The 31st Lacamas Community Fair will be held Saturday, September 10, at the Lacamas School Grounds, fair directors announced last

Founded in 1928, the fair has been an annual event with the exception of the war years. 1966 activities will vary

from lapidary to judo demonstrations and will be highlighted with presentation of 16 trophies. One revolving trophy is awarded annually for the best apple pie. Youth activities will be judged separately from adult work.

The Exhibition Hall will open to the public at 10 a.m. with displays of needlework, arts, crafts, floral, horticulture, homemade garments, bake goods and canned goods. Judging of exhibits will commence at 11 a.m.

During the day, there will be fitting and showing contests for dairy, livestock and horses. Horse and pony performance events are also planned. A produce auction sale will conclude the program at 9:30 p.m.

Throughout the history of the fair, the public has been admitted free. "You can't spend a dime at Lacamas except for something to eat," committee members boast. Expenses have been defrayed by local activities and by the support of businessmen, merchants and individuals.

Exhibits will be received 5 p.m. until 10:30 p.m. September 7 and 8, and 1 p.m. September 9. Livestock exhibitors are asked to have their animals in place for judging by 9 a.m. September 10, Livestock fitting and showing contests include dairy, beef, and goats. Health certificates will be required for cattle.

Fair directors are chairmaned by Dick Thurston.

# July Dairy **Prices Best** In 13 Yrs.

Dairymen serving the Puget Sound market will receive the highest prices paid in over 13 years for their July deliveries of Grade A milk.

According to Nicholas L. Keyock, Market Administrator, the marketwide blend price of \$4.79 is up \$1.01 from last year and the highest level reached since early 1953.

For their July deliveries, dairymen will be paid a minimum of \$4.87 and \$4.05 per cwt., respectively, for base and excess milk testing 3.5% butterfat. The base price is 43¢ above the June level and 98¢ above a year ago. The excess price, highest ever recorded, is 55¢ above last month and \$1.06 over a year ago. Recent order amendments and improved markets, as well as higher Government support levels, are responsible for the improved prices.

An estimated 2,315 producers delivered 109 million pounds of milk to the market during July. Daily receipts averaged 4.6% below those in June and 1.8% below a year

If the cities are given 10% off the top of the State Sales Tax, the effect would more than offset the school gains under SJR 1 and 2. Without taking "sides" in this dilemma, it still is easy to see where it arises. The schools have for years used all their wiles to get voters to tax themselves in increasing amounts for increasing educational needs. They have painted vivid pictures of the shambles which would follow on the heels of any false eco-Qualified as a Legal Publication under Chapter 213 nomh. But NOW, the cities, of the Legislative Acts of the 1941 Regular Session of the whose tax resources also are being rapidly outstripped by their needs, are coming on with virtually the same cry. And their needs are just as real to them and to the voters. So the schools are put in the position of having to either keep quiet or 'bad mouth' the cities. And, if they choose the

> get "bad mouthed" right back. Smaller taxing units frequently run into this type of problem in their special operating and capital fund levies or bond issues. But at the local level the principles of back scratching are more easily employed. A fire district may wait a year for a new truck or work with the school district to get BOTH the truck and a gymnasium. But the state school forces and the municipal leaders enjoy no such opportunity. They are after the same game and the result will be that (1) one or both will lose (2) co-operation will become more difficult and (3) the resulting friction should speed general tax

But tax reform is eyed by many educators as a mixed blessing. True, they would be tickled to death to get out of annual appeals to school district voters for special operating funds and building issues. But tax reform carries with it a lot more than just new methods in the levying and collection of taxes. If the state government is to be charged with collection and distribution, you can be sure that there is going to be a measure more control of

HOW the funds are spent. Both the schools and the cities would lose some of their autonomy in general tax reform, and this is one of the main factors which has kept this year's conflict fairly well under wraps. The cities are going along hoping that Initiative 226 won't get open opposition and the school forces are trying to turn out voters sympathetic to their situation who won't need to have a brick wall hit them. There probably won't be an open 'storm'' this autumn, but there's a wind beginning to sigh through the sycamores.
