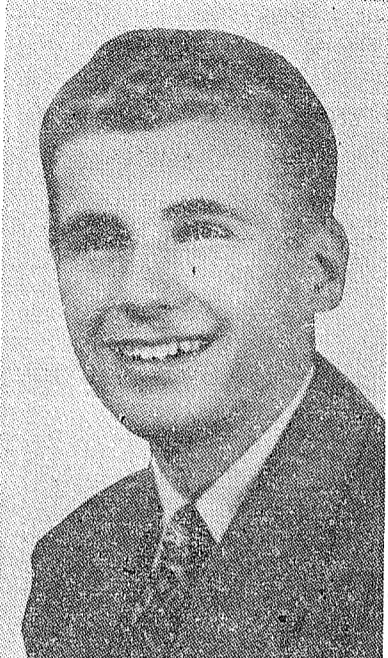

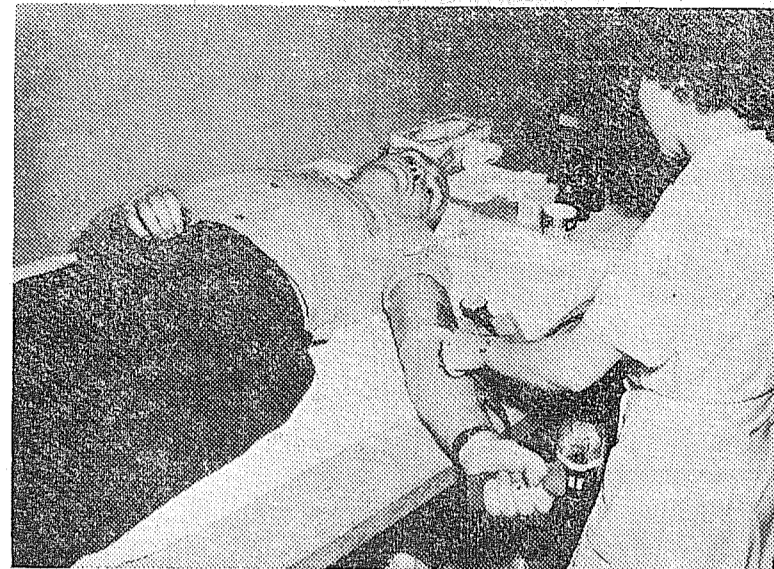

Fifty-six area businessmen attended the last meeting of the Kiwanis club, which is rapidly taking the lead in community service and enterprise.

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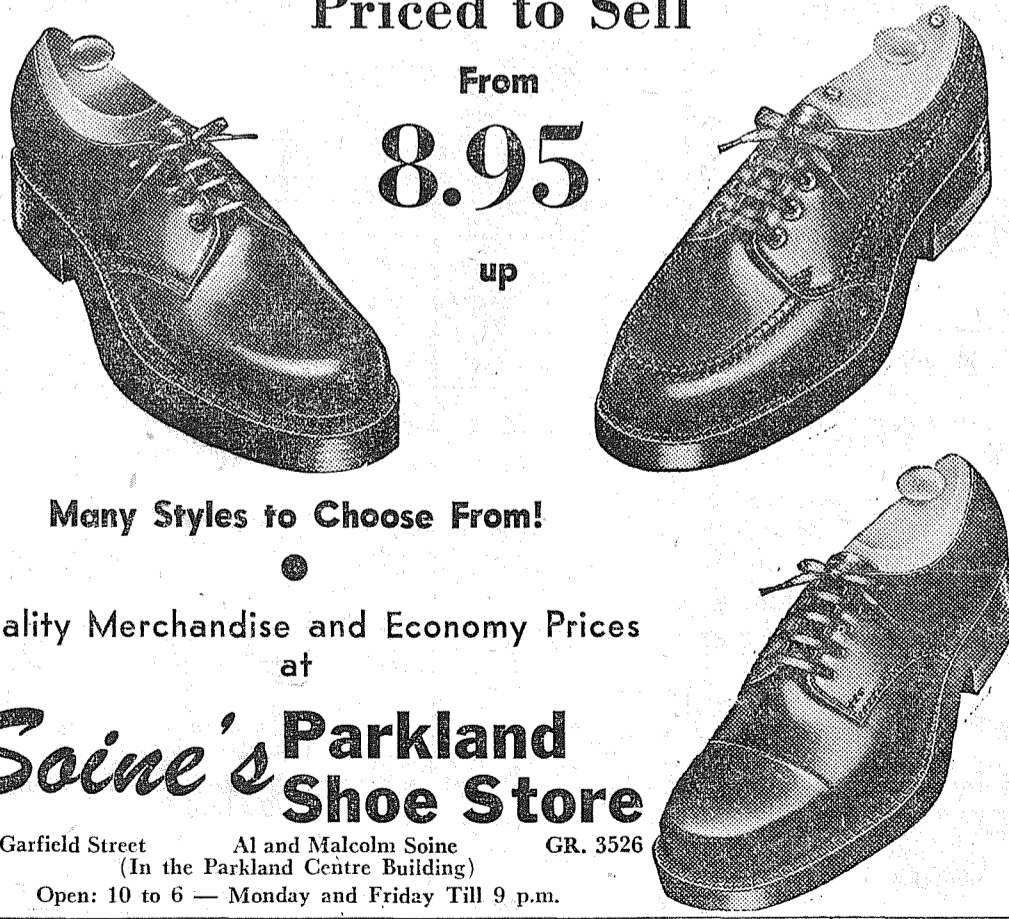
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## PARKLAND PLANS DECORATIONS FOR HOLIDAY SEASON

