## Cubs' Game To Benefit Kidney Machine Patient

MIDLAND - A benefit baseball game featuring the Tacoma Cubs and Vancouver Mounties will be held Thursday evening at Cheney Stadium to raise money for Terry Czeczok, whose life is being sustained by the use of a kidney machine.

The 1965 graduate of Franklin Pierce High School will receive 50 percent of all advance ticket sales. Pre-game ceremonies will begin at 7:30 p.m. and Terry will throw out the first baseball at 7:45.

To meet Terry on the street one could not realize that just a few months ago she was faced with death because of her kidney failure. Following a case study at the Seattle Artificial Kidney Center, a kidney machine was installed in her home.

She and her mother recently completed a two-month training session at the Center and now spend three days each week going through the life-saving process which is quite involved.

Terry is placed on the machine for a period of six to seven hours a session. An artificial kidney must be constructed and placed on the machine before every treatment. Treatments, construction of a kidney and cleaning the artificial kidney machine require approximately 32 hours a week.

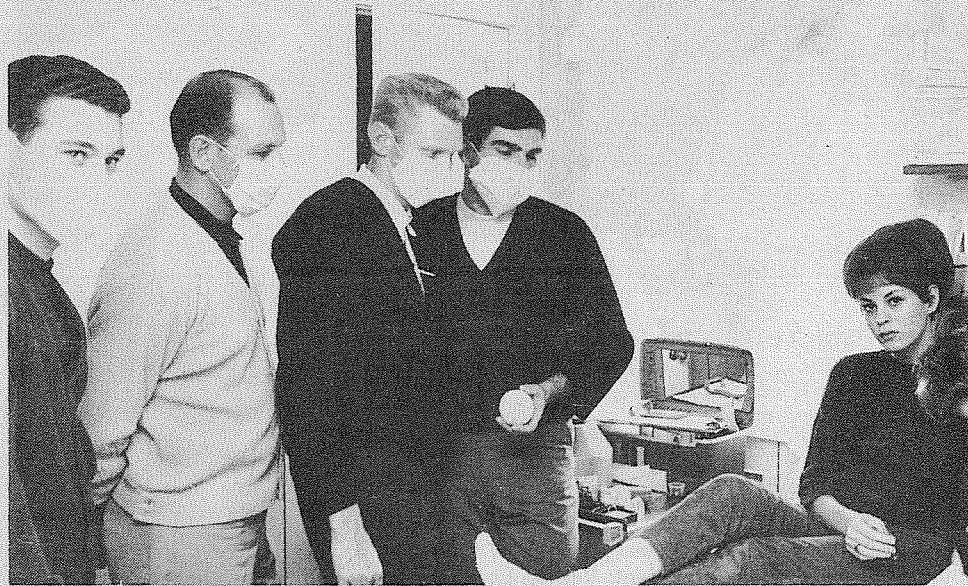
Other members of Terry's family include her father Arthur who is a wholesaler for equipment and materials used in installing and assembling interior flooring, her brother Jim who is a sophomore at Franklin Pierce, a sister Katty in the second grade and Mary who is enrolled in kindergarten.

All six members of the family have adjusted their style of living to Terry's problem. The problem of finances was recognized and the challenge met by Mrs. Bud Hartman of Tacoma. Through the cooperation of the Bank of California a fund was established and as of May 17 the balance was \$6,545.88. It is estimated that \$14,000 will be needed the first year.

Members of the Tacoma Cubs visited Terry earlier this month to view the kidney treatment process. Visiting her were pitchers Arnold Earley, Bill Connors and Tom Mandile, catcher Vic Roznovsky and public relations director Ed Bowman.

Only funds received from advance tickets will be donated to the trust fund. Tickets are available from 25 organizations and retail outlets including Franklin Pierce High School, elementary schools in the Midland area, Parkland and Midland Fire Departments, Parkland Kiwanians and Jaycees, Midland Tavern, Summit Trading Company, Basket Lumber, Midland Shoe Repair, Summit Thriftway, Mrs. Hartman (BR 2-1936) or Frank Serviss (LE 1-3437).

