

Jaycees Back Sewer Dist.

The Parkland Junior Chamber of Commerce took a solid stand to back the efforts of the South Suburban Sewer District in a statement issued recently by the membership, Chamber President Bill Ehli announced last week.

The statement was issued in the form of a letter, and was addressed to Clayton B. Peterson, sewer district president, Ehli said.

"It is inevitable that sewers will have to come to Parkland," the letter stated and urged greater public aware-

ness of the hazards which now exist.

The letter continued to point out the urgent need for sewers now. "Pollution of sub-soil and the pollution which now runs off into ditches must be eliminated. Even the remote possibility of an epidemic from pollution must be covered and eliminated. Therefore we of the Parkland Jaycees feel that the South Suburban Sewer District of Pierce County is working in the right direction."

Basis for the opinion expressed in the statement resulted from a door to door public opinion survey conducted by the Jaycees last July, Ehli said.

Three largest complaints uncovered by the survey were storm drainage, sewage disposal, and lack of sidewalks. The survey covered all aspects of service, schools, utilities, and public conveniences, Ehli revealed.

According to the survey results, 47 percent of those contacted said their septic tank operation was below average or poor, 31 percent through their present system was average or good, and 22 percent expressed "no opinion".

Teen Narcotics Case Uncovers Adult Pushers

Investigation of a Spanaway teenager's involvement with narcotics led detectives to a pair of adult suppliers trafficking marijuana and LSD, sheriff's deputies reported last week.

The case came to the attention of sheriff's detectives March 17 when a citizen reported possible marijuana smoking by juveniles near the Parkland Theater. The youth taken into custody told deputies he was the only teenager involved as far as he knew, but admitted giving a 16 year old boy a drag off his marijuana "weed" near the Parkland Theater.

Describing a month long association with a pair of adult pushers, the youth said he was taken along on visits to junkie hangouts. LSD and pills were furnished him free of charge, but he had to buy his marijuana cigarettes.

The adults were traced to the City of Tacoma and were arrested there by city narcotics investigators, deputies disclosed.

One of the adults arrested, whom the boy said he met in Spanaway, gave the youth his first LSD pill at a Pacific Avenue drive-in. The 17 year old said he took the pill because he didn't think it would affect him. After downing it with a Coke the youth said he walked to the Parkland Theater where he began to have hallucinations.

Telling of his "trip" on LSD, the boy said he became frightened because he thought the sky was falling in on him. The "trip" seemed like a horrible nightmare of distortions, faces and people laughing at him, he stated. The experience continued into the following day, and it took him some time to get over the ordeal, he recalled.

A few days later his new "friends" introduced him to marijuana, the boy revealed. On one occasion he accompanied the adults while they made an LSD buy. At a "fringe" place near a University the boy

said he was introduced to a "guy who had blown his mind" from LSD overdoses.

Detective Ward Archer, Charles Robbins, and H.V. Knabel teamed up to clear the case. The youth was referred to the juvenile court.

GRAHAM - A pair of youths 17-18 years of age were booked into the Pierce County Jail on a charge of larceny, Detective J.C. Smith reported last week.

One of the pair admitted stealing from cars and involved his accomplice. The arrests cleared numerous cases of car prowling in the Spanaway - Graham area, Smith said.

SPANAWAY - Sheriff's Detective Charles Robbins took a 16 year old youth into custody to clear the burglary of the W.F. Bell residence, Spanaway, the Pierce County Sheriff's Office reported last week.

Three of the twenty dollars listed as stolen was recovered, Robbins stated. The money had been removed from a dresser in the victim's home.

Feature of the event will be an invitational open Trotters Grand Prix, with win, place and show winners eligible.

