PLC Celebrates 60th Year; Dedicating New Buildings

Parkland's oldest and still leading enterprise, Pacific Lutheran college, has 60 candles on its birthday cake this weekend. Friends of the school will observe the anniversary with four days of festivities, climaxed by the dedication of two handsome new dormitory buildings.

For the general public, one of the highlights of the weekend will be the two performances of "The Eternal Slave," a pageant depicting in 14 scenes the history of the college. It will be premiered this Thursday at 8 p. m. with a repeat performance slated for Sunday afternoon at 3:30.

Written by Rev. Robert Lutes of South Tacoma especially for this occasion, the pageant will be enacted by a cast of 150 students, with background music to be provided by campus musical organizations. Both performances will be in the chapel auditorium.

Gov. Arthur B. Langlie will speak on "Christian Education and the State" at a special convocation Friday morning at 11. Other prominent guests include







Cranberry Tapioca Puddings

1 package vanilla 1 cup water
tapioca pudding 1 cup canned,
1 cup Pet. Evaporated Milk jelled cranberry
sauce, mashed

Put pudding into a saucepan. Stir in gradually until smooth a mixture of milk and water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened, or about 5 minutes. 

Why Did PLC Pick Parkland? It's The Water!

Why did the founders of Pacific Lutheran college decide to build the school in Parkland, a then unknown hamlet with only a couple houses in the middle of a vast meadow?

Several factors seem to have been involved, including water

supply, availability of land for the college to sell to prospective settlers and natural beauty of the surroundings.

Most of the sites which were considered were farther north along the Sound, at such places as Stanwood and Utsaladdy. Because most Lutherans of that era had rural backgrounds, they preferred a location in a small town rather than a large city.

Investigating possible Pierce county sites, Rev. Bjug Harstad and his committee discovered a pretty patch of open pasture land along the line of the steam railway which was being built from Tacoma to Lake Park (Spanaway).

"This is the place," proclaimed Harstad when he spotted silvery Clover creek, which

seemed to assure an adequate water supply. This was important to him because he had experienced a couple drought seasons in the Dakotas.

The fact that Parkland had five times as many sheep as people didn't bother Harstad and his cohorts. In cooperation with Ward T. Smith, Tacoma real estate dealer, they plotted a townsite around the university-to-be.

The university association reserved hundreds of lots throughout the townsite which it sold, sight-unseen, to Midwesterners at \$100 each to help finance construction of the massive new building.

On the grassy Parkland prairie, which had almost no tall trees in 1894, the new structure stood out like a European castle. The campus was surrounded by a wooden fence to keep out sheep and cattle.

Soon, the lonely P.L.C. building was joined by a cluster of homes, plus several stores along Garfield street.

In the past 60 years, Parkland and P.L.C. have grown side by side, each having periods of hardship as well as prosperity. But nearly everyone will agree that the founders made a pretty good choice when they picked this spot for their institution, which is the only Lutheran senior college west of the Rockies.

They Made Mountain Music



READY TO START—Pictured above is the early-day P.L.C. band just before leaving for The Mountain during the summer of 1897. The party assembled on Garfield street in front of the building now occupied by the Garfield Variety store. The trip, considered long in those days, was made on horseback as far as Paradise valley, then on foot to Camp Muir, the spot chosen for the serenade to the stars. The band was organized and directed by Carlo Sperati, a member of the original P.L.C. faculty, a Norwegian of Italian descent and a very fine musician, later to be director of music at Luther college in Decorah, Iowa. While at P.L.C. he also served as pastor of Our Saviour's Lutheran church in Tacoma.

Sinners, Stay 'Way!

According to an early P.L.U. catalog:

"Parkland is a town of churches and schools. Most of its young people are studious and industrious and are, as a rule, church members. The town has no saloons and is free from many of the temptations with which students are usually beset."

PLC's Pioneers Wanted To Make It A University

Although PLC is observing its 60th birthday this weekend, the college can actually trace its history back to Oct. 14, 1890, exactly 64 years ago today.

On that date, a Lutheran pastoral conference at Decorah, Iowa, voted to "encourage the brethren on the coast" by sending Rev. Bjug A. Harstad to assist in establishing an academy in western Washington.

The bearded clergyman, who had been president of the strong Minnesota district of the church, arrived at Seattle in November, 1890, and met with potential backers of the new school.

Harstad was not satisfied with a mere academy; he decided the school should be a university, training students all the way from the first grade through college. The Pacific Lutheran University association was incorporated Dec. 11, 1890.

(The elementary grades soon proved to be a headache for the "U", so this job was turned over to the local congregation, the school now being known as Concordia.)

Wasting no time, the huge five-story brick building was already designed and under construction by March, 1891. Harstad returned East to solicit funds for the undertaking. The cornerstone was laid in October of the same year.

It was three years later when Old Main was ready for occu-

pancy. On Oct. 14, 1894, nearly 2,000 people from all over the Puget Sound region trekked out to Parkland to celebrate the dedication. Classes started with 30 students, mostly young Norwegian immigrants.

In 1898, the same year that P.L.U. renamed itself Pacific Lutheran Academy & Business college, Rev. Harstad turned the presidency over to N. J. Hong to devote his entire time to the financial problems of the fledgling outpost.

The school continued to have its ups and downs. World War I caused a complete shutdown for two years. PLC reopened in 1920 following the merger of the academy with Columbia college at Everett, the latter becoming an orphanage.

Under such dedicated leaders as Harstad and Hong, and in more recent years, Dr. O. A. Tingelstad and Dr. S. C. Eastvold, Pacific Lutheran has developed from an obscure backwoods academy to a respected and significant educational center attracting students from all around the globe.