## Stock Sale Raises \$200,000 Down, Price Near Million

PUYALLUP The Puyallup Development Company officially began operation of Thun Field Monday and is working on a master plan for development of the 436 acre site.

Over \$200,000 worth of stock was sold to community and business leaders for the down payment to owner John Thun. The total purchase price was close to one million dollars.

Officers and directors will be operating the air strip temporarily until a full-time manager can be hired reported president James E. Boyle, Jr.

Plans to purchase the site from Thun, who has owned the land for 18 years, were announced last fall. The physical assets include an operating airport (the largest by aircraft population in Pierce county), complementary buildings to the airport and a raceway leased by Puyallup Dragways.

The Company plans to expand the airport and develop an industrial park. Officials are now working with potential tenants. "We hope to encourage lighter industries associated with the aircraft field to locate in the industrial park," Boyle stated.

Expansion of the airport would include (1) extension of

the runway to handle small commercial jets, (2) expansion of hangar facilities to increase rental income and supplement other income derived from increased "home based" traffic, (3) air taxi service to adjacent communities and Seattle-Tacoma Airport and (4) construction of restaurant on flight line as service to "fly-in" customers and tourists.

"The airport is felt to be a genuine asset to the industries located on the industrial sites, particularly those with national associations and interests," continued the president.

Boyle said the airport is "unique and well-known" and the home of antique and acrobatic aircraft as well as home-built aircraft.

Federal Aviation Authority figures show that there are 34,000 active plane uses per year on the strip. Thun mentioned that other local airports use this strip for student instruction and that as an auxiliary Army strip, it is used "extensively" by the National Guard.

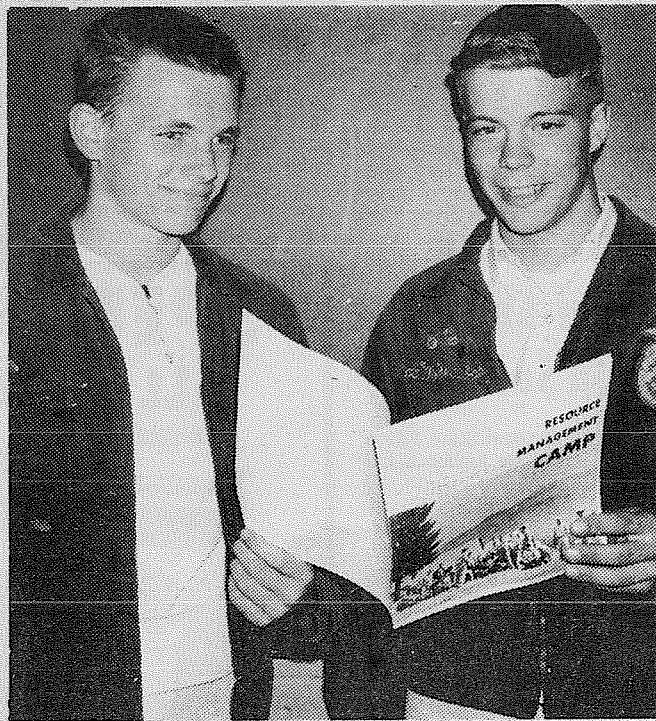
The drap strip, operated by Marshal Promotions Company will continue its present lease. According to Boyle, owner Clark Marshal is planning to improve the strip to meet the high speeds of today's racing cars.

Vice-president and director Robert C. Young explained that the Company is dedicated to the total economic development of Eastern Pierce County "and as such felt there are several areas needing study and potential development".

He said it is possible that Puyallup Valley Development Company could act as a catalyst to encourage the development of a hotel - motel convention center, recreational facilities and residential parks.

Other officers are secretary and director Mrs. Vera L. Bohrer and treasurer and director Jerry L. Korum. There are 16 other directors.

