

CALL FOR SPECIAL ELECTION SOON

The commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 6 (Parkland) announced this week that they would call a special election asking for more funds. E. W. Beitz, Fred Danielson and C. R. Marsh are the commissioners and they have been pondering this matter for some time. The four mill levy that went into effect when the district was formed cannot provide enough funds to put the Parkland Fire Department on a footing that will oring about a large reduction in fire insurance costs. Although one reduction has already been granted by the underwriters, still more can be secured if the proper fire protection equipment is secured, the commissioners assert.

The date for the special election will be announced shortly and a drive is to be put on to get out a large number of voters. Due to a law recently passed by the legislature the Parkland district will have to have an outpouring of 700 voters in order to pass the millage. The Parkland Community clubhas already endorsed the fire commissioners' request for the extra tax money and the members have pledged full support in the campaign for votes.