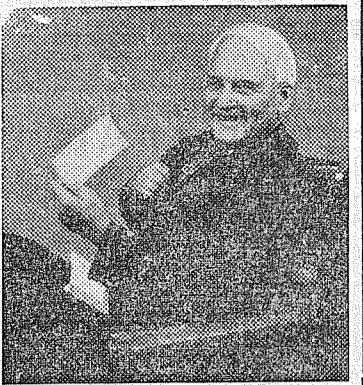
Washington Governor's Mounted Guard Meet

**Gingerbread Men**  
2 1/4 cups sifted, all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon ginger  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup molasses  
1/4 cup Pet Milk  
Sift together into bowl flour, sugar, ginger, cinnamon, soda and salt. Work shortening into flour mixture with fork. Mix molasses and milk. Stir gradually into flour, mixing until smooth. Roll 1/2 in. thick on lightly floured board. Cut with floured gingerbread-man cutter about 4 1/2 in. high. Put on greased baking sheet. Garnish with red cinnamon candies. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 12 min., or until light brown. Makes 3 dozen.

## Spurs To Sponsor Blood Bank After Vacation

### University of Oslo Offers Courses

The University of Oslo will hold its sixth Summer School from June 21 to August 2, 1952, for American and Canadian students who have completed at least their freshman year in any accredited college or university. A special feature of the 1952 session will be an Institute for English-speaking Teachers similar to the one held in 1951.

The university provides outstanding lecturers and maintains highest educational standards. All classes will be conducted in English and an American Dean of Students is on the administrative staff.

Students may choose courses in four fields: (a) General Survey of Norwegian Culture; (b) The Humanities; (c) Social Studies; (d) Education System of Norway.

Single students will live in the Blindern Students Hall and married couples in private homes. Six semester-hour credits may be earned in the six weeks course and the session is approved by the U. S. Veterans Administration. Applicants should have completed their freshman year not later than June, 1952. A limited number of scholarships are available for the Summer School.

Students of the Summer School will leave New York on the SS Stavangerfjord, June 11, 1952. Reservations for the return trip are available August 5, 19, and September 2, 1952.

PLC's Student Union building will be transformed into a blood bank on December 12 and 13, when students will contribute to the Pierce County Blood Bank, which will temporarily set up headquarters here. The dates for the bank are tentative. At least 100 pints of blood for the armed forces is the goal of the Spur-sponsored blood bank.

The blood will be shipped for processing the day after it has been drawn. Then it will be sent to the armed forces in Korea for use.

#### Committees Named

Spurs has set up the following committees to aid the technicians and nurses and to prepare the SUB for the blood bank: Hall committee, Letterman's Club; refreshments committee, Audrey Engstrom, chairman; reservation committee, Janet Carson, chairman; secretarial committee, Judy Bargman, chairman. Publicity will be handled by Joanne Schwartzwalter, Miss Blomquist is the faculty adviser.

Prospective donors under the age of 21 must have a signed form from their parents before they may contribute blood. The proper forms will be distributed before Thanksgiving vacation so each student may take them home. The whole process, from the time the contributor is given the predonation glass of fruit juice to the coffee and cookies he receives after having given his blood and rested, takes approximately one hour. Tentative time for the blood bank is from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Booklets describing the process of donating blood will be available in the library next week.

