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IS IT A POMATO? Who ever heard of tomatoes growing on potato vines? Just to prove that this weird arrangement can happen and is happening right now, here is a picture of Jack Hetherlin in his lush garden at South 110th and Yakima. In his left hand he holds a cluster of small perfectly formed green tomatoes picked from a potato plant from which he has just dug a fine big new potato. Mr. Hetherlin, who makes an exciting hobby of gardening, is growing 16 varieties of tomatoes and several kinds of potatoes, the tomato-bearing potato vines being the White Jewel type. He attributes the unusual freak to cross pollination of the adjacent plants by bees. The Hetherlin garden also contains another interesting "sport"—a cabbage plant bearing brussels sprouts along the stem and a perfect head of cauliflower growing out of the middle of the cabbage head. Richly fertilized and beautifully cultivated, the garden plot is producing fine crops of tomatoes, potatoes, corn, cucumbers, squash, beets, parsnips and several other tasty vegetables. Federal Gas Tax Refund Date Set

Pierce county farmers were reminded this week to apply for a refund of federal taxes paid on gasoline used in farming operations during the 12 months ending June 30. All claims must be filed before October 1.

C. R. Doran, county Extension agent, said the refund will amount to 3 cents per gallon in most cases. However, if some of the gasoline used in the past 12 months was purchased before July 1, 1956, the tax refund will be 2 cents on that amount.

Owners, tenants, and farm operators are eligible for the federal gasoline tax refund. No refunds are allowed on gasoline used on the highway, or in processing packaging, freezing, or canning operations.

Gasoline used on the applicant's farm by a neighbor or custom operator doing farm work can be included in the refund request.

Mr. Doran advised that applications for the tax refund must be filed on Form 2240. The forms, together with instructions for their use, are available at the county Extension office and from the local or district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

Filling out the form is a simple process, Mr. Doran says. Information required includes name address, gallons of gasoline used on the farm for farming purposes, and the amount of refund requested. The signed forms should be mailed to the Internal Revenue Service, Tacoma, or to one of the local offices.

Whatever Aches Whenever Pains Frieda Mends It

In January, all of the McChord Air Force Base Hospital WAF were transferred to Hamilton AFB, California. All except one, that is.

Remaining in her little Clinic to soothe sore muscles, or awaken muscles sleeping with bruxism, arthritis or even

polio, is physio-therapist, T/Sgt. Frieda R. Friedman.

Frequently working 15 or 16 hours a day, including many weekends, Sergeant Friedman has managed to administer 28,612 treatments to 11,105 patients. This was accomplished from the period beginning October, 1955, and ending May 1957.

According to several of the Hospital doctors, Frieda "has consistently demonstrated a marked devotion to duty—passing over lunch hours, coffee breaks and similar times to care for her patients as well as improvising equipment for treatment of her patients" . . . and . . . "her technical ability compare most favorably with those of any of the civilian physio therapist I have known—and surpasses many of them."

One of Frieda's most astounding patient-recoveries concerns a 17 month-old little girl. She had polio, walked toes outward, and of shortness of several foot muscles caused her toes to curl

under. After six months of whirl pool treatments and passive and active muscles exercises, one would never detect sign of the past ailments.

The little girl still occasionally comes to the clinic, but thanks to the patience and extensive knowledge of Sergeant Friedman, she happily runs in and just for a visit.

Another case, concerning a 73 year old dependent, causes a gleam to appear in the eyes of the little physio-therapist as she speaks of it. "After being wheeled into my clinic, he walked out a spry young man after the 13th treatment," says Frieda.

The man was admitted to the hospital after having a stroke which left the entire left side of his body paralyzed.

Bruxism, arthritis and a frozen right arm sent S/Sgt. Ashley Bell down from Goose Bay, Labrador to Frieda for physio therapy treatments after he refused surgery. His right arm was stuck to his side, unable to move at all; his chin bent down to his collarbone so he couldn't raise his head.

After receiving Frieda's treatments, Sergeant Bell now holds his head high. He is assigned to the Food Service Squadron as a baker in the Consolidated Dining Hall number one, where he shoves bread into the ovens with grace and ease.

Her clinic looks like a little 'doll house' complete with curtains, pictures and plants. She even grows plants from potatoes and constructs a planter out of a tin can and a coat hanger; paints it, hangs it up, and the results . . . a beautiful, cheery clinic.

