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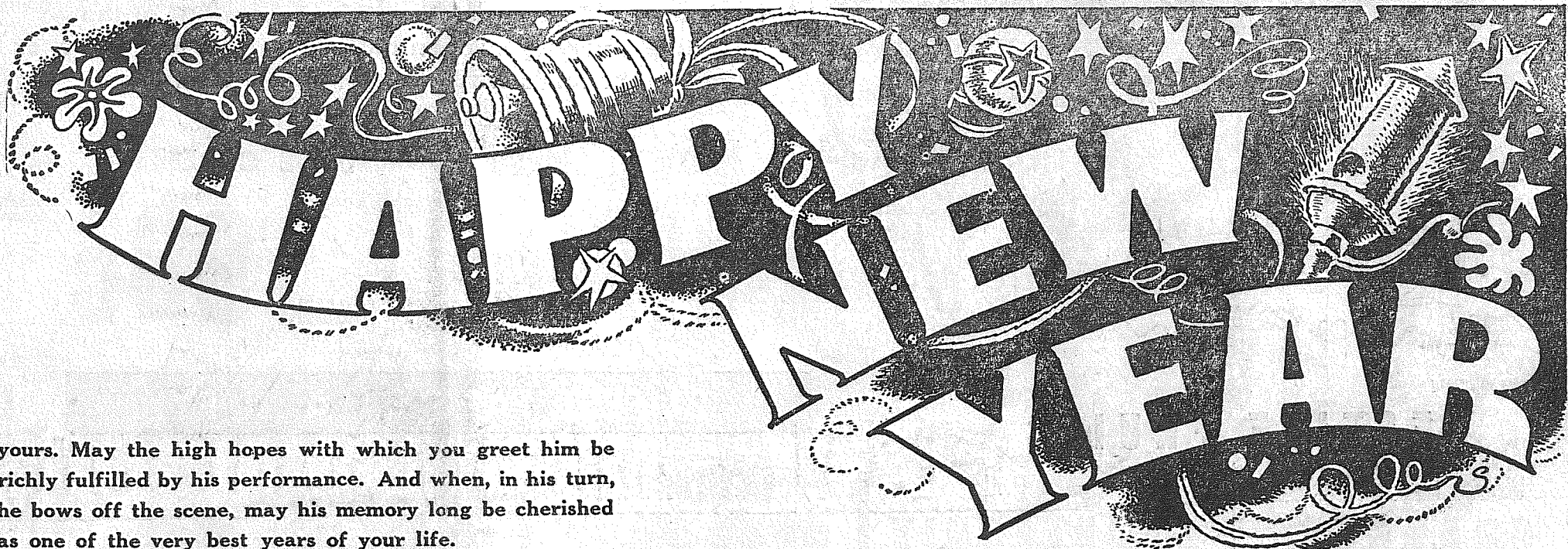

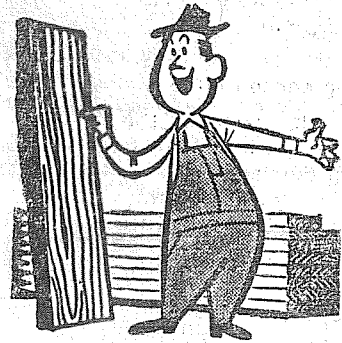

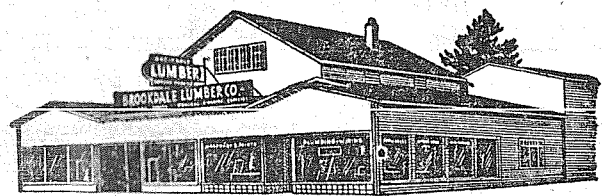

Mass Meeting Called On New Parkland P. O. Site

With interest on the location of Parkland's new post office providing the No. 1 subject of conversation in the community these days, the Parkland Business club has arranged a mass meeting tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 at the grade school. Howie Snowden, Business club president, who considered the popular choice, was not acceptable to the Pierce County Planning Commission because of lack of space for customer parking. The Planning Commission, represented by Director M. G. Poole, stressed the need for more off-the-street parking than this site would afford. John Van Buskirk regional real property manager for the Post Office Department, predicted that the new post office would be built on the Garfield and C Sts. tract, with a fenced-off parking lot for trucks only in the rear.

Present at the meeting will be Tacoma Postmaster Vernon Utzinger and representatives of the Pierce County commissioners the County Planning Commission and the Post Office Department, all ready to answer any questions which may be asked. It is hoped that this mass meeting will result in presenting a clearer picture of the problem to all who will be affected by the final decision.

