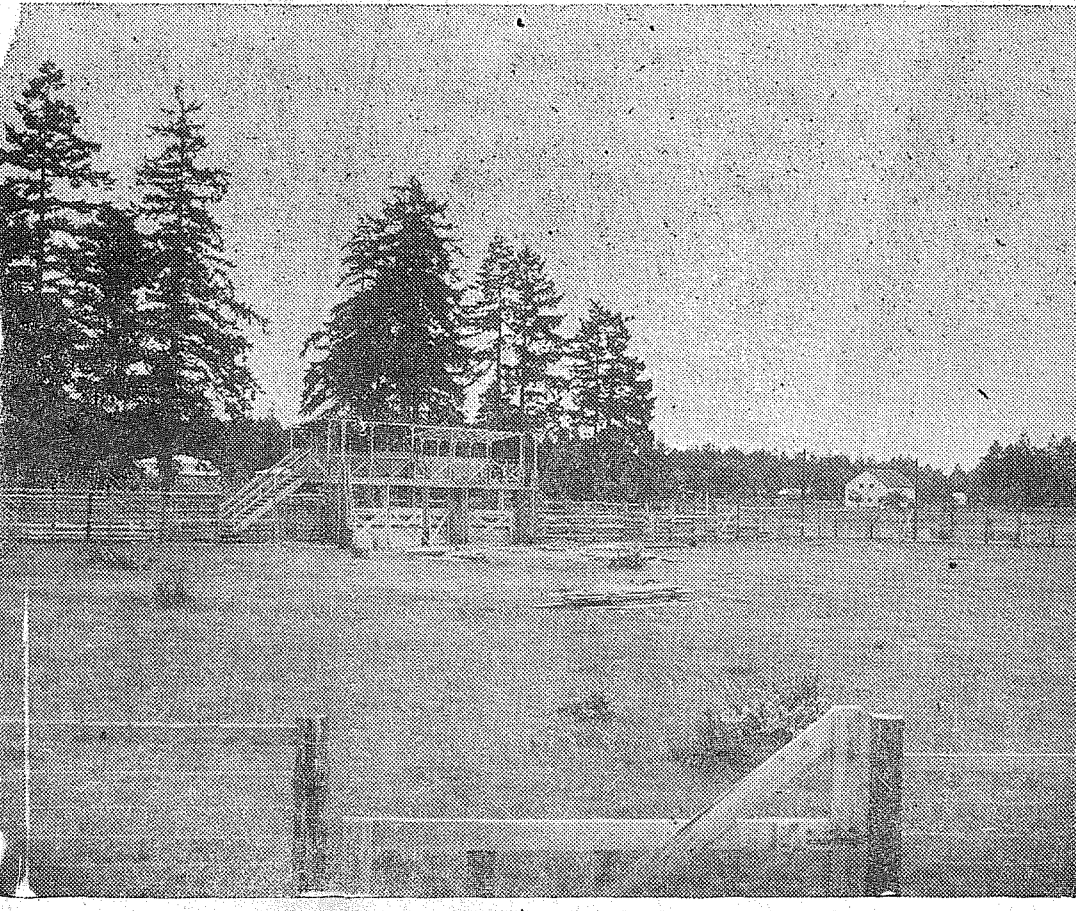

2 packages (3 ounces each) lemon flavored gelatin dessert
1 cup boiling water
1 cup undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 cup chopped cooked ham (or canned luncheon meat)

1/2 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped green onions
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
1 tablespoon steak sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt

Dissolve lemon gelatin in hot water. Chill until slightly thickened (about 40-45 minutes). Chill Carnation in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form through the milk (about 15-20 minutes). Whip until stiff (about 1 minute). Add lemon juice and whip very stiff (about 2 minutes longer). Combine ham and vegetables with steak sauce and salt in bowl. Fold in whipped Carnation and chilled gelatin. Blend thoroughly and place in 1 1/2 quart mold. Chill until firm (about 2 hours). Unmold by dipping in hot water for a few seconds and serve on platter lined with salad greens.