Although battling a limited working area, Sergeant Friedman has managed to squeeze in a reception room for her awaiting patients in the whirl-pool room.

The clinic consists of arm and leg whirl pools, a diathermy machine, ultra-violet, and a number of infra-red lamp.

Before departing for England, former base commander Colonel Henry L. Crouch, Jr. wrote a letter of appreciation to Frieda. "Your attention to duty is in keeping with the highest tradition of the United States Air Force. We here at McChord are most fortunate to number you among our family," the letter stated in part.

25th's Information Center Has Nike Model Featured

At McChord Air Force Base the Information Center has on display a miniature NIKE guided missile site. The 8' by 18' scaled model was designed and made by men of the 433rd AAA Missile Battalion, Fort Lawton, Washington, to acquaint the public with the Army's NIKE.

Sic James L. Donahoe, Sp-3 Frank A. Mediate, Sp-3 Dennis J. Sapho and Pvt. James E. Hobenson designed and built the miniature site in two and one half months.

For their scale, they chose a 1/4 of an inch to a foot, then, blue-printed, cut out and carved the NIKE missiles by hand.

To make the hills that surround the Seattle-Tacoma area, they first nailed a wooden frame on the four 4' by 8' platforms.

Over the wooden frame was nailed screen wire and over the wire mesh was poured a putty like substance called Perma-scene.

Before the Perma-scene had a chance to dry, it was molded into a contour shape of small hills.



WAF Band To Perform At Seafair

Every part of the nation is represented by the young women who make up the USAF's only WAF Band which will perform at Seattle's Sea-fair, August 1st through the 11th.

When it began in 1951, the WAF Band had just 18 members. Now it's 50 members make up one of the top all-women musical organizations in the country, spending four-fifths of their time on concert tours throughout the United States.

Women try out for the unit while they are still civilians. A WAF Band aspirant with college training in music or high school experience with a Class A band or equivalent, arranges for an audition through her local Air Force recruiting office.

If she makes the grade, she gets a Certificate of Acceptance which clears the way for her to enter the band.

But basic training comes first. At Lackland AFB, Texas, home of the band, she learns about customs, traditions, and organization of the U. S. Air Force, and something about the airplanes it flies. Other subjects she takes include physical training, close order drill, and first aid with a little time left over for recreational activities.

Beginning on Wednesday, the NIKE model will be on display at Rhode's Store, Lakewood Villa Plaza.

After she completes basic training, the WAF bandswoman is immediately assigned to a place in the band, according to her musical ability. Opportunity for promotion depends on her instrumental proficiency and the leadership she demonstrates as a WAF.

Director of the United States Air Force WAF Band, Captain Marybelle J. Nissly, began her colorful career in military music as leader of the first Women's Army Band organized at Ft. Des Moines, Iowa, in 1942.

In one of her first public statements after becoming WAF Band director in 1951, Captain Nissly said she hoped to build "one of the finest women's organizations in the musical world." From that starting point the band has grown in numbers, prestige, and musicianship until today critics agree that Captain Nissly has reached her goal.

The band will arrive on McChord August 1, and be housed at Pier 91, Seattle.

