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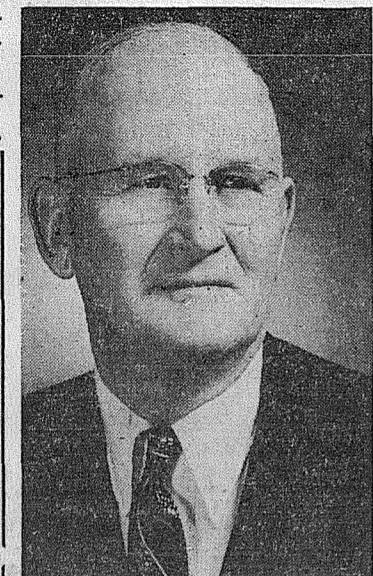

Credit Listings Increase In '56

On January 2, 1957 each of the 159 offices of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc. in the United States and Canada will participate in that concern's annual financial statement mailing program, with statement forms being sent to nearly 3,000,000 businesses located in about 53,000 communities. This project represents a January mail contact with every business listed in the Dun & Bradstreet reference book.

Some 49 statement forms will be delivered to businesses located in Parkland, an increase of about 16% over the 41 names listed in that city in 1948.

The Seattle office of Dun & Bradstreet, which supervises the writing of reports on Western Washington businesses, will send out some 30,000 statement forms as its portion of the whole program.

Headquarters for the 159-office, 115 year-old credit reporting agency are in New York; and in the course of any one year, about 7,500,000 credit investigations are made. The Seattle office conducts roughly 125 investigations in Parkland alone in a year.

Each business reported upon is appraised as a credit risk, and a rating assigned. Ratings are then published in the reference book. The book contains the names of all merchandising businesses including such service activities as (Continued on Page 7)

"Facts of Faith" Due At Local Church Friday



No, he's not pulling himself out of a dizzy spell by breathing pure oxygen—he's getting a good whiff of helium, which will raise his voice three or four pitches. The human guinea pig is Dr. Irwin Moon, director of Moody Institute of Science, Los Angeles, and his experiment is a sequence from the new MIS film "Facts of Faith."

"Facts of Faith" will be shown at the Clover Creek Baptist church Friday, Jan. 4, at 7:45 p.m.

"Facts of Faith," produced by the Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles, is the film version of "Sermons from Science." A science demonstration show, "Sermons from Science" is performed by top scientists from MIS for the armed forces, colleges, high schools and other groups.

In the film, Dr. Irwin Moon, director of MIS, allows a million volts of electricity to sizzle through his body and out his fingertips making long streaks of high-voltage lightning. And he walks away alive.

There are other exciting demonstrations in "Facts of Faith." Dr. Moon fries an egg on a cold stove, breathes in a lungful of helium which changes his voice, floats metal rings in the air, breaks a drinking glass with a beam of sound, and captures the sound made by a piece of metal when a magnet is brought near.

The Spanaway American Legion commander said that his post was acting under the mandate of the 1956 convention in Bellingham when Washington Legionnaires voted to carry on the Blue Crutch sales as a community service program to help the March of Dimes campaign. The American Legion, he added, has been designated by the state headquarters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis as the sole organization in the state to carry on the Blue Crutch drive.

Local Legionnaires and Auxiliary women will ask the people of Spanaway to purchase the miniature Blue Crutch lapel tags as an added contribution towards hastening the day when polio will be a disease of the past.

"Great strides have been made against polio," Commander Harvey said, "but there is still much to do before the disease is conquered. More than 80,000 polio patients need assistance; new drugs must be found to prevent ALL polio; skilled personnel must be trained to care for those already afflicted and, most important, everyone must be vaccinated."

"Your contribution to the March of Dimes through the purchase of a Blue Crutch Friday or Saturday will help finish the job," Commander Harvey declared.

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Pac. Tel. & Tel. Plans for Big Growth in '57

Keeping up with the telephone demand in the Washington-Idaho area during the next two years will cost Pacific Telephone nearly \$100,000,000, it was disclosed today.

