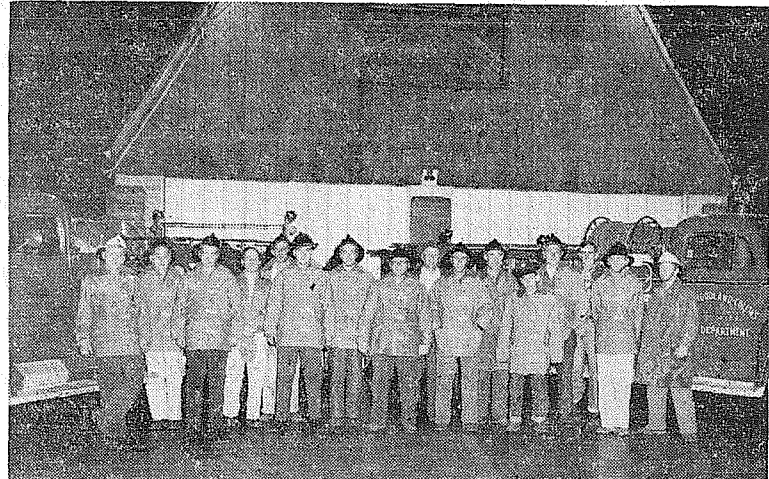

Each year the dance is given to raise money for incidental expenses of the firemen and the fire hall. All members of the volunteer company serve without pay, ready at any hour of the day or night to turn out to fight fires or assist in any emergency. The very fact that this well trained group is available in case of fire is reflected in lower fire insurance rates in the community, resulting in real dollars and cents savings. But, greater than this, is the sense of security that such an organization gives to residents of the area who know that help is to be had almost immediately should it be needed.

The Summit-Woodland-Collins firemen meet at their fire hall every Monday night, holding a business session the first Monday of each month and drilling all other Mondays. At present the men are taking the valuable state training course, consisting

**New Policy on Accident News**

McCHORD AIR FORCE BASE, WASH.—A policy to release names of Air Force personnel involved in accidents as soon after the accident as possible has been formulated by the Department of Defense for use in the United States.

This is an effort to lessen the anxiety of relatives waiting to learn if their husbands or sons were involved in the accident, names of the men will be released upon identification if the accident occurs outside an Air Force installation. However, when the accident happens on an installation, the names will be withheld until notification of the next of kin has been made.

Accidents are divided into two classes, those occurring outside an Air Force installation and those inside the installation. In all types of accidents outside the installation, either automobile, train, or plane, the names will be released upon identification. If classified equipment is involved, proper security precautions will be observed with respect to this equipment.

The only exception to this is where an Air Force plane crashes into a remote locality with little or no damage to civilian property. This will be treated as an accident on an installation. Where accidents occur on an installation, the names of the casualties will be withheld until relatives can reasonably be expected to have received the official notification of the accident. Where receipt of this notification cannot be confirmed, reasonable time will be considered to be 12 hours after dispatch of notification. In any case, every effort will be made to release the names of the casualties with the first release of the story.

**Cortisone Production Increased**  
The same busy microbes that cause bread to become moldy have contributed to the solution of one of the most intricate chemical puzzles of our time. They have made available to the crippled, pain-tortured arthritis sufferer greatly increased supplies of the wonder hormone cortisone. Up to now, cortisone which is valuable in many diseases in addition to arthritis, has had to be made by about 20 very complex steps from scarce ox bile acid. Scientists at the Upjohn Company, Kalamazoo, Michigan, had a hunch unlimited quantities of cortisone could be made efficiently by fermentation—like beer and anti-biotics. To do this a mold was needed, a group of microbes that could perform the one step in the process that baffled chemists. It was a tricky problem; hundreds of molds were tested. Finally found one with the unlikely name Rhizopus, of the same family as the bread molds. It did the trick. When fermented with chemicals from such sources as soybeans, yeast and Mexican yams, it produced a giant shortcut to cortisone, allowing the Upjohn Company to market it at 20 per cent below prevailing prices.



## 14th AACCS Birthday Observed; McChord's Unit Is 12 Years Old

The Airways and Air Communications Service (AACCS) celebrated its 14th anniversary last Saturday. For 14 years AACCS has been providing communication and navigational aids to aircraft on a defined basis bringing them safely to a landing when it is practically impossible to see the ground.

AACS, installed at McChord in 1940, provides services to guide pilots in their flight when it seems impossible to fly. Air-to-ground service is the actual communication of the pilot with ground forces. The tower guides the pilot approaching the landing field and gives him the clear signal when to land. Ground Controlled Approach functions to guide the pilot to the landing strip when otherwise he could not find it. This operated in fog, rain, snow to "show" the strip to the pilot.

The telegraph center transmits the latest weather reports from all over the world to the operations office at each field telling the pilot what to expect ahead of him. The radio range acts as a road sign from one field to another telling the pilot when he is going in the wrong direction. The transmitter and receives sites transmit the actual message between the plane and the ground.

