#### You and Tragedy

Auto accidents now are exacting an enormous toll of human lives, and the state highway department is pleading with motorists to drive carefully and observe all the rules of the road. To bring home the seriousness of the situation the department has asked newspapers of the state to publish the following editorial. It speaks for itself.

Let's suppose you and your wife and your two little boys plan a picnic in the mountains next Sunday. Maybe you'll drive up toward Mt. Rainier. The outing will be fun, and you'll forget some of your every-day worries in the pleasure of watching the boys run and romp and play until they're so tired they can't even wiggle.

Now you're ready for the late afternoon ride back home. You plan to drive safely, thinking of the welfare of yourself, your wife and the two little boys curled up together on the back seat. So you drive 30 to 40 miles per hour.

Along the mountain highway you meet an oncoming string of cars, and you remark to your wife that there are a lot of autos on the highway now, and that it's a great wonder there are not more accidents.

Suddenly there is a sickening pain in your stomach and your arms go numb. One of the cars has pulled out into your lane of traffic, trying to pass another car. The scene in front of you seems to spin. You see the flashing windshield of the oncoming car, the whiteness of the little bridge ahead of you, the little green slope of the precipitous ditch to your right.

You see another car three feet in front of you.

And so you let loose of the steering wheel and throw your arms around your wife in the hopes of protecting her. In that split second before things black out, you wonder if this is the last time you'll hold Tuesday, September 3. Luncheon your wife in your arms. You think about 30 or 40 miles per hour being will be served at 12:30. Mrs. Anna a safe driving speed. You think: "Why did he try to pass? Couldn't he see me coming?'

Then you begin to hear strange voices—voices you've never heard before. You begin to see a red glow-somewhere-is it in front of your eyes? You don't seem to be lying in bed. Sharp pebbles hurt your back.

"Don't move them," someone says.

You open your eyes, finally, and see strange faces above you. People tower over you, like the tall, still pine trees at the picnic ground you left a few minutes before. You try to move your arms and can't. They must be broken. You try to move your legs and can't. You look down at them. They're crumpled and bloody. The pain hasn't started

Then-and you hear yourself gasp-you turn your head. One of the little boys is crying and screaming: "Mother!" There is a little bundle under a blanket. That must be the other one.

"Mother! You turn your head to the other side. You feel blood trickling warmly down your neck. Your wife opens her eyes, and immediately begins the most awful screaming you ever heard. She grips her chest.

Your own words cannot be heard above her screaming. You tryso hard-to tell them . . . or ask them. You're sick, and you don't know what you're trying to say. The screaming goes on and on. You measure your breathing with her screams. Cars are gathering. You lack, all of 84th and Golden Given hear them slow to a stop. You hear the doors close. You hear people mumbling: "What happened?" "What happened?" They walk up, one by one and look down at you. You see their lips curl back, and they tide provided them with a large turn away quickly, saying: "Oh-h-h-h!"

You hear a siren. The white and black state patrol slides up. Patrolmen Eminger and Sultz step out. You want to motion toward your wife and you want to tell them to do something for her. She's screaming yet. Each terrible scream tortures your pained body. You want to tell Sultz and Eminger it wasn't your fault.

There are other sirens. White ambulances arrive. The attendants and the patrolmen are deciding which of you should go to the hos- ing poles and rifles for bear.

"I think she's the worst off," Sultz says quietly. "Take her to the Community Hospital. Better take the little boy—just the one—to the Sanitarium. The other one's . . ." his words trail off in a mumble and you can't hear what he's saying. "We'll radio in for doctors."

Eminger heads for the patrol car. "I'll call in for morphine."

"We'll try to bring the fellow in," Sultz says. "The fellow"—that's you. You're the fellow who looks up at a

perfect stranger and begins to cry like a baby, mumbling: "Whywhy did it happen? Why did it happen! Why did it happen!"

It's too late for you to do anything about it then. But it isn't now. You've got a whole week before that Sunday trip. Imagine yourself a few minutes after the accident. Would you complain if you knew state patrolmen were conducting a safety check of cars? Would you complain if they gave you and others a ticket for speeding? Would you complain if you, and others, had to get your brakes relined? Would you blame your police officer, your state patrolman, your local court, if you, or your best friend, were fined for drunken driving?

In that moment, after the accident, you'd unhesitatingly call the drunken driver and the careless driver murderers. If you had a gun in your hand you'd turn it on the man who pulled out of line in front of you. Your wife's screams would make you do that.

Well, you're lucky. You have some time left to fight for safer highways. That irresponsible, careless driver-that murderer of the highway-hasn't pulled out in front of you yet. You still have a chance to help your state patrolman and your policeman to get him.-John W. Buchanan, Editorial Writer, "Boulder Daily Camera."-6-18-46.

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
