


# Governor Rosellini Invited to Fort Lewis Rodeo



Accidents, according to safety experts, result from two major causes: (1) unsafe conditions committed by an individual. Management can effectively eliminate the unsafe conditions;

requires more intricate effort. A "safety conscious" state of mind must be developed by varied methods so that it may be accepted willingly and enthusiastically. One method is by each of us being "His brother's keeper." In other words, each of us, in addition to being "Safety Conscious" during our daily routine must watch our fellow workers to be sure that no accident be-

falls him. A "Gimmick" to assist you in doing this has been suggested by

"I just saw you doing something that could have caused an accident. You may not even realize you did it, but think over what you've done in the last few minutes and you will probably recall what I saw.

I am giving you this card as part of our campaign to make all of us SAFETY CONSCIOUS. Keep it until you see someone doing something in an unsafe way and then have that person sign and keep this card."




## 1705th Is Major Major Favors **Aerial Gateway Delivers Talk** To Alaska

For many of the almost 55,000 passengers, many of them dependents, that went through the Air Terminal last year, the facilities of the Terminal and the aircraft of the 33rd ATS who fly many of the passengers formed the main impressions not only of McChord and MATS, but in many instances of the Air Force as well. New facilities include a special dependents' lounge and nursery adjoining the MATS Chaplain's office, better and more efficient passenger service and baggage handling counters, and generally more room for weary travellers. I am having many inquiries as to the white spots, up to the size of a 50 cent piece, now being observed on peaches. This is mildew, and is quite common on peaches raised in the Puget Sound area. Nearing fruit maturity, these white spots, (caused by the fungus), turn brown, often times russeting and deforming the peach.