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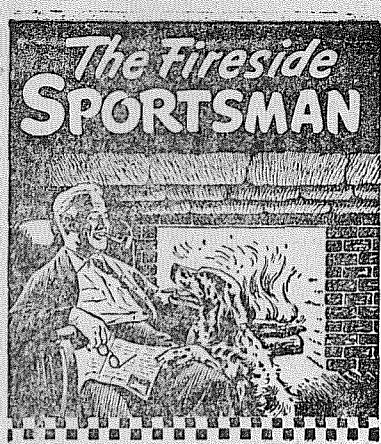

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### Teach a FEW Signals WELL

The handler who has only a few commands to use in directing his dog will have more success than the man who tries to use many.

The dog's ability to learn is limited. He must be taught to recognize and obey every command that is given. Obviously, a dog that is perfectly schooled in a few commands will be easier to direct than one that is only partially trained in several. When directions are decided upon, they should always be given in just the same words and tone of voice or whistle.

A dog recognizes sounds not words and may completely misunderstand the meaning if the inflection of a command is changed. My vocabulary of whistle signals is limited to three.

1)—two short blasts to send the dog on after a point and shot. If birds are dropped, this signal sends the dogs in to retrieve. If there is no kill, the same signal gives the dog permission to move from his point and go on hunting. It is used, also, to urge the dog on, when he has made a point but does not appear positively to have located his game.

2)—a long, loud note to attract the dog's attention so that I may change his course in the field. As I give the signal, I head my horse in the direction I want him to go. He knows that he is to keep up in front and swing around in the new direction of my point. Hand waving signals from horseback often are useless because the dog is too far away to see them plainly.

When hunting on foot, I also wing my dog—after getting his attention with the whistle—by walking in the direction I want him to take. The dog usually is close enough for me to amplify my command by a wave of the hand.

If a dog is lost, I use exactly the same whistle. He knows it is my command for him to get in touch with me. I give the signal several times at reasonable intervals and watch for him to appear for directions on some near-by hilltop. If he doesn't show up, he's pretty sure to be on point and I go looking for him.

3)—a long low note to call the dog in to look for marked singles or a dead bird. If he is to retrieve crippled or dead game, I give him the added command, "dead bird" which tells him the kind of close work he should be doing.

### Fireworks in November

Fireworks was both the subject of discussion and the state of affairs at the County Courthouse last Monday when a public hearing was held by the county commissioners in regards to the proposed ban on fireworks in the county.

The meeting place was soon too small for the crowd with the result that it was moved into the courtroom where everyone capable of talking let forth with their reasons, either for or against the ban.

Foremost object of the majority, it proved was the attempt to place a ban on the sale of fireworks in the county areas, where prior to the meeting it was legal to sell or buy fireworks.

Opposing the ban, of course, were those who made a living from the sale of fireworks or their related business.

The session lasted about three hours with both sides pointing out the reasons for and against the ban. Those favoring the ban included quite a list of notables including the fire departments of both city and county, with the thought injected that considerable amount of fire damage resulted from the discharge of fireworks. Tacoma's fire chief noted that 24 fires in Tacoma last year were a direct result of the discharge of fireworks, where actually both the sale and discharge of fireworks is outlawed. Outside the county, the State Forestry department revealed that some 57 fires resulted from persons being careless with fireworks. These were some of the reasons given for the ban. The Humane Society representatives pointed out from the viewpoint of cruelty to dogs, cats and other animals that the sale should be banned.

To shorten quite a lengthy subject, a motion was finally put in effect which would ban the sale of fireworks in the county. The report of the State Safety council had considerable influence bearing on the final decision of the commissioners.

Commissioner Sprinker is to be commended in his fine handling of a hot subject. It was quite evident that he had the situation well managed throughout the entire hearing. He is also to be commended on his stand. It always takes a good man to make a public decision.

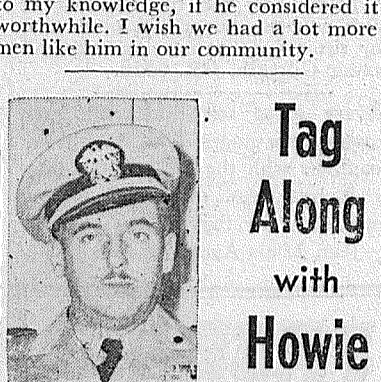
### Regarding Commissioners
