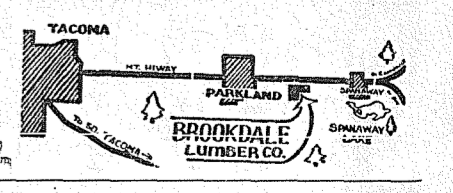

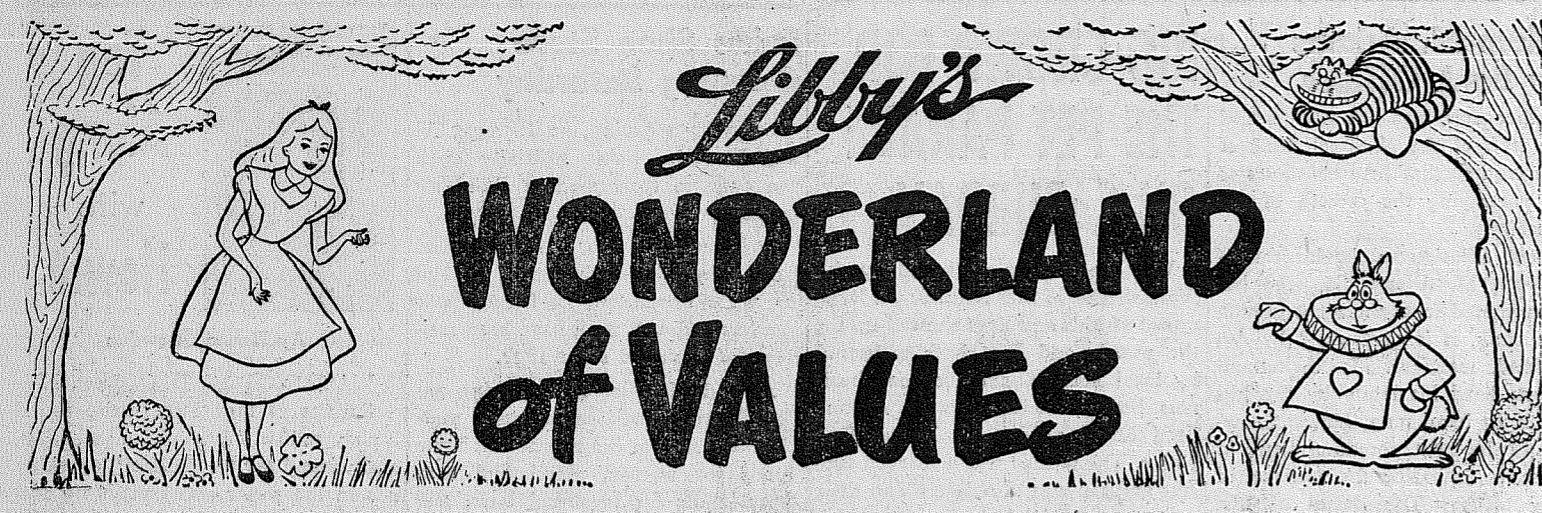

buildings with 6 to 10 apartments each, arranged along a curving street with lots of grass and play area for the kids. A shopping area is close and school about a block away.

My apartment has a large living room-dining room combination and a kitchen on the first floor, three bedrooms and bath on the second. It has both front and rear entrances and lots of play area adjacent. After looking

at so many places, I am really quite happy with my find.

I gave Betty the word and she and the kids will fly out and arrive here next Wednesday. We will rough it for a while, as all the furniture I have purchased to date is beds. We will buy the rest when Betty arrives.

I reported in at the Navy Department last Monday. The Bureau of Naval Personnel, which has cognizance of the section I'll be working for, is housed in the Naval Annex in Arlington, Va. It is a huge three-story eight-winged building, overlooking the Pentagon. I am told there are

about 8,500 people working there. That's a lot of people to a small town boy. But it's comparatively small when you learn that about 31,000 work in the Pentagon.

I am assigned to the Functional Training section, Training Division, of the Bureau of Naval Personnel. Functional Training, as defined by the Navy, is that type of training which teaches both officers and enlisted men to operate either individually or in teams, to perform a specific function within the Navy, such as fire-fighting, underwater demolition, and amphibious warfare. Specifically, our office is concerned with the establishing of convening dates, eligibility requirements, and quotas for the various commands in connection with the different schools.

There are nine officers, two civilians and four stenographers in the office. I find it a very congenial group to work with. I have been busy myself so far reading the various directives, setting up the different programs and in general just trying to find out what is going on and what I will be expected to do. The officer I am relieving will be around for another week. By that time I should be able to take over.

All in all, I think it should be an interesting tour of duty.

With timber areas well dampened by the rains of the past week, it is certain the hunting season will open on schedule, Oct. 7, for deer, pheasant, quail, sage grouse and Hungarian and Chukar partridge. First open sea-

son for hunting blue grouse, ruffed grouse and Franklin grouse started Sept. 2, the second open period falling in October.

As in previous years, the seasons have been set on a state-wide basis as far as possible, with some opening dates coinciding to scatter hunting widely and prevent hunter concentration in any one area.

The present program of game management is the result of years of study aiming at conserving the natural game for lasting benefit to all the sportsmen. Washington hunting regulations are generally in line with those of other progressive game states.

DEER

Note: Every person while hunting deer must have in his possession a big game seal and a Hunting Permit or bag limit punch card. This is the same card required for pheasant hunt-

ing. When a deer is bagged the designated deer punch MUST be removed from this card and the seal locked on the carcass of the animal.

General Open Seasons: October 7 to 28, both dates inclusive, in all counties west of the summit of the Cascade Mountains; October 7 to 21, both dates inclusive, in Asotin, Columbia, Garfield, Kittitas, Klickitat, Walla Walla and Yakima counties; October 21 to November 4, both dates inclusive, in Chelan, Douglas, Ferry, Grant and Okanogan counties; October 21 to November 12, both dates inclusive, in Lincoln, Pend Oreille, Spokane and Stevens counties.

Bag Limit: One (1) buck deer having at least one branched antler. The head of said deer shall remain with the carcass thereof while in transportation.

Special Deer Seasons: (Open to all hunters.)

Bag Limit: One (1) deer of either sex (hunter's choice), the head of which shall remain with the carcass thereof while in transportation, PROVIDED, that it shall be unlawful to remove any deer from Whidby and Bainbridge islands without first having such deer tagged by a game protector

or authorized representative of the Department of Game.

Pierce County (lowland area) — Open Season: November 18 to 25, both dates inclusive.

Open Area: That part of Pierce county lying north and west of the following described boundary: Beginning at the junction of the Rainier National Park Highway and the Eatonville-Elbe cutoff; thence northerly along the Eatonville-Elbe cutoff to where it crosses the Tacoma-Eastern Railroad in Sec. 23, Twp. 16 N., R. 4 E.; thence northerly along said railroad right-of-way through Eatonville to the north line of Sec. 7 on Kapowsin Lake; thence due east on section line across Kapowsin Lake to the St. Paul and Tacoma Railroad on the east side of the lake; thence northerly along St. Paul and Tacoma Railroad right-of-way to the north line of Sec. 20, Twp. 18 N., R. 5 E.; thence due east on section line about 1/4 mile to the North Brooks Road; thence southeasterly along said road to its junction with Voights Creek CCC Truck Trail; thence northeasterly along said Truck Trail across Voights Creek to the township line between ranges 5
