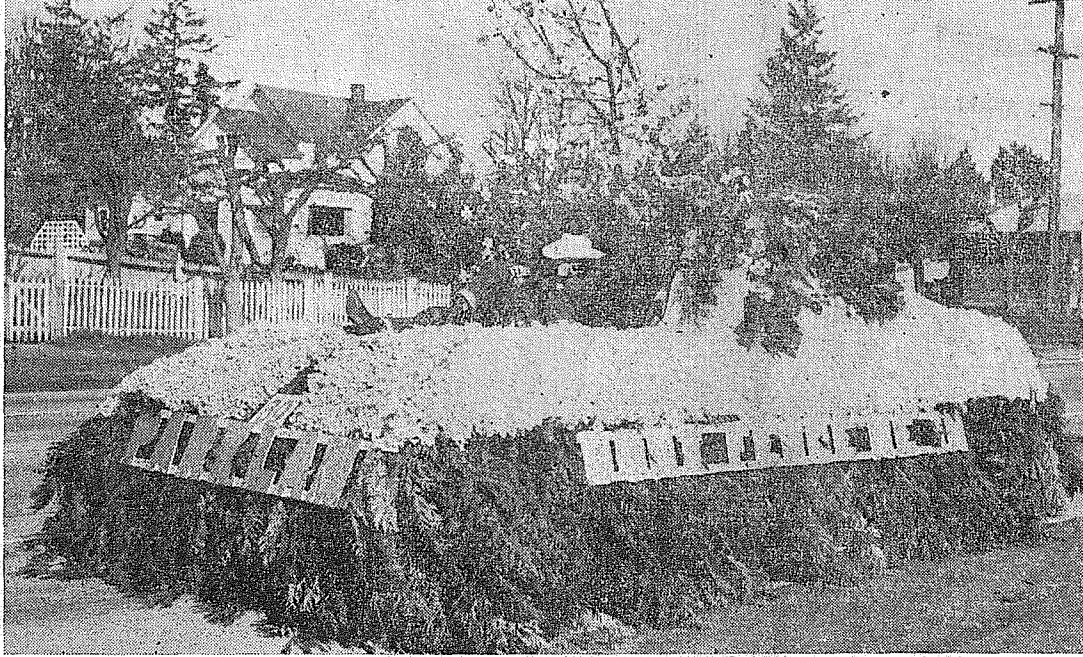

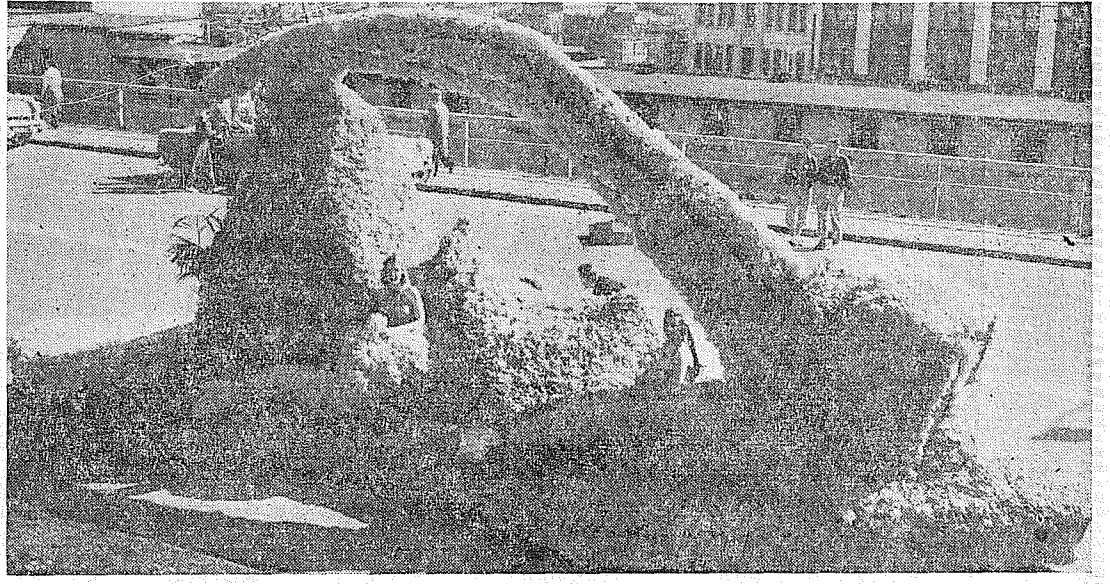

Polio Clinics Immunize Many Youngsters Here

Enthusiastic over the success of the first five polio immunization clinics held in the Franklin Pierce school district, those in charge announce that a total of 2010 children had been given the shots. The project is sponsored by the school district, the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department, the local medical society and the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis. The vaccine was provided by Federal funds and all shots were free to the children.