## Spanaway Boy To Resource Camp

Dick Hopkins of Spanaway is one of two county youths awarded free campships to this year's Resources Management Camp near Carson, Wash., reports County Agent David Klemperer.

Hopkins and Bob Meisenburg of Tacoma won the Pierce County spots on the basis of school records and a speech contest.

A panel of judges in each Western Washington county has selected two high school boys to attend the camp, which runs this year from June 11 to 17.

The camp gives 35 participants a week of intensive training in forestry and natural resources conservation.

It is located at the Hemlock Ranger Station in the Gifford Pinchot National Forest about 35 miles east of Vancouver.

Sponsors donating the \$35 campships for Pierce County this year were the Daffodil Valley Kiwanis Club and the county Future Farmers of America Chapters collectively.

The camp is sponsored by the Washington Resources Council in cooperation with the Washington State University Cooperative Extension Service and the State Department of Vocational Education. It gives well-qualified boys a full week of close-to-nature study of soil and water, fish

and game, power, timber, and other forest products of the region.

Special field trips include an on-site study of several experimental forests, the oldest arboretum in the northwest, and a complete tour of the environs of Bonneville Dam.

Instructors contributing to the program include an entomologist, a pathologist, a forester, and a soils specialist, all from Washington State University; a State Game Department biologist; foresters from the Department of Natural Resources, the Industrial Forestry Association, and Keep Washington Green; and many other well-qualified people.

## Park Has Record Snow Pack

### Stevens Canyon Road Won't Make Opening Day

The Memorial Day target for opening the Stevens Canyon Road will probably not be met, Superintendent John Townsley reported today.

Crews working on the road have encountered snow depths up to 40 feet and are already seven days behind schedule.

Snow depths at Paradise on May 1 equalled the previous record of 259" in 1956. This is more than 8 feet over the 47-year average for May 1.

Opening dates for other park roads are expected to be late also, Townsley said. The new target date for Sunrise is July 1. No dates have been set for the West Side Road to Klapatche Point or for the Mowich Lake Road.

Trails at higher elevations are unlikely to be clear before late July. Many of the lakes will be inaccessible

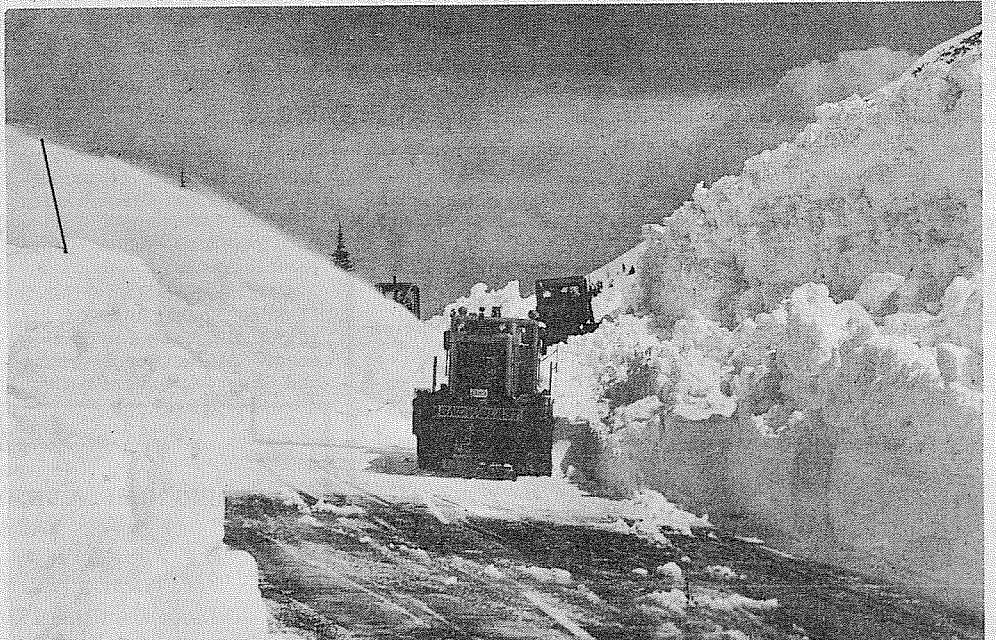
when fishing season opens on the 4th of July. Park visitors planning to use the high country during July should be sure to check trail conditions before departing.

