PARKLAND COMMUNITY CLUB WILL RECOGNIZE VOLUNTEER SERVICE

Parkland's Volunteer Fire Department will be honored at the meeting of the Parkland Community Club on the night of Thursday, November 14, it was announced this week by President Herbert Socolofsky. "This community owes a great debt to these men for the fine service they have unselfishly given, and an outpouring of citizens should greet the firemen that night," Socolofsky said.

Upon arriving at the Parkland school where the meeting will be held, those attending will be able to inspect the new fire truck as it will be parked at the school entrance. Then during the meeting members of the department will be introduced and a question period is planned so that all phases of the operation of the fire department can be explained. Fire Commissioners Clarence Marsh, Fred Danielson and Fritz Beitz will be present to tell about the Fire Protection District setup.

Almost as important as the visiting firemen will be the awarding of some fine door prizes. WINCO LEAD LOST BY P.L.C.

Lutes Knocked Out By 27 To 20 Loss Central Wash. College of Education

Pacific Lutheran College grid-ers were knocked out of the running for the '46 Winco championship by a hard-charging Central Washington club in thrilling gridiron battle Saturday night in the Tacoma Stadium. The score was 27-20.

The Wildcats came from behind to punch across two sudden scores in the final period to sew up the ball game. Fullback L. G. Carmody, chief Central offensive threat all evening, pitched a flat pass to his brother, halfback Jim, who grabbed the ball on the Lute 20 and ambled across. Central converted to tie the score and minutes later, Quarterback Ed Bartlett ran back a PLC punt 82 yards for the winning score.

The Lutes put on a last minute attack, halfback Don Strandness pitching to end Chuck Loete, that carried to the visitors' 14 before being stopped by a Central interception. The Wildcats thus surged farther ahead of the pursuing Winco pack. The Lutes met West-Town Washington November 16 at Bellingham in their next grid battle.

Home Partially Burned Tuesday

The home of A. E. Atchison, Route 3, Box 731, suffered \$3500 damage when fire broke out in the attic Tuesday noon. Parkland firemen received the call at 12:45 p. m. and both trucks made a quick run. Herb Jenness, fire chief, reported that the fire started from a defect in the attic chimney. The fire damage is reported to be partially covered by insurance.

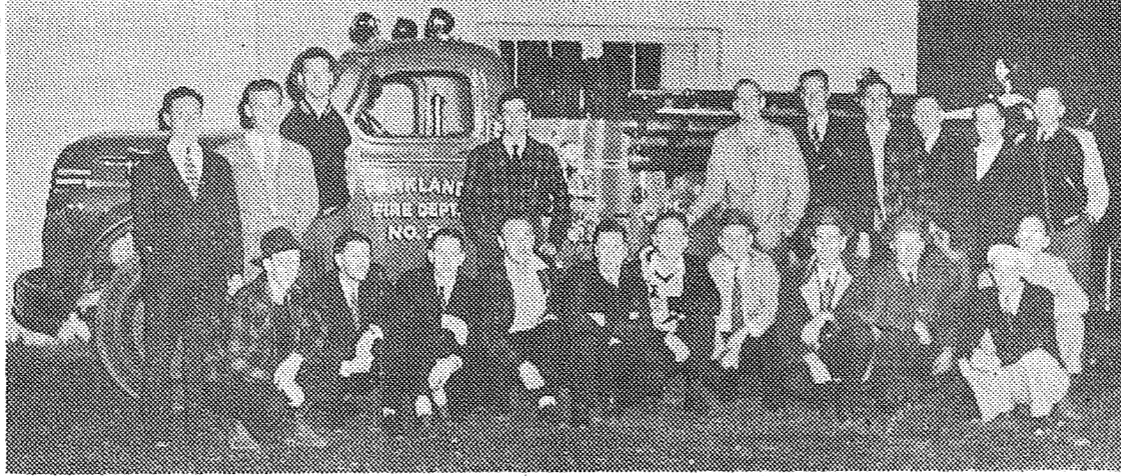
Christian Group Formed at School

MODERN CLINIC FOR THIS AREA

LAKWOOD DOCTORS TO OPEN BRANCH OFFICE AT AIRPORT & PACIFIC

News indicating the growing importance of the South End came this week with the announcement that the Lakewood Clinic is opening a branch at Airport Road and Pacific Avenue. A room 20 x 53 feet in the building next to the Lundberg Drug Store has been leased and is now in the process of becoming a modern doctor's and dentist's quarters. Opening date has been tentatively set for Monday, November 18.

Dr. Marjorie Miller will be the staff physician in charge of the office and will have office hours from 1 to 5 o'clock each afternoon. The quarters will also include a consultation room, two examining rooms, a recovery room and reception room. There will also be an ultra-modern dentist's office which Dr. Harold J. Leraas will occupy shortly after the first of the year. Dr. Leraas is well known in Parkland as he was a professor of biology at Pacific Lutheran College a few years ago.

On July 14 of this year the new Lakewood Clinic was opened at Lakewood Center by Drs. Lawrence E. Skinner and Richard I. Rich. The growing list of patients there attests to the thoroughness of treatment and the many persons who are going there from this area prompted the doctors to open a branch office in the Parkland area. Cases needing x-ray and other major treatment will be handled at Lakewood after preliminary diagnosis here.

Office hours and treatment facilities of the local branch will be increased as the need arises, according to Drs. Skinner and Rich.