Looking ahead to its construction program for 1957 and 1958, the company faces continuing huge capital outlays to meet demands in the growing Pacific Northwest.

Manager W. F. McLeod, said new construction planned for 1957 will cost an estimated \$51,000,000, slightly less than this year's total which amounted to some \$53,000,000. Up until this year a 1955 high of \$34,300,000 had previously topped the list.

Looking ahead to 1958, company officials anticipate it will take upwards of \$42,000,000 or more to meet expected growth.

McLeod said next year's program allows for additional heavy expenditures for local and long distance call handling equipment, the largest single item. An estimated \$21,000,000 has been allocated for this category alone, up from 1956's \$17,000,000. Outside lines and facilities for local exchanges will cost \$12,500,000, up from this year's \$10,000,000.

Connecting lines and associated equipment for long distance growth will be improved with some \$2,600,000 in new projects. Nearly \$12,000,000 will be spent for telephone instruments and wiring on customers' premises.

Vice president and general manager Ben Bowling pointed out that the continuing emphasis will be on providing dial service. The company now has dial service in almost 92 per cent of its Washington-Idaho area. Pacific Telephone now has more than 800,000 telephones in its Washington-Idaho area. It has gained more telephones in the last 10 years than in its first 40.

McLeod said that figures are still being compiled on Tacoma's telephone growth and expansion during the past year and would be released soon.

Christmas time reflections recall expressions of many broad youth problems heard among many local people. These are just a few of the many ones I have heard recently:
"There is a too great dependence by we mortal human beings in just money and tangibles for

our personal security and happiness." "Sure we require money and it is human nature for most of us to want more money, but too often we seem to forget or be indifferent to the multitude of intangibles we say are important to us."

About youth problems you so often hear—"There are increasing youth problems caused by perhaps a number of factors. It may be a broken home resulting from parents' death, sickness, divorce or constant bickering or just plain child neglect or lack of love for the daughter or son. It

may be a lack of religious or moral training. Many people say there are far too many "working mothers." Mothers say working is necessary. It may be a lack of employment possibilities for youth. Permissiveness is blamed—letting youth do as they please or feel rather than what they should or ought to do. Poor parent example is often blamed 'do as I say rather than do as I do parents.' Then again lack of consistent supervision, love or discipline by parents."

You hear, too, that teachers in our schools being fearful of law suits or administrative scoldings are unable to discipline as they should. Another expression, "All children are different,

so you have got to have a different set of rules (or no rules) for each youngster."
Still another, "A child's affection or disaffection for people is developed during the child's first years of life and too often his feeling of insecurity was formed by poor handling and care then."
Another, "We are taught how to raise better animals, for example, which is fine but why should we not also be taught how to raise children?" Then this, "There just is not enough planning by parents concerning child rearing." And—"Many youthful offenders themselves agree that too much sparing of discipline will spoil the child but too often these same offenders

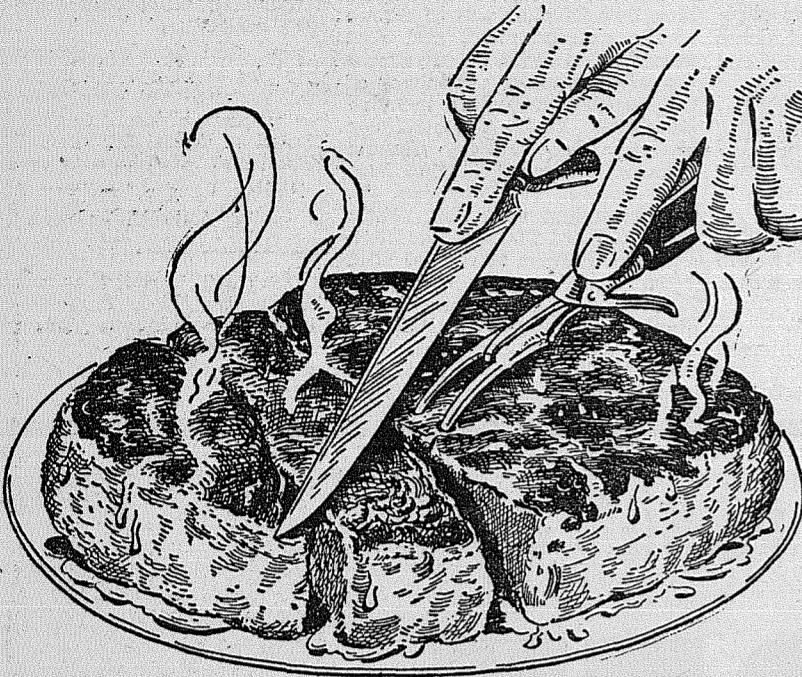
are frustrated and over-ruled by their elders in this type of thinking." "Too often some elders say if you love children you do not discipline them." "Too many think of discipline as harmful rather than beneficial."
In working with 4-H parents and members and others, these are just some ideas from people in general—not my ideas. Of course there are a lot more ideas that might be expressed.

