

A fine Packard ambulance was purhased recently by the Spanaway Community club and turned over to Pierce County Fire District 7 (Spanaway Volunteer Fire Department), which will operate the unit. The resuscitator which the Community club bought for the use of the Spanaway firemen some time ago will be carried n the ambulance, together with many other pieces of equipment for rescue work. Thus equipped, the ambulance and its trained crew will be ready for any type of emergency.

Like the fire department, the am-pulance service will be on call on a full 24-hour schedule with trained men available at all times. Martin Gibbons heads the 12-man rescue squad which will operate the ambuance. Several of the men are already trained, all of the others now taking the special Red Cross course for such work. The special course in ambulance operation, also offered by the Red Cross, will be completed by every member of the squad so that any one of them could operate the ambulance present. and all of its highly technical equip ment when necessary. Further details may be learned by calling Mr. Gibbons at his place of business, the Spanaway Food Center, GR. 7512.

As a factor for the security of people of the communities served, the importance of the new ambulance can hardly be appraised at this time. There an ambulance to the scene from Tacoma.
