**Clover Creek Will
Vote November 20
On 2 School Taxes**

**ADDED LEVIES SOUGHT
FOR OPERATING COSTS
AND GYMNASIUM FUND**

The rising costs of school maintenance and of food have caused the directors of Clover Creek School District No. 4 to ask for a millage election November 20, at the schoolhouse.

The propositions to be voted on are:

- 1—Five mills for school maintenance and for hot lunch;
- 2—Five mills for building fund.

No extra levy was asked for school maintenance at the last election, but now the school finds that, in order to provide the type of education demanded by the people of the district, more funds are necessary.

The lunch room, which has proved of great benefit in providing a good, hot meal at very low cost to the pupils, must have added support in order to continue.

The levy for the building fund is asked because of the demand of parents for a gymnasium. Funds that have been voted in the past, and which are at present in the building fund, are not adequate to build a gymnasium.

**To Urge Clover
Creek Precinct**

The members of Clover Creek Grange voted unanimously at the November 5 meeting to petition the county commissioners to form a voting precinct of the Clover Creek School District.

Now part of the Clover Creek residents vote at Spanaway and part at Collins. CHRISTMAS PARCELS**

Persons desiring to mail Christmas packages to overseas destinations should have them in the post office not later than this week, Elmer Beard, acting postmaster at Parkland, said Monday.

Postal authorities have notified all postmasters that there can be no guarantee of delivery of packages by Christmas, after this week. While every effort will be made to get late packages through on time via air mail, this service is already taxed to capacity and space may not be available.

**1949 Car Licenses
Available Next Week**

To insure prompt issuance of the 1949 automobile license plates, motor vehicle owners are advised to check and see if they have their Certificate of Vehicle Registration, which must be presented along with license application, George C. Starlund, Director of Licenses, Olympia, advises.

If they have been lost or misplaced, the car owner should obtain application for duplicate at a county auditor's office and when completed should mail them directly to the Director of Licenses, accompanied by a 50-cent fee. The issuance of a duplicate makes it necessary to check department records to verify the vehicle description and title numbers.

"Because of the last-minute rush for duplicates last year, the Department had to concentrate all personnel in this effort and still applicants were held up in acquiring their new licenses," Starlund said. "In many instances, licenses were not issued until after the deadline of December 31 and many were held up until the penalty date, January 9."

As of the end of September, there are 835,704 vehicles licensed in Washington, compared to 789,336 November 15 of last year. Car licenses will be issued by the Department and all county auditors, beginning November 15.

**Orchard Hill Marks
Margin of Proposed
New Rate Base Area**

**ALL OF GRANITE
EXCHANGE WILL
BE BENEFITTED**

Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company plans, within two weeks, to offer residential phone subscribers in this area a choice of one or two party lines at lower rates than they are now paying for four-party and 10-party line service. Businesses will be offered full single-party line or "measured" service.

This "pretty good news" was passed along to the Parkland Business Club at its monthly dinner meeting, Tuesday evening, November 9, at the Indian Inn. Bearer of the tidings was H. E. McCoun, Tacoma district manager for the telephone company.

McCoun opened his description of the new services to be offered by declaring that for once he was happy to appear before a subscriber group, since he could dispense with apologies and excuses and definitely promise good service. There "couldn't have been a more opportune time" for the invitation to come, he said. He added that his company plans to begin November 15 to mail notices of the improved service to subscribers here.

McCoun called a roll of impressive cost figures for the service expansion now being installed here, then added that two years from now all will likely have to be done again to keep up with the company's forecast of consumer demand.

At present, the telephone company's Granite exchange serves roughly 3,000 customers on 545 lines. It is planned to be serving 3,800 subscribers on 2,000 lines by the first of the year. By 1954, it is expected that there will be 5,355 Granite stations.

Current plans call for changing 518 subscribers from Garland to Granite exchange. Number changes will be necessary for them, but they will get a lot better service, over one-party and two-party lines, McCoun said. He does not foresee that it will be necessary to change numbers of more than a small proportion of present Granite stations. The company is loath to change numbers if it can be avoided, he emphasized.

March 6, 1949, is the date now set for all new installations to be completed and for the new service to go into effect throughout the area. However, service improvements will be felt before then, McCoun said. At that time, all four-party lines will be withdrawn and only the single-party and two-party offered, within the new Granite rate base area. That area will be very irregularly shaped and will extend south from Tacoma to roughly the foot of Orchard Hill on Mountain Highway. It will take in fairly wide strips on both sides of the highway and will include almost all the present community of Parkland.

Phone subscribers within the area, in addition to lower rates and top-grade service, will also receive extended service benefits, enabling them to call Puyallup, Graham and Tacoma without toll. Tariffs within the area will be only slightly higher than in Tacoma. Service will be better than in Tacoma, where 6,600 customers are now waiting for better grades of service. This will be the first major move toward better service made by the company in the Tacoma area since the war. Two other suburban exchanges are also now being converted, McCoun said, but Granite will be the first completed.

Granite subscribers outside the new rate base area will have to wait longer for the kind of service they want, McCoun admitted, but a lot of the load will be lifted from the 10-party rural lines when 1,200 phones in and close around Parkland are taken off them, he declared. He also promised that they will be able to get one and two party line service as facilities become available. They will then be offered the extended service of the Granite exchange on graduated tariff scales according to their distance from the base rate area. Present single party and two party lines outside the area will not now be affected.

Winter Takes the Road

With earlier hours of darkness signalling the approach of winter, motorists are reminded to put their vehicles in readiness for the dangerous weather months.

Heavier demands are being made on electrical equipment. Lights, battery and heater should be inspected to be sure they are in good condition for bad weather. State and national traffic accident records indicate that the principal causes for very high winter accident rates are poor visibility and inadequate traction.

To maintain visibility, the motorist must, in addition to having good lights, be certain that his windshield wipers and defrosters are working properly. You must see a hazard to avoid it.

Aids to good traction on snow and ice are chains, good brakes and good common sense. It is advised that tires be well-mated, with good treads; that brakes be equalized, to prevent unnecessary skidding; and that liberal use of common sense be exercised, constantly keeping in mind that speed must be adjusted to changing weather, road and traffic conditions.

Tollefson said that his legislation will be pointed at areas which have had increases in population which make additional school space mandatory.

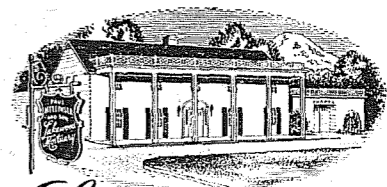
