood pool for Parkland was readily filled on the opening day of the drive and already three pints of the precious fluid have been used for a young boy of the district. The three pints will soon be replaced. It was pointed out that now anyone in the Parkland area needing blood may receive it with only the small service charge.

Those in charge of the blood drive report that only about half of those reporting to donate were accepted. Slight colds and other minor ailments accounted for most of those refused and many will be able to give their blood soon. For this reason, it is planned to bring the mobility unit of the blood bank back to Parkland in the near future so that more people may give. Future plans look toward making the blood bank project a continuing community activity for the help of many as needed.

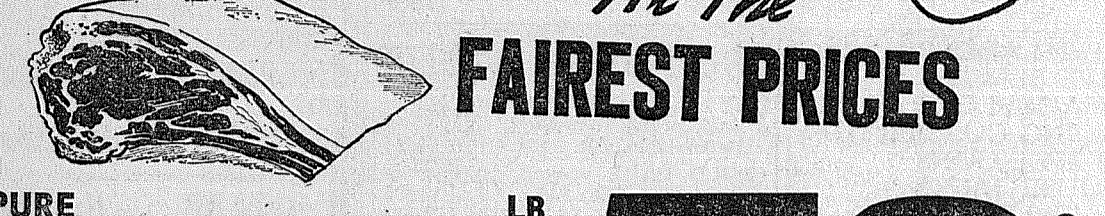
