

McCHORD AIR FORCE BASE, WASH.—A policy to release names of Air Force personnel involved in accidents as soon after the accident as possible has been formulated by the Department of Defense for use in the United States.

This is an effort to lessen the anxety of relatives waiting to learn if their husbands or sons were involved in the accident, names of the men will be released upon identification if the accident occurs outside an Air Force installation. However, when the accident happens on an installation, the names will be withheld until notification of the next of kin has been made.

Accidents are divided into two classes, those occurring outside an Air Force installation and those inside the installation. In all types of accidents outside the installation, either automobile, train, or plane, the names will classified equipment is involved, proper security precautions will be observed with respect to this equipment.

The only exception to this is where an Air Force plane crashes into a remote locality with little or no damage to civilian property. This will be treated as are accidents on an instal-

Where accidents occur on an installation, the names of the casualties will be withheld until relatives can reasonably be expected to have received the official notification of the accident. Where receipt of this notificaafter dispatch of notification. In any case, every effort will be made to release the names of the casualties with the first release of the story.

PROPOSED DAV MEMORIAL TO UNKNOWN SAILOR



CINCINNATI — The Disabled American Veterans in cooperation with the Department of Defense, will construct the Grave of the Unknown Sailor at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, as a fitting tribute to the heroic Navy dead, comparable to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington. 



AACS, installed at McChord in 1940, provides services to guide pilots in their flight when it seems impossible to fly, Air-toground service is the actual communication of the pilot with ground forces. The tower guides the pilot approaching the landing field and gives him the clear signal when to land. Ground Controlled Approach functions to guide the pilot to the landing strip when otherwise he could not find it. This operated in fog, rain, snow to "show" the strip to the pilot.

The telegraph center transmits the latest weather reports from during the Berlin Airlift when it all over the world to the operations office at each field telling the pilot what to expect ahead of him. AACS is the third oldest command in the Air Force. Formed at the insistance of the late General Henry "Hap" Arnold, AACS was officially installed on Nov. 15, 1938.






