Variety Is Keynote ... PLANNING CHURCH, CLUB MEALS

It is important that community meals be well planned. Whether it be a church supper, a woman's club luncheon or a picnic, it is in the category of a party. Such an occasion demands a meal that is both attractive to look at and tasty to eat.

Variety is the keynote for attractive and tasty food. Commonly used foods may be made interesting by using new and interesting combinations. In planning a menu, start with the main dish, usually one of meat or some other protein food. This main dish may contain one or more vegetables or may be accompanied by vegetables or a salad of different textures.

Vegetable Contrast

If a starchy vegetable such as potatoes or winter squash is used to accompany the main dish, select as contrast for the other vegetable, a succulent one such as a green vegetable. Or if the second vegetable is a heavier vegetable such as carrots or beets, accompany the meal with a raw vegetable or fruit salad or one of the light aspic salads.

Every meal should contain at least one colorful food, green, red, orange or yellow, but several colors in a meal must be combined harmoniously. Take care not to have too much red and yellow together. Too many dominant colors detract from the interest of the rest of the food. Food naturally lacking color may be brightened with garnishes.

Interesting Shapes

Often the shape of the food helps to give it an interesting appearance. Try slicing Danish squash crosswise, leaving the skin on so that each yellow ring will be outlined with a dark green scalloped edge. Top a meat pie with diamond-shaped biscuits. Incidentally, they are less time-consuming to make than round ones since they may be cut with a knife instead of a cutter.

Common vegetables may be brought into the unusual class by using interesting sauces with them. The lowly onion baked with a topping of a spoonful of chilisauce mixed with a bit of brown sugar makes it a popular item. Carrots cooked for a few minutes in

a sauce made of lemon juice, sugar and butter take on an interesting translucency and flavor which make them party food.

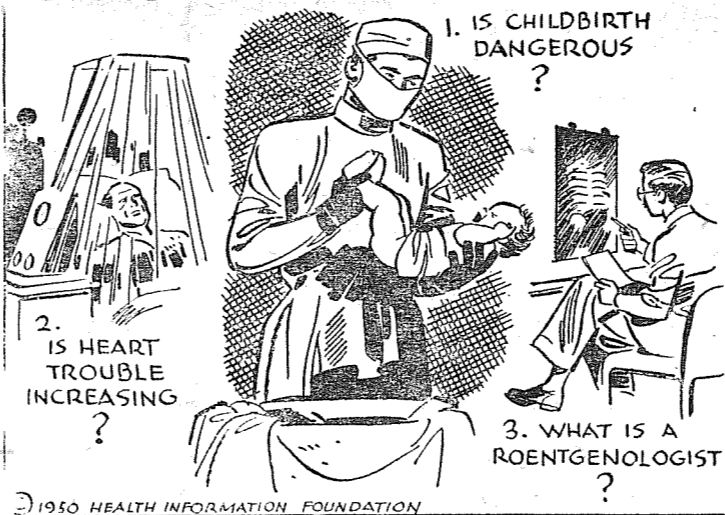
Dressings, Sauces, Gravy

Flavor is a quality which is so easily lost and must not be forgotten in preparing food in large quantity. Food which is timed to be served immediately after it has finished cooking always tastes better. If food with bland flavors are used they may be given zest with dressings and sauces. Remember that tasty, flavorful gravy does a lot to pep up a pot roast. Vegetables served with olive, almond or bacon sauce take on an interesting flavor.

Answer to Question No. 1:

The odds are 1,000 to 1 that a mother will survive childbirth and 1,000 to 31 that her baby will be born alive. In 1939, deaths during childbirth were almost six times as frequent as they are today and infant mortality was almost double. One important reason for the improvement is that only 40 per cent of babies were born in hospitals in 1936, whereas 85 per cent are born in them today.

Answer to Question No. 2:

Today there is much less heart trouble than there used to be in youth and early middle

age. But, because we Americans are living longer, the number of persons with heart trouble is increasing for the total population—since heart disease is primarily an ailment of the middle and old age brackets.

Answer to Question No. 3:

A roentgenologist is a doctor who specializes in X-ray. The X-ray is one of medicine's greatest aids in diagnosis and treatment and its use has contributed much to the increased life span of Americans. A technician may take an X-ray picture but it takes a physician trained in X-ray to interpret it properly.

MIDLAND IMPROVEMENT CLUB

This organization started in the early nineteenth hundreds but became legally incorporated Dec. 21, 1927. Some of the original charter members were William Whitefield, J. H. Moos, Lewis Bixby, J. O. Howell, E. E. Lockwood, Charles Taylor, and Mr. Ascher.

The following taken from the original Articles of Incorporation tells us why they organized. "The purposes and objects for which this corporation is formed are: to promote religious teachings in the community; to construct, operate, and control a club house and club rooms at Midland, Wash., for the use of this corporation; to encourage and promote social life and recreation in the community; to create a community spirit for the community of Midland, Wash., and to carry on and promote scientific and religious education in the community."

Also, "To own such personal and real property as may be necessary and convenient, and to deal with, sell, transfer, mortgage or pledge the same to carry out the foregoing purposes and objects of this organization."

Any person residing in the community of Midland and 21 years of age is eligible to become a voting member. Under 21 they may be a member but have no vote.

The following officers are elected annually; the current officers are: President, Spalt Wartenbe; Robert Clinton, vice president; Mrs. James Hartley, secretary; Lewis McArthur, treasurer. The present trustees are George Turner, Al Bombardier and Clyde Spangler.

The original club helped get their rural mail route established; they were instrumental in getting a drainage system in and also the original paved road in Midland. The incorporated club has also achieved a number of things for their community. They built and paid for their own club, as Mrs. Cook, a long time resident of Midland put it, "we gave card parties, chicken dinners, dances, any and everything we could think of to raise money."