All these services are provided by the men of AACCS on a 24-hour basis to assure the men in the air that they will get to their destination safely.

These services are available to civilian aircraft as well as military when they are needed. In cases of emergency, civilian aircraft may land at McChord and in this case more of AACCS services would be used.

The radio range is used by all aircraft passing over Tacoma area. It is the homing beacon for the northwest. This is the only frequently used service of AACCS by civilians.

Because of the ability to land and take off in "zero" weather by using GCA, air-to-ground, and the tower, the F-94 Jet Interceptor planes at McChord are able to fly in any weather to intercept an unidentified aircraft in the area and thus are ready to defeat any aggressive action against the United States.

AACS is the third oldest command in the Air Force. Formed at the insistence of the late General Henry "Hap" Arnold, AACCS was officially installed on Nov. 15, 1938.

In 1934, the Army Air Corps sent ten bombers to Alaska in a flight which was to prove the importance of long-range bombers in an effective strategic weapon. This flight was led by General Arnold. The lack of an integrated military communications system proved a serious handicap on the flight and upon their return, Gen. Arnold urged the establishment of a communications system within the Army Air Corps.

The need was further emphasized when another flight of B-10s flew a mission from California to Virginia to simulate loading bombs and to "bomb" Fort Dix, N.J., in an exercise to prove the striking power of the Air Force. The mission was performed but due to the lack of good communications, the group made a forced landing because of unexpected bad weather which had not been reported in time to change their course. Many other difficulties were encountered due to poor communications.

It was then that General Arnold established the requirements for the communication system. In order to satisfy these requirements, four years were required to plan and obtain enough money to purchase the needed equipment for the installations in the United States.

Between 1934 and 1936, the ground work for future AACCS was laid by establishing 33 domestic air navigational stations. Within two years these stations had demonstrated their worth to such a point that an Army regulation was published which officially established the Army Airways Communications System.

Thus AACCS was born of necessity and grew from three officers and 300 enlisted men operating 33 stations to 51,000 men, which during World War II operated 165,000 miles of global "highways in the sky."

Since its beginning, AACCS has proven its capabilities in many ways. A good sample was shown during the Berlin Airlift when it demonstrated for the first time, that the weather was no barrier. Through fog and smog, AACCS Ground Controlled Approach (GCA) operators worked round the clock steering aircraft laden with supplies to safe touchdowns.

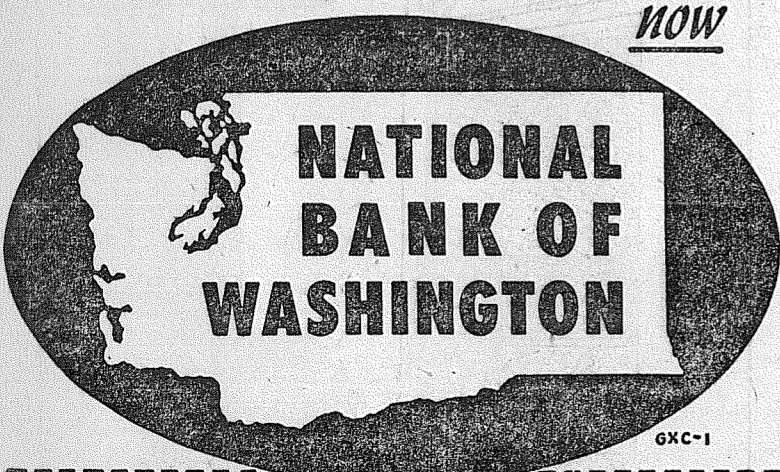

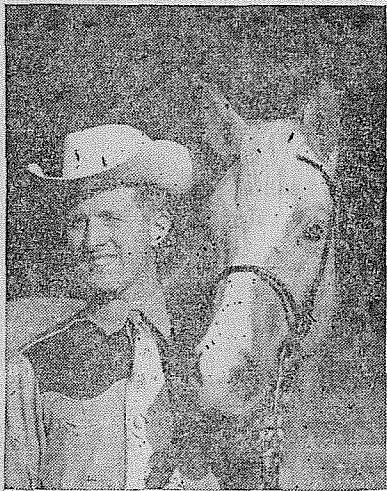

After studying little Jimmy's case carefully, the heart specialist decided

In the meantime, the child has the watchful, loving care that has surrounded him all his life, along with the hopes and prayers of people everywhere whose hearts are touched by the poignant story of a sick child and his brave, devoted parents.

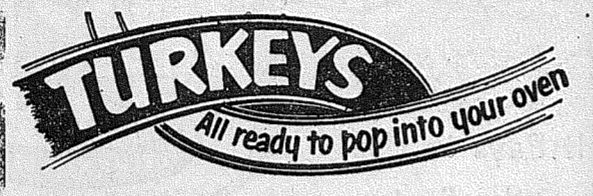