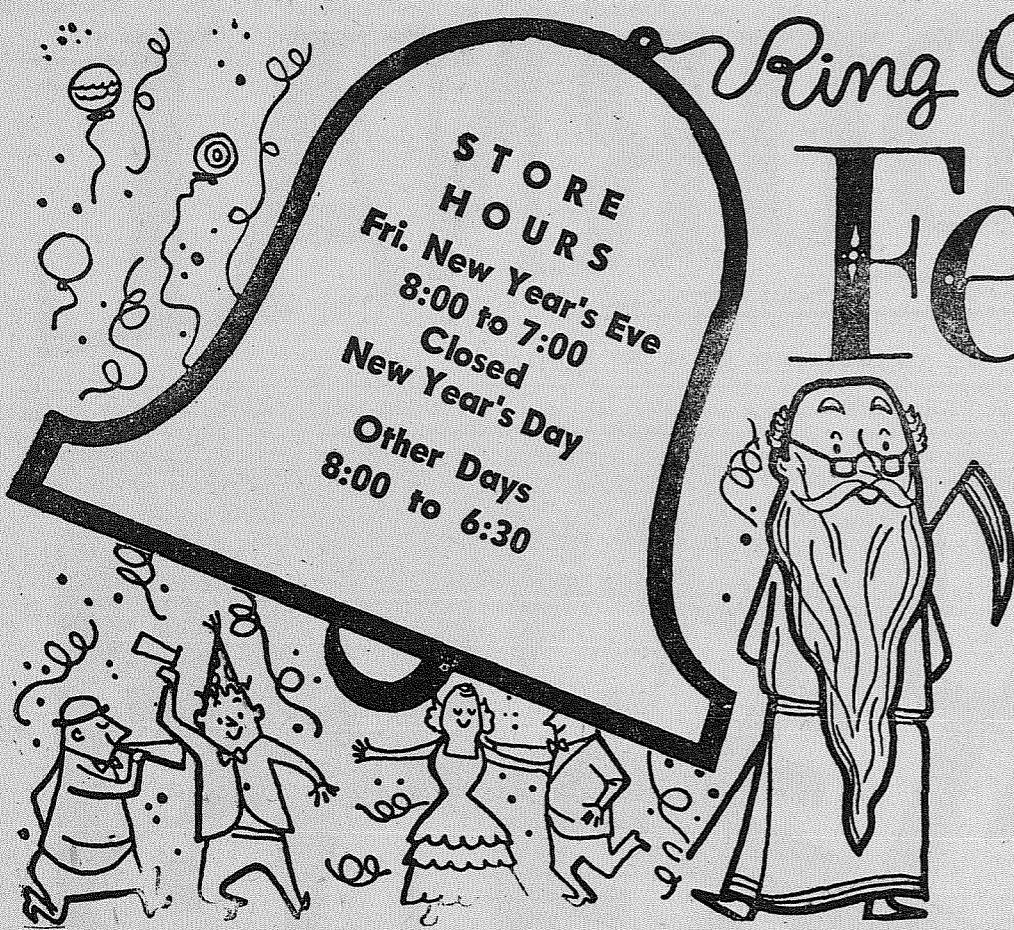

In Our Opinion by DON EASTVOLD A bi-weekly summary of Attorney General's opinions presented in the public interest by this newspaper.

The recent Governor's Safety Conference here in Olympia brought to the attention of this office the fact that two opinions, one released in 1942—the other in 1950—were in conflict.

They both had to do with supplying an answer to this question: Do the statutes authorize a court to suspend the motor vehicle operator's license of a person convicted of negligent driving?

The answer was "no" in 1942 in an opinion issued to the prosecuting attorney of King county. In 1950, the answer was "yes". The author of the opinion in 1950 failed to cite the 1942 opinion.

Our office considered and reviewed each opinion and our answer is "no" as to whether the law allows a court to suspend the license of a driver convicted of negligent driving.

We felt that the opinion written in 1942 was the more accurate interpretation of the law. Thus, we have overruled the 1950 opinion and have so advised Chief James A. Pryde of the Washington state patrol.

