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**Pioneer Washington Newspapers;
How They Helped the Early Settlers**

By MILDRED JARRELL

This is the first in a series of articles describing early newspapers. Story of the first newspaper in the state is told this week.

That the early newspapers had a big share in the development of Washington is evident upon examination of their contents. Since September 11, 1852, when the first newspaper was established here, the romance of a new, untried country has been heralded to the east—the story of the immigrants who followed the Oregon Trail, their laughter and their tears, failures and triumphs.

The first newspaper, The Columbian, used an old Ramage press which had worked its way up the Pacific coast from Mexico to Monterey, San Francisco and Portland before Mary Taylor brought it to Olympia. After its days of usefulness to Thornton McElroy and J. W. Wiley of the Columbian, it was used by other publishers in printing their earliest papers, and it is now one of the most valued relics in the Washington University museum.

Populates Country

The Columbian played a vital role in populating this section. The style of writing was informal, friendly, and full of rich phrases. This is easily seen from the first editorial which told its readers that all the good claims south of the Columbia river had been taken, but north of the river there were thousands of acres of choice land just waiting for the "subduing hands of agriculturists."

In the same issue it pointed out that vessels could save from \$500 to \$800 for pilotage and towage by