The five clinics and the number of shots given at each were: April 2, Harvard-Midland, 408; April 4, Central Avenue and Collins, 353; April 9, Franklin Pierce high school and Parkland Junior high, 690; April 11, Parkland elementary, Marymount Academy and Concordia Lutheran, 361.

A second round of clinics will follow in four weeks. Students who missed the first shot may start the series at the second clinics but will then have to get their second shots from their family doctor or at the Health Department at 24th and Pacific Ave.

Local physicians who volunteered their services for the clinics were Doctors R. B. Link, A. B. Heaton, Arnold Hermann, William Sullivan, D. P. Butteroff and Ted Apa.

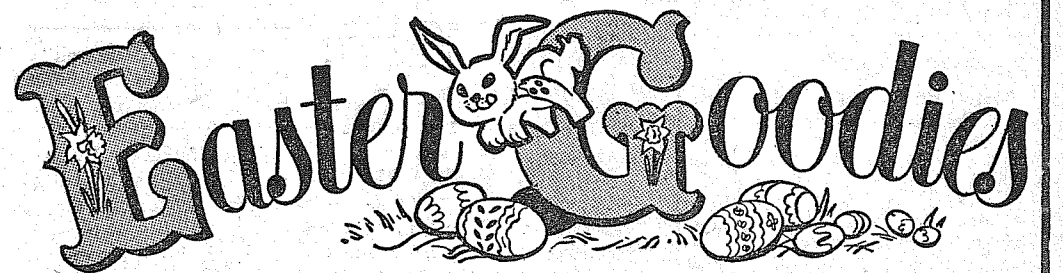

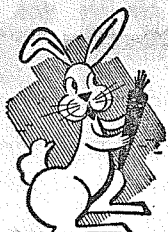

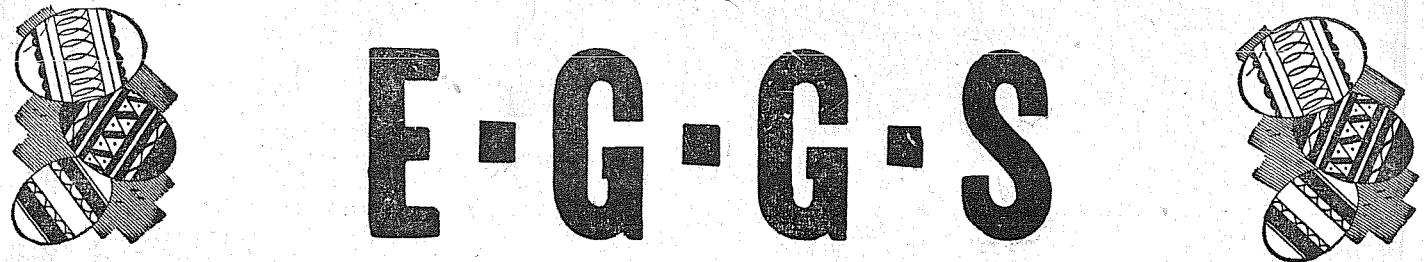

By international law it was allowed asylum for 72 hours; during this time the Germans tried to sabotage and scuttle the ship as it left port. She was taken by Uruguay and later bought by the United States Navy, repaired and then became a troop carrier. It carried 5,000 combat troops and their equipment plus 300 cabin passengers.

The club members enjoyed the U.S.S. Gurnard, a submarine. It is permanently based here at Tacoma for training purposes.

After the tour of the ships, we had our lunch ("chow down" in the Navy). It was the regular food for the day. But as the boy members so aptly put it, "if this is regular chow—the Navy's for me!"

Local eyes will be on John Fromm, NAIA javelin champion, who will lead the Gladiator attack.

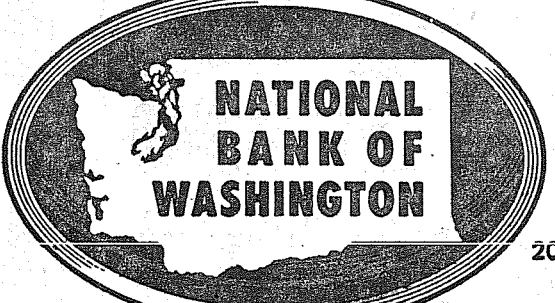

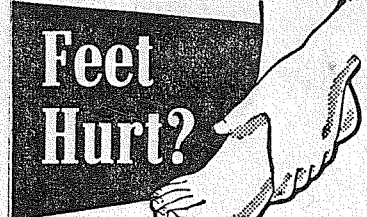