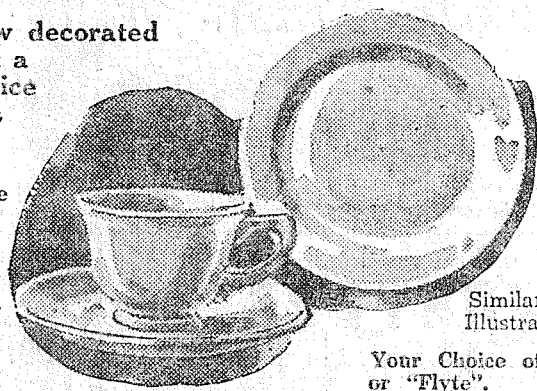

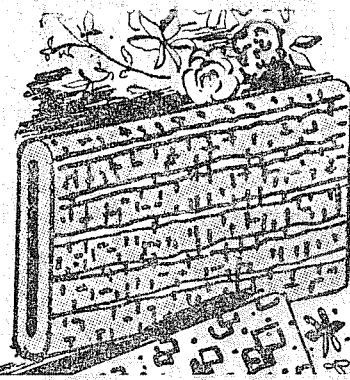

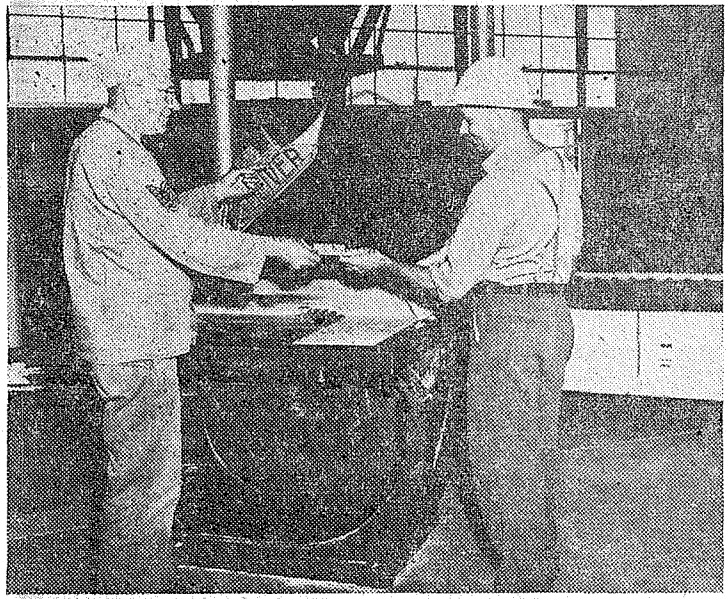

1705th Is Major Aerial Gateway To Alaska

The 1705th Air Terminal Squadron, which prides itself as being the major aerial gateway to Alaska for the military services, is the oldest Group organization at McChord. Originally designated the 1726th Support Squadron, and activated at McChord in January 1951, it was redesignated the Air Terminal Squadron on 2 July, 1955.

For many of the almost 55,000 passengers, many of them dependents, that went through the Air Terminal last year, the facilities of the Terminal and the aircraft of the 33rd ATS who fly many of the passengers formed the main impressions not only of McChord and MATS, but in many instances of the Air Force as well. With this in mind, the passenger terminal has recently been completely remodeled to emphasize that "MATS service is quality service," long a contention of Maj. Gen. Joseph Smith, MATS Commander.

New facilities include a special dependents' lounge and nursery adjoining the MATS Chaplain's office, better and more efficient passenger service and baggage handling counters, and generally more room for weary travelers. Candy and cigarette machines, lockers, newspaper racks, and long-distance telephones stand nearby. Just across the street is a barber shop and PX, and a cafeteria open on a twenty-four hour basis.

But passenger service is only half of the important work done by the Terminal Squadron. At the Freight Terminal, the Douglas C-124s of the 32nd ATS, and the civilian contract LOGAIR aircraft lead their high-value and priority cargo items bound for Alaska and the Mid-Pacific. Last year nearly 45,000 pounds of priority cargo were handled at the Air Terminal.

The fine record of the Air Terminal in handling both passengers and freight is a tribute not only to the 80 MATS men, but also to the 130 civilians, who are proud of their organization and strive constantly to improve it. In the recent civilian incentive awards campaign, the Air Terminal led by far all other units on the base in the number and acceptability of suggestions for improvement of operations.

Major Arthur Bonham has commanded the Air Terminal continuously from July 1953 except for the latter half of 1954 when he was executive officer of the 34th Air Transportation Squadron.

County Agent News

I am having many inquiries as to the white spots, up to the size of a 50 cent piece, now being observed on peaches. This is mildew, and is quite common on peaches raised in the Puget Sound area. Nearing fruit maturity, these white spots, (caused by the fungus), turn brown, often times russetting and deforming the peach.

About the only, and best, control, is to spray with a wettable sulfur at the rate of six pounds to 100 gallons of water or 1/2 lb. of the sulfur to 8 gallons of water. Apply this mixture in three applications — ten days apart beginning 3 weeks before harvest if possible.
This same spray will help to control the brown rot. Brown rot will attack peaches even after they are picked and in storage.

Flies are a nuisance! Since we are in the midst of the fly season, our office has received many calls regarding fly control. I've noticed some poultry farms with very heavy fly infestations. That's not surprising. Poultry manure pits furnish an excellent

place for flies to multiply. Our present system of deep litter management and cleaning droppings pits only a couple of times a year aggravate the situation.

