Discuss Spanaway Water Plan Tonight

Spanaway citizens will converge on the school gym tonight at 8 p.m. for a mass meeting to discuss the comprehensive plan for the proposed water system and its financing.

The mass meeting was called by the three water commissioners—Robert Rhone, Emerson Tarpinning and Robert Steidel—so that all voters within the boundaries of the newly formed water district may become fully acquainted with the plan before the election which will be held some time in January.

Last night, the commissioners and the committee of sponsors, which includes Delbert Bresemann, John and Walter Cotten, Walter Feddersen, Martin Gibbons, George King, Don McLellan, Michael Kirby, George

Ouhl, Ray Pochel, Bill Righetti, Fred Scott and Harry Smith, met at the home of Steidel so that they themselves could become better acquainted with some of the details.

Since Sept. 24, when Spanawayites, by a margin of 153 to 120 votes, approved the formation of the water district, Howard T. Harstad, Seattle engineer, has been spending a great deal of time laying the groundwork for the proposed system and investigating every angle.

Even before that, Harstad had done a large amount of preliminary work including making a thorough survey of the community, drawing up boundaries, and making a fairly complete investigation of what the system would require in the line of pipes, tanks, wells, etc.

At the meeting tonight, residents will be able to ask any questions they wish to have cleared up concerning the proposed system. The district includes most of the area between Clover Creek and the Roy Y, from the lake to East E, with the boundaries meandering in and out at various points.

In the election which will be held soon, a majority vote will be necessary to approve the comprehensive plan, and a 60 per cent majority will be required to okeh the bond issue for financing the system.

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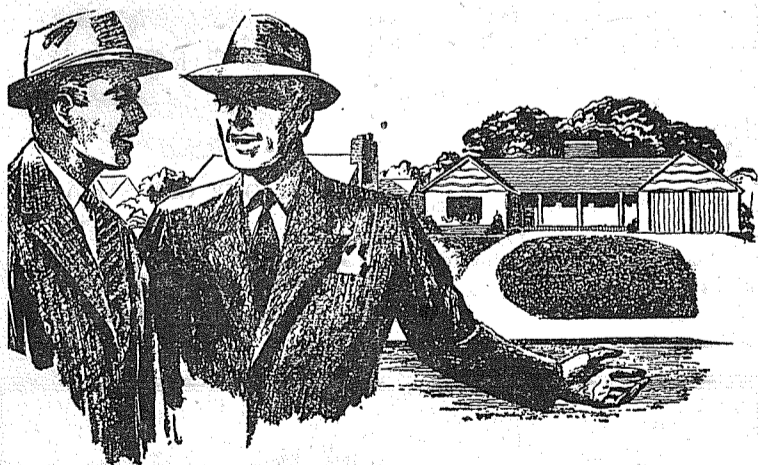
