Why doesn't your paper print more information of this kind for our district?

I have two questions I would ike cleared up.

First, I have been told the present petition being circulated for consolidation is illegal in that all voters are not contacted. The one circulating petition will stop at one house then miss two or three. Is this true?

Second, can a district consolidate for a high school without first consolidating their grade schools. If so, does state office approve.

Dear Mrs. Cruts:

I was very glad to receive your etter as it shows someone is taking a serious and active interest in the school program. Now to answer your questions.

First, the petition being circulated is only a proposal to form a new school district. It requires only five signatures of heads of families in each district represented. It is then presented to the County Board of School District Reorganization for consideration. If they deem consolidation desirable they will call an election on the proposal and all voters will have an opportunity to participate.

Secondly, a consolidated district is a consolidation of all public schools in the district, grade, junior high, and high. This is the main difference between the two forms of school district.