During the past few years, we've had a number of insecticides that gave good fly control. However, it wasn't long until resistant strains of flies developed. Now, on many farms, insecticides such as DDT and lindane are not effective. Now we have another insecticide to take their place. It's called malathion. It is available in the dust, wettable powder, and emulsion form. The wettable powder and emulsion forms are most commonly used. Directions for mixing the product are furnished on the container. Thorough spraying is necessary for good control. The poultry house walls, ceilings, and dropping pits should all be sprayed. They should be wet almost to the point of running.

If the fly infestation is heavy, weekly application probably will be necessary—at least until the reproductive cycle is broken. Where spraying is started before flies become a problem, once a month spraying is usually all that is needed.

This control really does the job.

I've seen farms with extremely heavy fly infestations that have been brought under control even during the worst of the season. Bob Berg, from Puyallup, showed me the results on his farm. He opened the door of a newly cleaned brooder house which had been sprayed with malathion. The floor was black with dead flies. There was scarcely a fly buzzing overhead.

A word of caution when using malathion. Keep your body covered so that the spray doesn't fall on your skin surfaces. Protect your eyes from the spray. Wear a respirator if working in confined quarters.

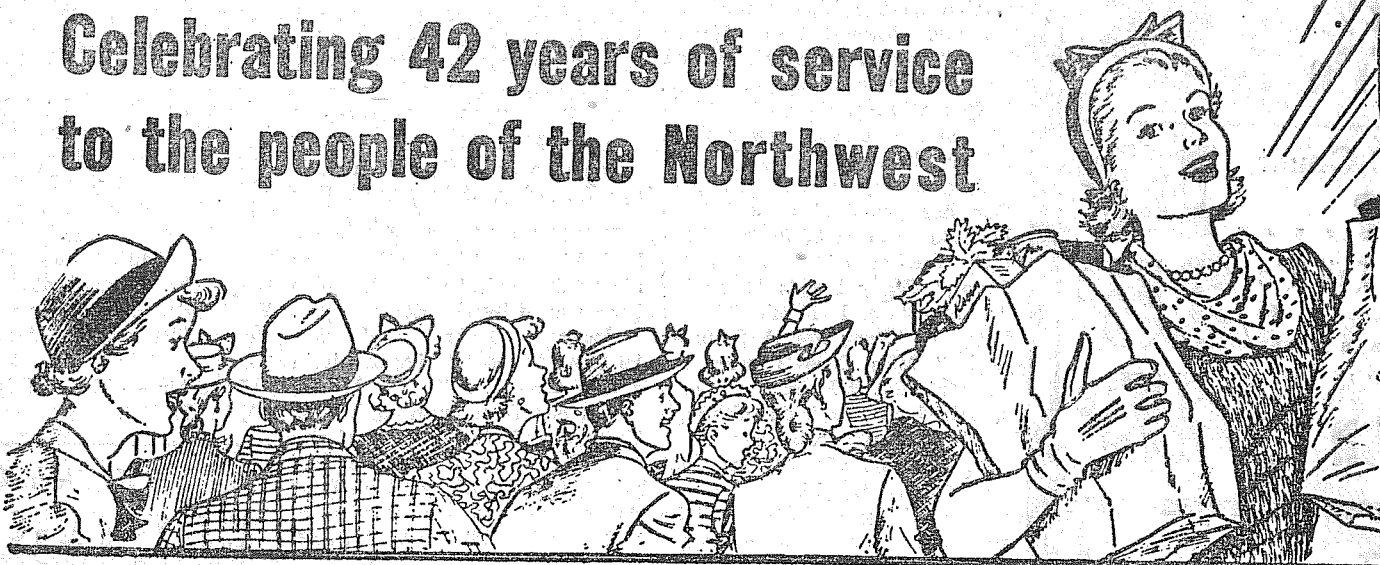

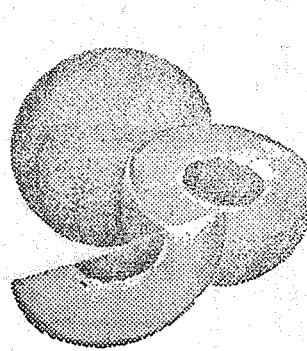