The road to Paradise, the East Side Road and the Carbon River Road, are all open Townsley said. Campgrounds at Ohanapeosh and Sunshine Point are open, as is the National Park Inn at Longmire. Paradise Inn will open on schedule on June 17.

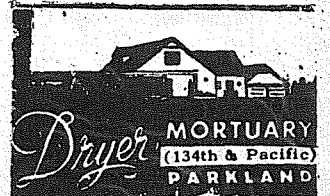

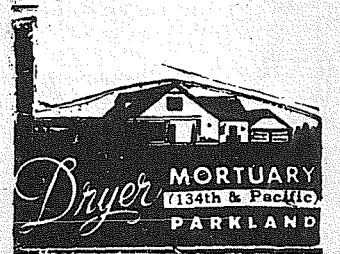

## Domestic Dairy Protection Hicks Asks Passage Of Dairy Import Act

Congressman Floyd V. Hicks has called for the passage of the "Dairy Import Act of 1967" to restrict the flow of dairy products which he said are harmful to the dairy farmers of Washington. b

"Dairy farmers are not getting a fair deal in our economy," Hicks said. "We can solve the number 1 problem of dairymen - unchecked dairy products - by passing this bill."

Hicks joined with other Congressmen and Senators in introducing the legislation.

The bill would: -- Set permanent quotas on the amount of milk equivalent which is shipped into this country, limiting imports to

the average butterfat and non-fat milk solids imported from 1961 through 1965.

Allow the President to authorize additional imports in the national interest; but if he did, and if dairy prices were below parity, a corresponding amount of dairy products would have to be removed from the domestic market by the government.

The import quota could be increased in the same ratio as the domestic market grows.

"This legislation will end the evasion of quotas which has been increasing every year," Hicks said. "For the past few years such imports have increased at such an alarming rate that American dairymen have been badly hurt."

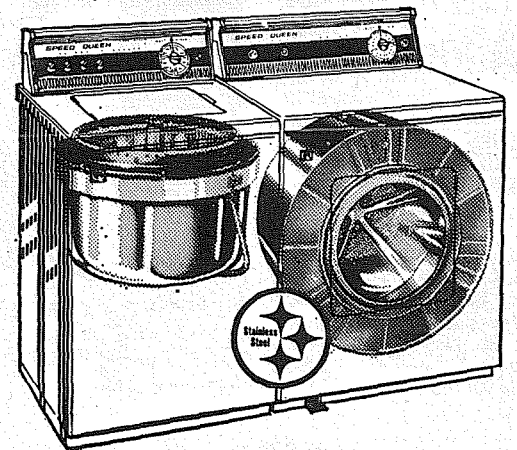

Others took course work in such diversified areas as preventive medicine, education of the maladjusted child, earth science, creative writing, speech for the classroom, education of the exceptional child, business finance, natural history of the invertebrates and teacher counseling.

This will be reflected in better education for Bethel students, Dr. Fred M. Gramann, superintendent, explained.

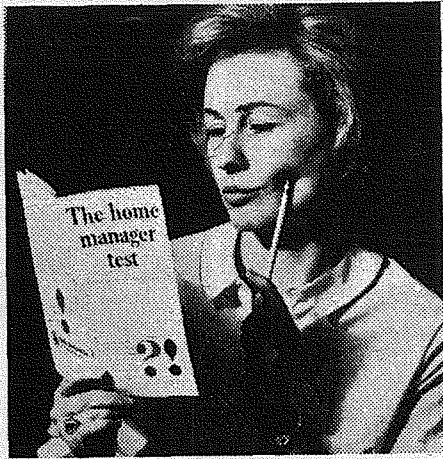
Andersen, a star basketball player for PLU, will graduate May 27 with a degree in physical education. He will start work Sept. 1.

