A dog recognizes sounds not words and may completely misunderstand the meaning if the inflection of a command is changed. My vocabulary of whistle signals is limited to three.

1)—two short blasts to send the dog on after a point and shot. II birds are dropped, this signal sends the dogs in to retrieve. If there was no kill, the same signal gives the dog permission to move from his point and go on hunting. It is used, also, to urge the dog on, when he has made a point but does not appear positively to have located his game.

2)—a long, loud note to attract the dog's attention so that I may change his course in the field. As I give the signal, I head my horse in the direction I want him to go. He knows that he is to keep out in front and swings around in the new direction of my mount. Hand waving signals from horseback often are useless because the dog is too far away to see them plainly.

When hunting on foot, I also wing my dog—after getting his attention with the whistle—by walking in the direction I want him to take. The dog usually is close enough for me to amplify my command by a wave

If a dog is lost, I use exactly the same whistle. He knows it is my command for him to get in touch with me. I give the signal several times at reasonable intervals and watch for him to appear for directions on some near-by hilltop. If he

doesn't show up, he's pretty sure to be on point and I go looking for him. a long low note to call the dog in to look for marked singles or a dead bird. If he is to retrieve crippled or dead game, I give him the added commend, "dead bird" which tells him the kind of close work he
