San Jose, California — 1/1/56 — A flying saucer over San Jose was reported by Starr Henderson, 19, a Marine Air Reservist, from his home in the East Foothills on February 1, 1956. A neighboy boy, Cliff Furlow, 16, called Henderson's attention to the object about 9:07 p.m. Henderson, his family, and neighbors then watched the strange object travel "far in excess of the speed of sound" east over Mount Hamilton Range and "probably over the San Joaquin Valley." In about half a minute it had returned and streaked intermittently faster then slower east across the heart of San Jose to the Santa Cruz Mountains. In the area of Saratoga, it made a loop and headed toward San Francisco and out of sight and hearing. Henderson said he believed it might have been some type of guided rocket and that the bright orange-white light it bore in its front might have been its exhaust flame because it dimmed when 10,000 feet in the air.


