Trinity Lutheran Rally Day, Sunday

Not Just A Preliminary!

Qualified voters will go to the polls next Tuesday to participate in this year's fiery Primary Election. But, as in past campaigns, too many voters who are qualified in all but realization of the true importance of the primary election will neglect to vote.

Failure to read the full meaning of the term "primary" as it links with the ballot is unfortunately common. First glance at a dictionary will show primary election defined as "a preliminary election." But the word primary has other meanings than "first in order of time or development." It also can mean "first in importance."

First in importance—here is a pertinent description of a primary election occurring in a presidential election year, as this is. When a national chief executive is to be chosen, candidates for that office receive a disproportionate share of public attention. Other contests are obscured and the tendency is strong on final election day to fill lesser offices with those who wear the party tag of the presidential favorite.

It is only in the primary election the many candidates for the numerous county, state and other national offices stand or fall on their own merits. So it is that, particularly in a presidential year, the primary election ranks "first in importance" for choosing the truly able to conduct local government business, fill exacting state posts and write national policy in the Congress.



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

As the Saturday, September 11, special election date approaches, voters of this area are subjected to a barrage of facts dinned at them from all sides by those of us who are making an all-out effort to put over the proposition for a school addition. Every effort is being made to avoid the hazard of an insufficient vote, since it is felt that the measure will be given overwhelming favor of those who do go to the polls.

That the Midland grade school building is more than 65 years old; that it houses over 200 pupils—our children—and is a veritable fire trap in imminent danger of being condemned. That we have a present building fund of \$13,000 and that a 20-mill levy for one year will raise an additional \$12,000, which funds will be matched by the State on a basis of \$3 to \$1.

Get the voters to the polls on Saturday is the watchword.