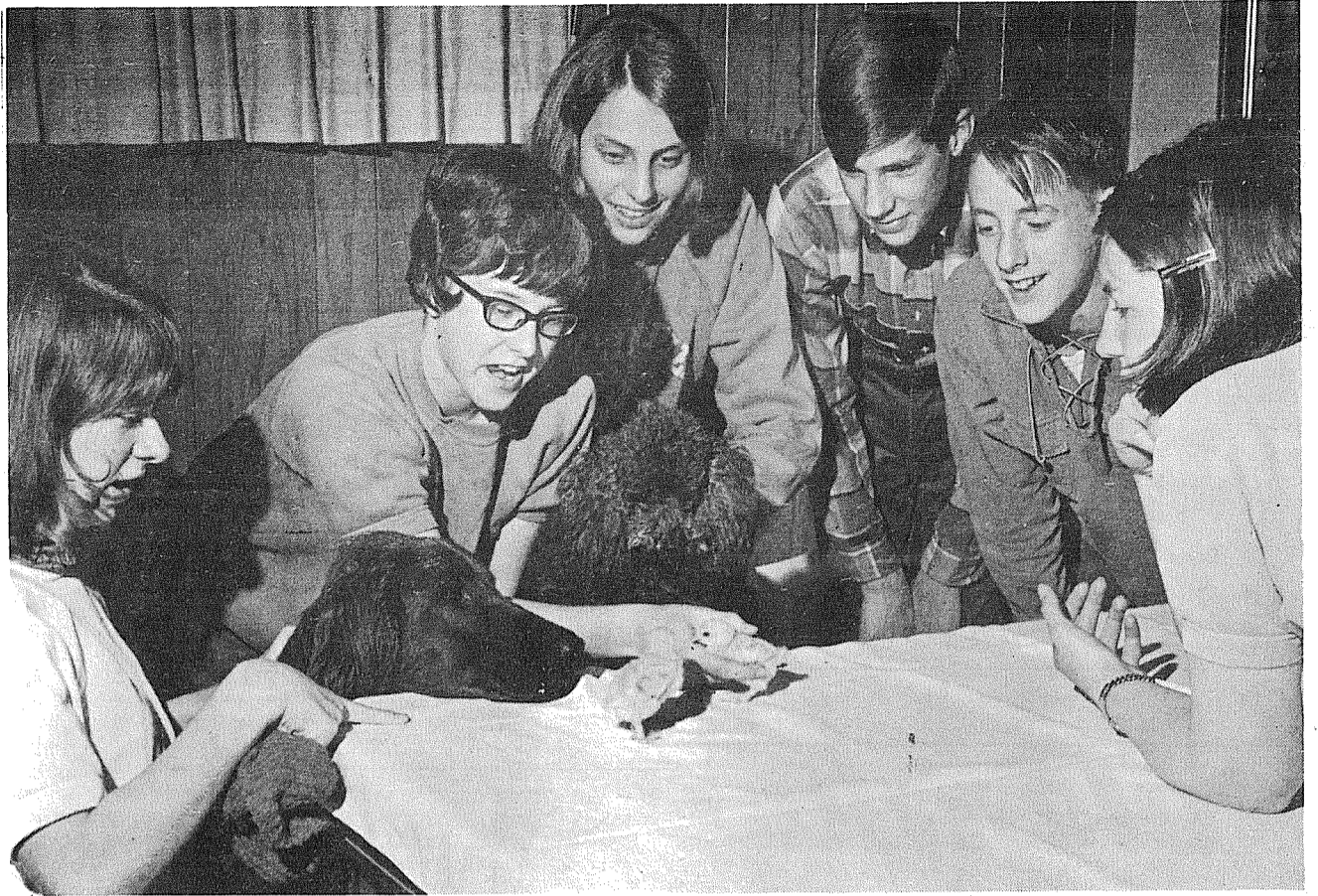

April City Founded At Elmhurst Elementary

"April City -- Population: 27 children, 1 giraffe and 1 cow," is the official sign that greets visitors to the Parkland area's newest residential and business community.

Its location is the first grade room of Anita Christian, teacher at Elmhurst Elementary School.

The whole city, complete with businesses, streets and individual houses, in the month-long project of the 27 first graders as they attempt to discover the world in which they live.

And they even have an honorary mayor. In brief ceremonies shortly after the founding of the city, Leo Gaume, Elmhurst principal, was presented with the key to the city and given the honorary title of mayor.

The classroom is ordinary in size and shape, but it is colorful beyond imagination. At the front of the room is a bulletin board cow who acts as a billboard with the calendar for April covering his side. And stretching his neck along the windows is a bright yellow giraffe, his neck carrying a message about the importance of reading. At the back a large circus wagon book stand holds a myriad of reading for the children. The room is separated quite indistinctly

into a business session -- the children's desks -- and a residential section -- the area of counter space at the rear of the room.

Each child has established a business at his desk, Miss Christian explained, including grocery stores, stationers, jewelry stores and other shops. Each row of desks makes up an individual street.

"The children got together in committees," the teacher said, and decided upon names for the streets. For most of them, it was the first committee work they ever experienced."

The streets are named Violet, B, F and April April.

In the residential section, each child built his own house from shoe boxes and constructed paper furniture for it, Miss Christian said.

"We got all the boxes from a local store, and then the children wrote a thank you letter to the store manager," she explained.

The children, through such activities as this, become aware of adult life and experiences, and, at the same time, they are able to make practical use of the skills and knowledge they gain in English, art and social studies, Miss Christian said.