If you have a freezer preparing food ahead of time is the thing to do. Beef loaf, ham

loaf, chicken loaf, chicken a la King, meat balls, hash, Swiss steak, are among the meat and poultry dishes that can be frozen very successfully.
Most kinds of sandwiches when properly packaged freeze satisfactorily. Sandwich fillings suitable for freezing are meat, poultry, and cheese spreads of all kinds. Thaw sandwiches in their sealed original wrappings. A package of two half-sandwiches will thaw at room temperature in from 3 to 3½ hours. Tea size sandwiches require less time for thawing than do full size ones. If they are to be toasted start them toasting while they are still partially frozen.

Baked apple, Jonathan, North-Spys, Balwin and Rome Beauty varieties of apples freeze well after they are baked. Use fresh, fully mature apples. Bake them sweetened to your taste. Cool quickly and freeze immediately. Thaw them in original package at room temperature or reheat them in oven or steam them.
Yeast rolls that are baked and then frozen may be kept successfully in freezer storage. Reheat frozen baked rolls in their sealed wrappings in a 375° to 400°F oven for about 5 to 10 minutes. Rolls may also be thawed in their sealed wrappings at room temperature for one hour then heated about five minutes in a 375 to 400°F oven. The reheating freshens the rolls.

Shortened cakes, angel food and sponge cakes may be frozen. Shortened cakes need to be heated in a hot oven 375 to 400°F in original wrappings. Thaw sponge and angel cakes at room temperature in original wrapping.
Steamed puddings, cookies and pies may also be frozen. With puddings place while still frozen in a steamer and heat to serving temperatures. Cookies may be frozen as dough or after cooking. Dough should be placed in refrigerator to thaw and not at room temperature. Baked refrigerator and drop cookies thaw rapidly as they are thin so unwrap them to thaw. Other kinds thaw in original containers

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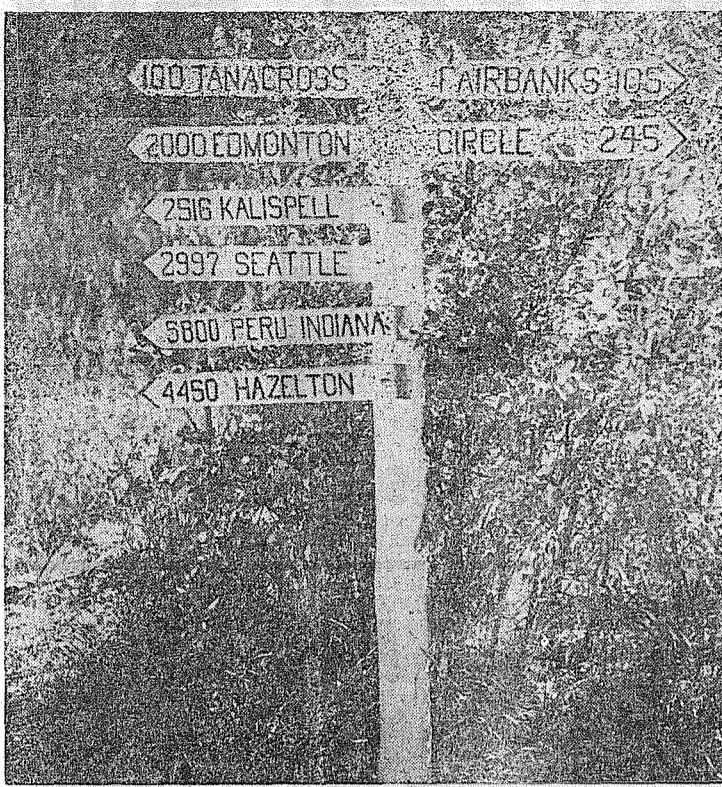