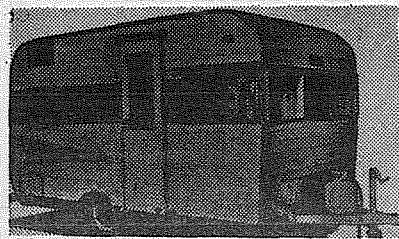

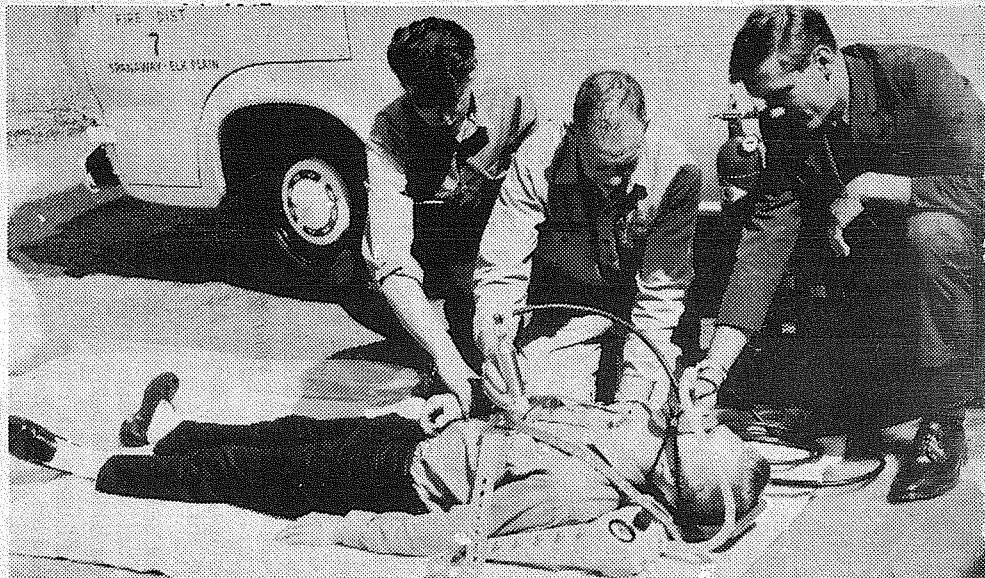

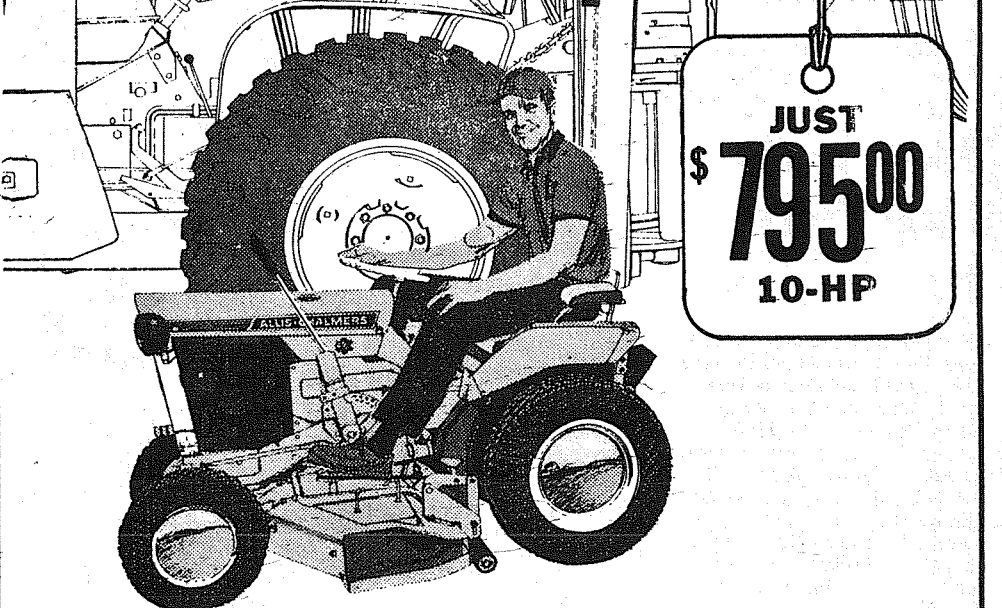
The purpose of the program is to take students who perhaps do not get many learning type situations at home, but who are about ready to begin school, and let them literally get a head-start on learning.

