Spanaway Will Incorporate Its Fire Department

SECOND MEET WILL BE HELD MONDAY NIGHT

OFFICERS ELECTED AT INITIAL SESSION MONDAY NIGHT, OCT. 8

Plans for the incorporation of the Spanaway Fire department were discussed and outlined at the initial meeting of Spanaway business leaders at the office of Delbert Bresemann in Spanaway Park last Monday night.

Citing the need of adequate fire protection, the business leaders convened to lay plans for the expansion of the Spanaway department.

Jim Gray, who was instrumental in calling the initial meeting, was elected chairman at the meeting. John Righetti was elected vice chairman. Herman Fuchs was named secretary and Delbert Bresemann was chosen treasurer.

A committee, selected to draw up by-laws for the incorporation, is composed of the following members: L. R. Baker, chairman; Chet Modahl, Jess Lonergan, and Mr. Van Dyke.

Chief McCarthy of McChord Fire Department and Roy Peterson, chief of the Parkland department, were present and spoke briefly on steps necessary to organize a department.

A second meeting of the group has been called for Monday night, October 15, at 7:30 p. m. The group will again meet in the office of Delbert Bresemann.

"Since this program concerns everyone in Spanaway, everyone should make it a point to turn out for the meeting," appealed Chairman Gray. "We are undertaking this project as we feel it is urgently needed at Spanaway. Every loyal citizen should attend the meeting."

The purpose of the meeting is to finalize plans made at the first meeting. Then an effort will be made to have a mass meeting in the Spanaway school for community approval.

PARKLAND CLUB MEETS TONIGHT

HOUSE ASSIGNMENT NUMBERS WILL BE AVAILABLE AT MEET

Every home owner who can possibly attend the meeting of the Parkland Community club should be on hand tonight (Thursday). Starting at 8 o'clock in the Parkland school, G. E. McMasters, planning engineer for the County Planning Commission, will be on hand to assign numbers to homes, providing the owner brings along a legal description of the property.

Mr. McMasters will have his maps of this area at hand, and be prepared to give quick service. However, he pointed out that a correct description of the property is imperative and this can best be obtained from an old tax statement. Any other legal description will do, however. One other important item is to know which lot or lots a house is situated on if there are several lots included in the description. McMasters stated that numbers will be issued to every 25-foot lot.

President Carl Anderson of the Community Club announced that a complete report would be available on the fire district, as proposed by the Parkland Civic club.

"I hope we will have another good attendance," said Mr. Anderson. "We have some important business coming up that should merit the presence of every Parkland resident."

IS 13 LUCKY?

Mabel Hess of Spanaway Writes An Interesting Article About Number

It would seem that the number thirteen, so long a bugaboo to some folks, has sort of had its fate lifted - - - so to speak, when we consider the many prominent places it figures in our United States Seal, and not only there, but other important places as well.


For instance, the Great Seal on the back of the comparatively new type of bills. Oddly enough, this reverse side of the seal had never made its public debut until these new bills came out.

The obverse side of the seal, which all of us know by sight, depicts an American eagle, with wings, talons and tailfeathers outspread. On the bird's breast, stands the shield of red and white with the blue field above; the eagle's right talon holds an olive branch, and the left a number of arrows, while in its beak is encircled the motto - E Pluribus Unum - meaning "one out of many."

Now the escutcheon on the breast of the eagle contains 13 stripes; there are 13 arrows in one talon, 13 leaves on the olive branch as well as 13 olives on the branch. There are 13 little stars comprising the larger star in the glory cloud above the motto, which contains 13 letters.

The Seal's reverse side also is replete with significance of the number 13. The great pyramid of Gizeh at the mouth of the Nile river in Egypt, is spoken of in the scriptures as a witness - and this being on the back of our billissemes to link the past with the present as well as the future, for the inscription Annuu Geopitis has 13 letters in it and means "He has favored our undertakings" while the scroll at the foot of the pyramids reads "Novus Ordo Seclorum" which means "A new order of the ages." The pyramid of Gizeh is built on an

At the present time the home owners can contact the Pierce County Planning Commission in the Tacoma Courthouse or attend the Community Club meeting tonight. All that is necessary to obtain the numbers is an accurate description of the property on which the house is located. An old tax receipt will give the required information.

Homes without numbers are not only a poor advertisement for strangers coming into our community to locate individuals, but are also a handicap to the home owners in time of fire. If every house would be numbered, it would be so much easier to locate the fires.

Surely no one living in this community will argue against the numbering of homes. Everyone must be in favor of the move. Therefore, everyone, without fail, should contact the Pierce County Planning Commission at once to secure the numbers.

There is a lot of sand and the beaches are fine. The land is covered with brush and woods, except where it has been cleared for farming, which is not too successful as the soil is not good. There is a lot of game. Saturday we saw four deer along the roadside, and yesterday we saw two on our way to a country church. All men seem to be hunters, and many are fishermen. Yesterday afternoon, Sunday, people sat close together for blocks along both banks of the river where it flows through the city and most of them were catching fish.

Greetings to all our friends. We remember with gratitude the many expressions of friendship and helpful interest that we received before we left, and treasure every word we have received since coming here.