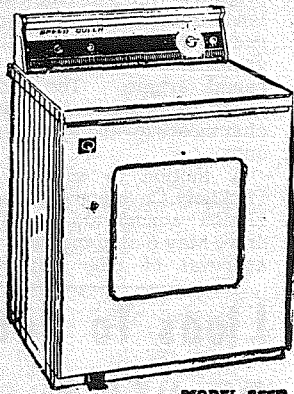

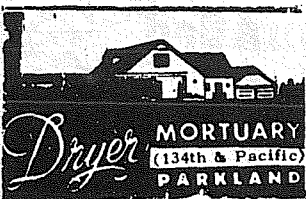

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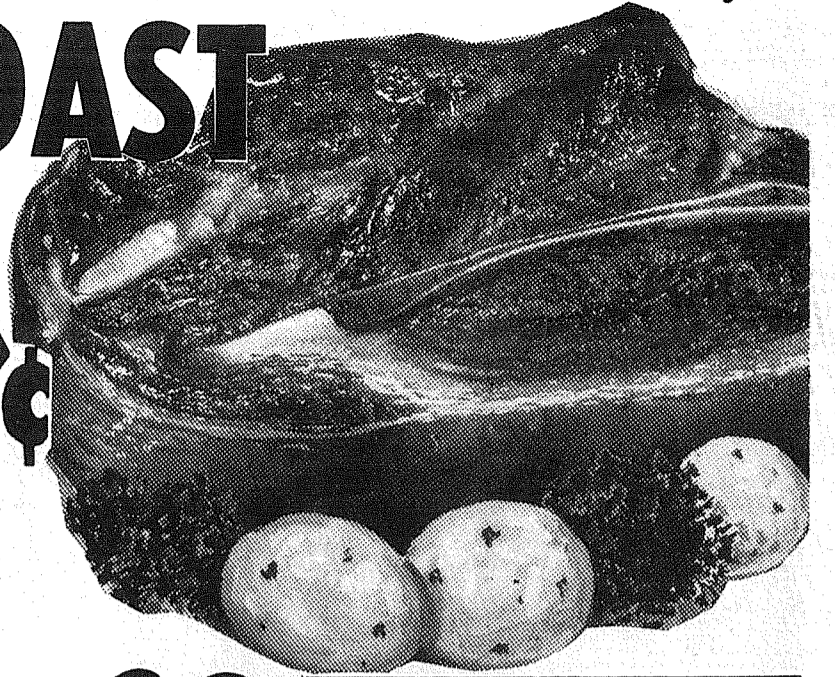

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4-H Clubs Plant Arboretums

Enthusiastic youngsters from the Cavalier and Woodsmen 4-H clubs of Midland planted arboretums on April 15 at the Pierce County 4-H tract near Bonney Lake reports County Agent Dave Klemperer.

The 150 acre site was deeded to Washington State University by Weyerhaeuser Company in the early 1940's for 4-H forestry activities.

Both clubs planted trees in clearings on their own club plots which they had measured out themselves. The seedlings of several varieties ranged from one to two feet high and were donated by the Webster State Forest Nursery on authorization of Bert Cole, Commissioner of Public Lands.

Each arboretum contains about thirty trees of fifteen different species including hemlock, juniper, larch, cedar, and various pines, firs, and spruces. 4-H members plan to care for and enlarge their arboretums and study the development and identification of the trees.

Klemperer says the arboretum activity is one example of the opportunities available for both city and rural 4-H members enrolled in the Natural Resources Conservation projects. 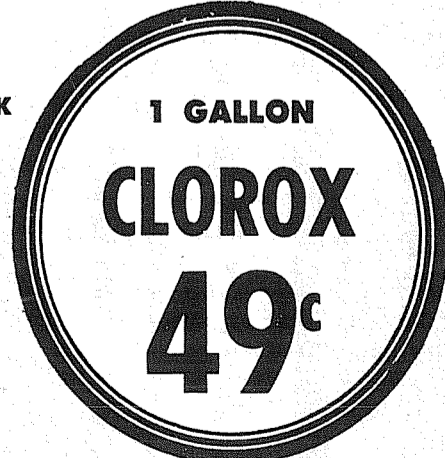

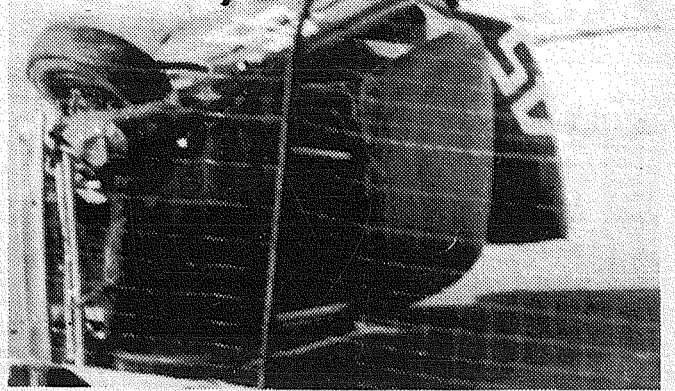

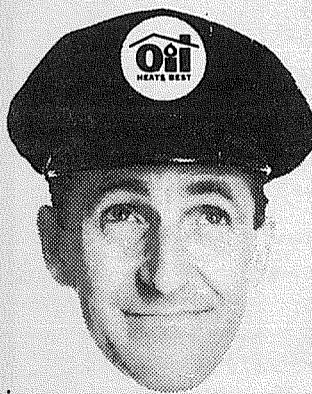