Four primary teachers will work with groups of 15 children each, and each teacher will be assisted by a teacher aid and a volunteer worker.

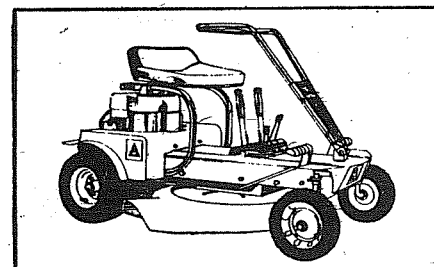
Each child participating in the program will also receive a snack during the morning and a complete lunch each day.



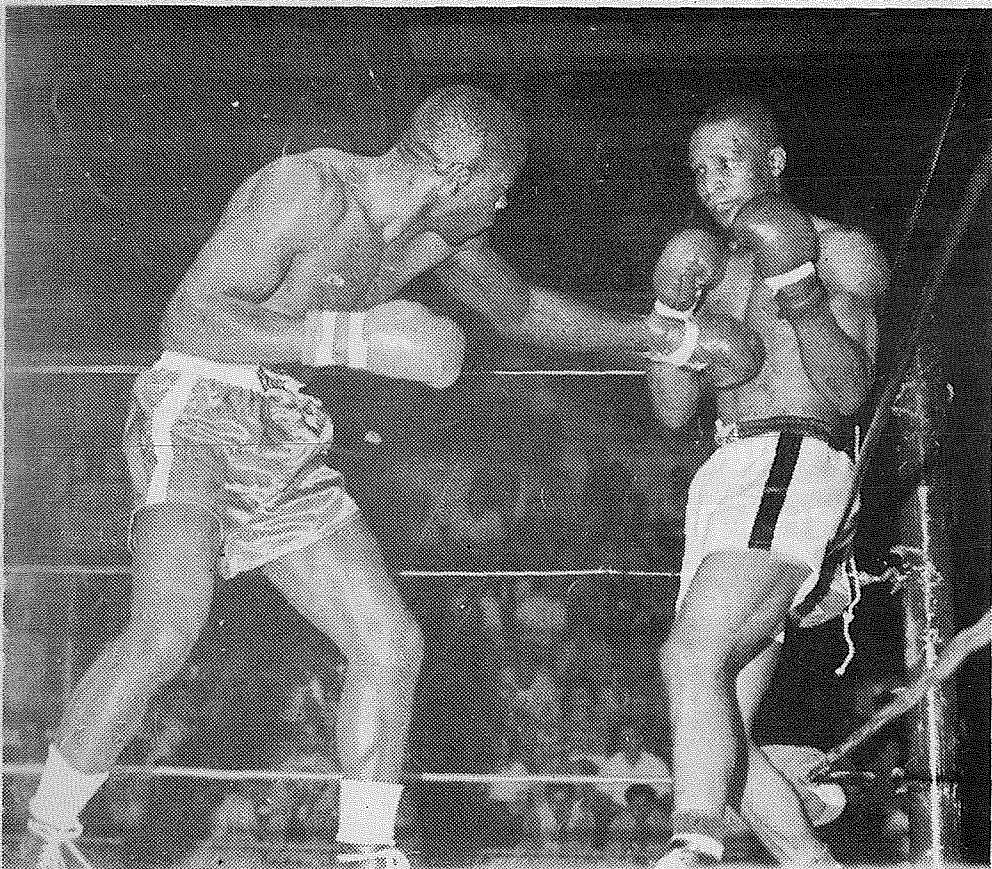

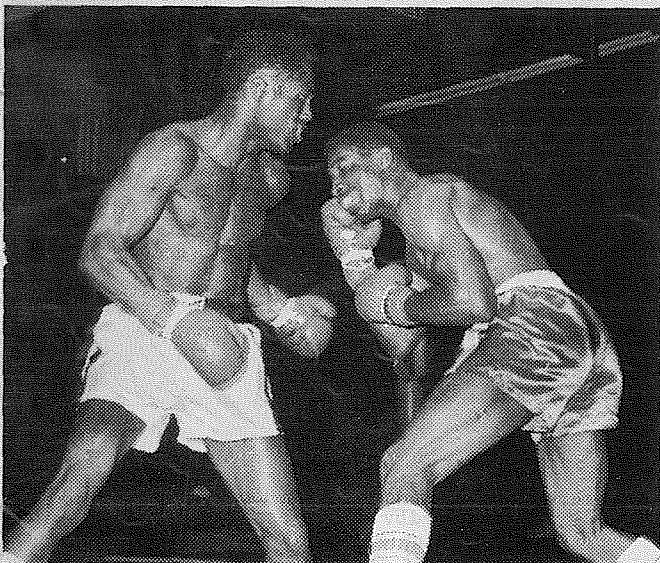

By taking fourth place Brown claimed \$800 in cash and prizes plus a handsome gold trophy. He also brought home a 3rd place heat race award.

Brown, who has been racing aircraft since 1963, said a change in the rules placed contesting planes on a horsepower handicap system and gave pilots flying lower-rated aircraft a fighting chance to win. The event is open to entries ranging from 180 to 300 horsepower. In the past horsepower has been the deciding factor.