TRAVELING THE ALCAN HIWAY

At milepost 1318 you will reach Tok Junction U.S. Customs and Immigration offices. Hours are from 8 a.m. til 10 p.m., Alaska time. You must stop here and receive clearance to proceed on into Alaska. You'll find the officers courteous and ready to welcome you to Alaska. You'll receive a bumper strip to place on your car showing that you are an Alaskan visitor. Most tourists ask for a second one; one to place on their car while in Alaska and one to show the folks back home. Don't hesitate to ask for a second one. The officers are used to the request.

At Tok Junction the Glenn Highway turns off to your left for 328 miles to Anchorage. In this series of articles we will continue on the Alcan towards Fairbanks then return you to Tok Junction and cover the Glenn Highway to Anchorage and on to Seward.

At milepost 1327 you will reach the Tanacross Junction. A 2 mile side trip to your right will bring you to Tanana River and an old airport. Across the river you will see the old Indian village of St. Timothy's located on the Eagle trail to Valdez. The white men have long since given up the use of this trail but not so the Indians, who still prefers to travel off the highway whenever possible.

At milepost 1398 you cross the Big Gerstle River bridge and enter the Mt. Blair and Mt. Hayes game reserve where the Alaska Game Commission is experimenting with the raising of Buffalo. With luck you may spot one near enough to the road to enable you to snap a picture.

At milepost 1425 you reach Big Delta Junction. The above photo shows a sign post erected here, and we expect in all seriousness, for the mileages shown are reasonably accurate. At this point the Alcan Highway actually ends, for the balance of the distance to Fairbanks is covered over the Richardson Highway, constructed some time in the early 20's, and your next mileposts read 99, 98, 97, etc., indicating the remaining distances to Fairbanks.

From now on it will seem to be a crazy mixed up world. 24 hours of daylight, small planes flying around at all hours, people out on lakes fishing at 1 a.m., bars going full blast all night, weekdays or not, children playing outside at 2 a.m., etc. In Alaska with it's three months of summer and long hours of daylight, people seem to be trying to make the most of it cramming a full month's living into a couple of weeks.

Now you'll really see where bringing food from the States with you will give you added savings on your trip, for with the long hours you'll probably be eating 4 meals a day instead of 3. Before you leave, stock up at the