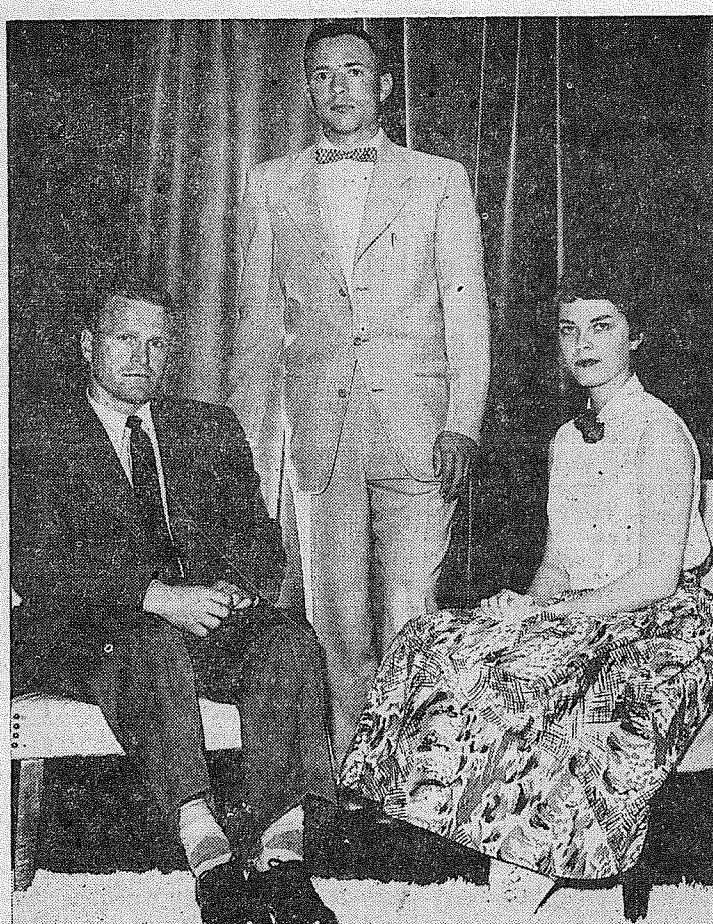
School Picnic

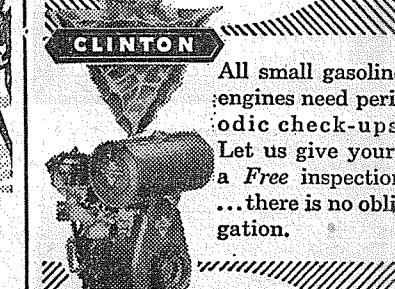

Make a date now to attend the Parkland Round-Up June 10 to 13.

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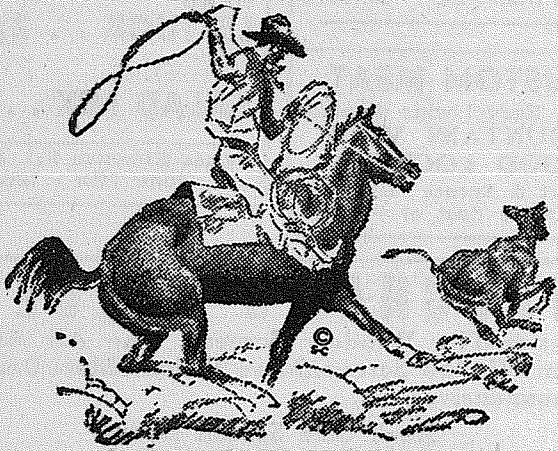

