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


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

It is important that community them party food. neals be well planned. Whether it be a church supper, a woman's club luncheon or a picnic, it is in the category of a party. Such an occasion demands a meal that is both attractive to look at and tasty to cat.

Variety is the keynote for attractive and tasty food. Commonly used foods may be made interesting by using new and interesting combinations. In planning a menu, start with the main dish. usually one of meat or some other protein food. This main dish may contain one or more vegetables or may be accompanied by vegetables or a salad of different textures.

Every meal should contain at least one colorful food, green, red, orange or yellow, but several colors in a meal must be combined harmoniously. Take care not to have too much red and yellow together. Too many dominant colors detract from the interest of the rest of the food. Food naturally lackng color may be brightened with garnishes.

Interesting Shapes

Often the shape of the food helps to give it an interesting appearance. Try slicing Danish squash crosswise, leaving the skin on so that each yellow ring will be outlined with a dark green scalloped edge. Top a meat pie with diamond-shaped biscuits. 

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