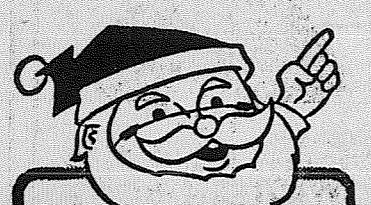

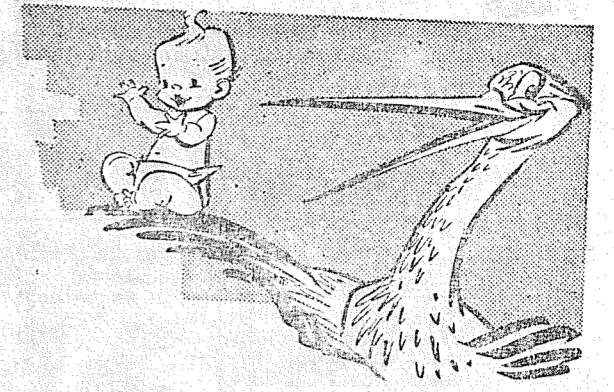

Legume Grass, Best Irrigated Pasture Mix
You can't afford not to include legumes in your irrigated pastures! George Purcell, county Extension agent, says recent research work conducted by Dr. Wilton Heinemann and Bob Van Kauren at WSC's Irrigation Experiment Station, Prosser, emphasizes this point.

average of about 200 pounds per acre. These pastures also received 75 pounds less of available nitrogen per acre than the straight grass pastures.
Work in other states on irrigated pastures has shown an even greater advantage when legumes such as Ladino clover and alfalfa are included in the pasture. The Oregon State experiment station obtained almost twice as much, or 810 pounds of beef per acre from grass and Ladino as compared to 478 pounds of gain on a straight grass pasture.
George Purcell points out that bloat is more of a problem when legumes are included in the pasture mixture. Good management practices, however, can hold this hazard to a minimum. The increase in production will far offset the bloat loss, Purcell says.

Farm Records, Income Tax, Social Security Meetings
Pierce county farmers will have a good chance to pick up some pointers on getting their financial affairs in order Thursday, January 6, 1955.

Ernest I. Hopp, county Extension agent, said today the county-wide meeting on several aspects of farm economics will be held in the Winter School building at the Western Washington Experiment Station, Puyallup, on that date. The session will last from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. o'clock. Arthur J. Cagle, Extension farm management specialist from the state college will be on hand to discuss farm records, income taxes and social security.

Emphasis will be placed on the many very important changes in income tax rulings affecting farmers. Use of farm accounts to simplify income tax reporting will also be stressed. Farmers will also be interested in a boiled-down discussion of the new social security provisions for farmers and how this ties in with farm-record keeping and tax reporting.

One of the things to be discussed in regard to income taxes will be the new rules concerning soil and water conservation which makes it much more attractive for farmers to carry out some of the important conservation practices. Two new methods which will allow depreciation for tax deductions at a much more rapid rate—the so-called declining balance and the sum-of-the-digits methods—will be explained. New provisions concerning youth as dependents regardless of the income, and other changes of importance to farmers will also be considered.

Cagle will illustrate the use of the WSC farm record book as a farm-management and income-tax reporting aid. The book has been especially designed to simplify income-tax reporting and to indicate management practices that will increase the net income. WSC's free farm record analysis will also be explained.

Practically all farmers in the state of Washington will be included in the social security program, beginning January 1. There will be a brief and-to-the-point discussion of the features that affect farmers, the reports required, and the benefits to be provided.

County Agents' Corner

During the holiday season when families are entertaining a great deal this office receives many questions about how to remove candlewax drippings from table linen. Wax stains are not difficult to remove at home and it pays to use the best method on expensive table cloths or mats.

The first step is to scrape the hardened wax from the surface of the cloth gently with a dull knife. Then sponge the stain with cleaning fluid as you would treat any grease spot. This is easier than the familiar method of laying the stained fabric on a blotter and pressing with a warm iron. If any trace of color are left they usually can be removed by sponging with a cloth dipped in a mixture of two parts water to one part rubbing alcohol.

This caution is well to heed: Whenever using cleaning fluid, even a little, use it outdoors or in a well ventilated room.

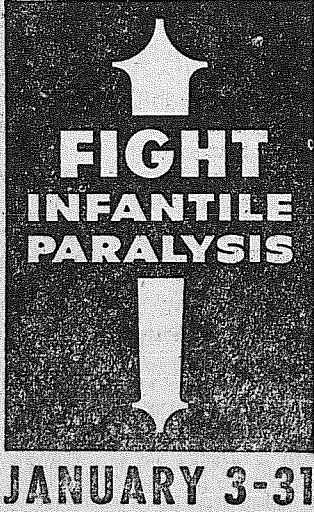