His stellar cast includes all

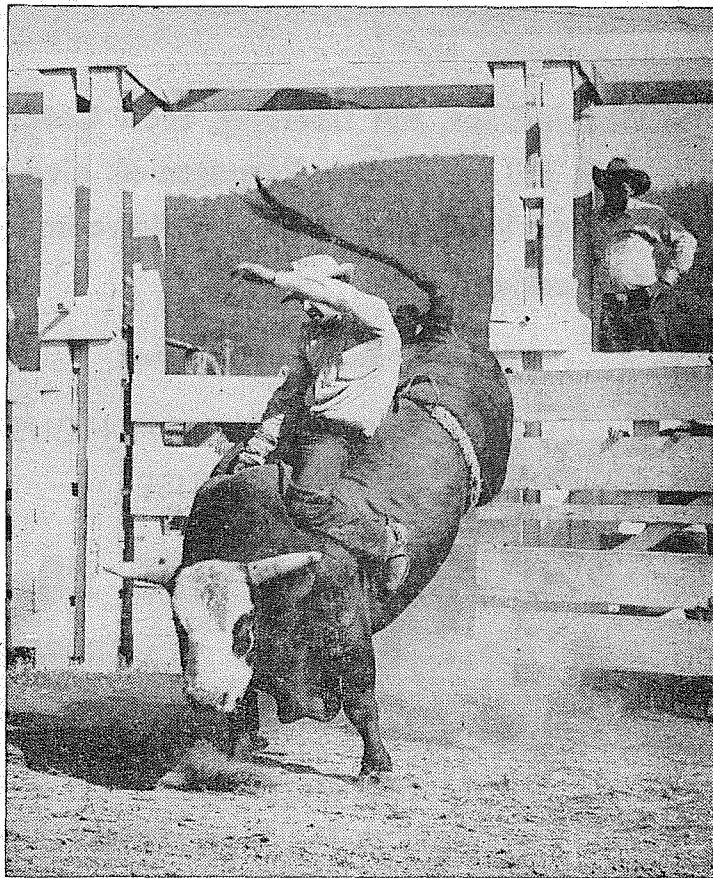

Special Events for Kids

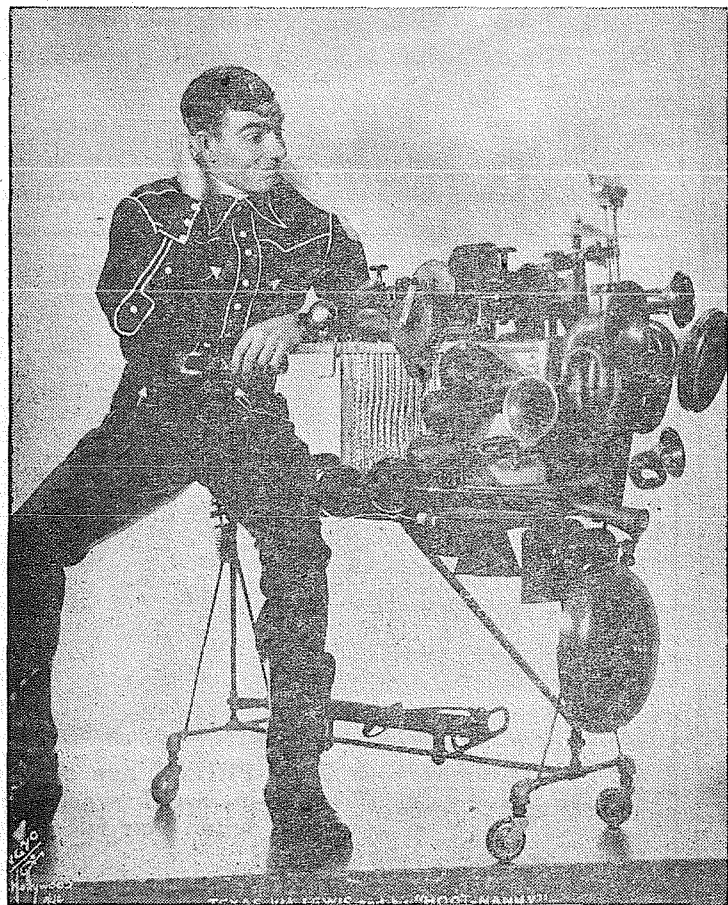

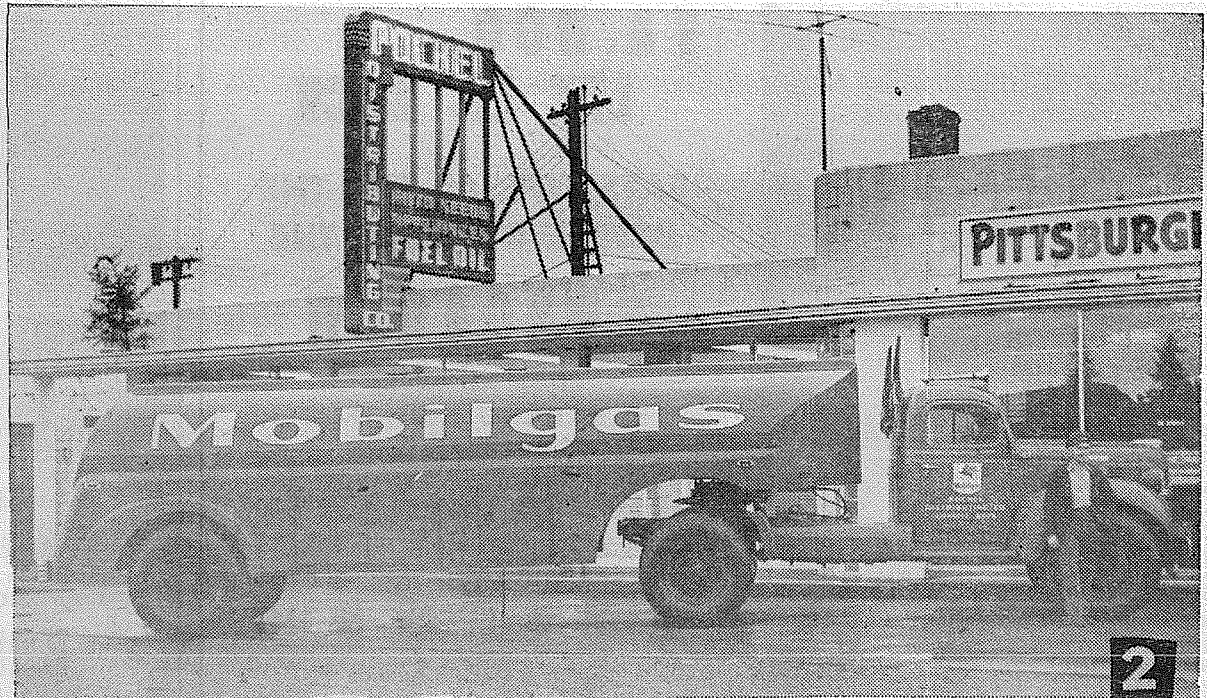