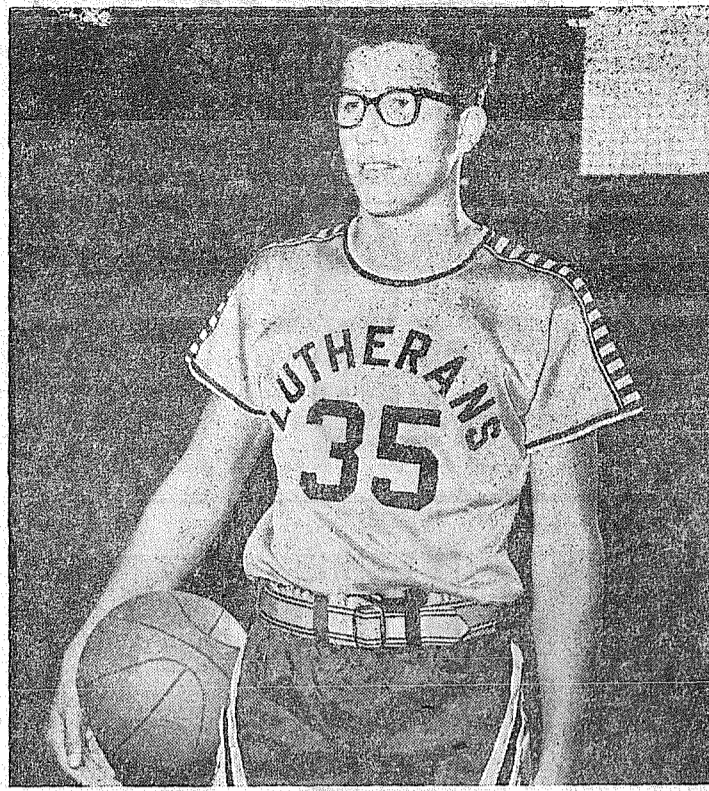

But we will see Friday night if he really knows what he was saying or if it was just propaganda.

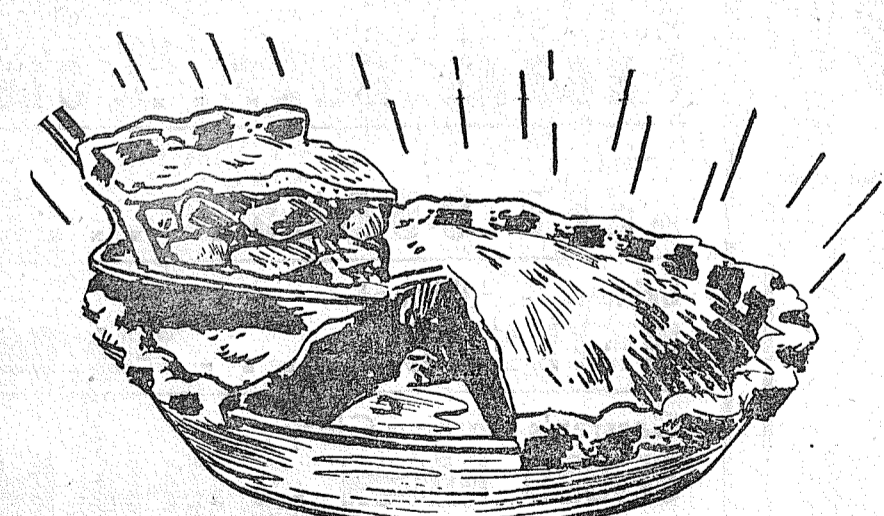
The mad scramble in the West Central league should start to untangle now that the loop games will be in full force.

Auto Insurance Rates To Rise; More Care Urged

According to recently published reports, automobile drivers in Washington and other Western States soon will receive an increase in auto insurance rates.

In checking into the reasons for such increases, we find that traffic accidents have increased substantially in our state during the past year. With 376 persons killed, fatalities from automobile accidents were up 15% for the first nine months of 1956 compared with the same period of 1955.

The number of traffic accidents on the west coast has increased every month for the past 18 months.

Here's the record for Washington state, for the first 9 months of 1956 compared with the same period of 1955:

*Traffic deaths up 14.3 per cent for a total of 375.

*Injury accidents up 7.5 per cent for a total of 15,432.

*Property damage accidents up 4.5 per cent for a total of 53,652.

Even more startling than the rise in the number of accidents is the cost of paying the claims resulting from them. The average award to persons injured in traffic accidents has jumped over 200% in the past few years, and the cost of settling claims has increased 41% in the past five years.

It costs more to repair damaged cars, too. Today's swept-up rear fenders, fancy grills, wrap-around windshields and other style changes all add to the cost of repairs and replacements. For example, a windshield that used to cost only ten or twelve dollars to replace can easily run as much as \$125 today.

The money to pay for these increasing and more costly accidents can only come from one source — insurance premiums, yours and mine. We all share in the responsibility of traffic safety, and we all must bear the consequences of our mounting highway toll. In a sense, our own "chickens" are coming home to roost.

The way to prevent further increases in auto insurance rates, and to bring about lower rates is clearly before us. Extra care in our driving during 1957 can mean more money in our pockets—as well as fewer injured people—during 1958.