The Bakersfield race pits each competitor's skill in a grueling 100 mile closed-course race. Participants fly about 35 feet above the ground with throttles wide open, which places a strong emphasis on the pilot's ability to maintain his aircraft while flying a tight formation around a series of pylons.

"I've raced motorcycles and cars, but nothing takes more concentration than participating in an air race," Brown stated and reminded, "There's no such thing as a hit, scrape or bounce."

The event was televised nationally by NBC News and was also televised throughout Japan by the National Japanese Network. Winning pilot was Mike Rust of Bakersfield, Canadian air ace John Spronk placed second, and Charles Fink of Fresno claimed third.

Brown flies out of Spanaway Airport and is a long-time resident of the Parkland - Spanaway area.

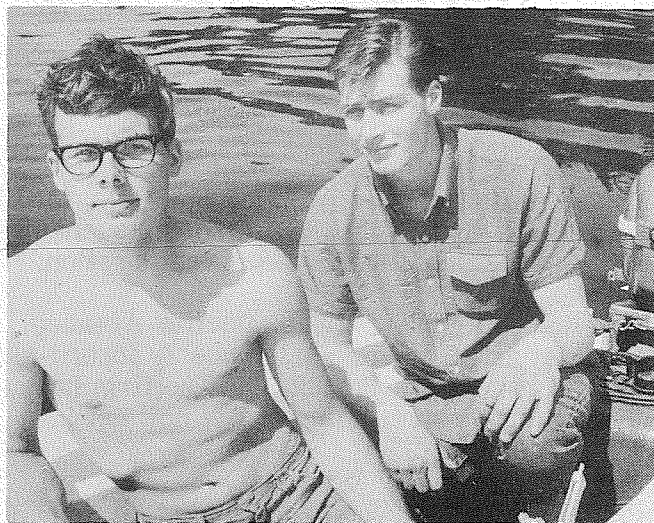
## Memorial Day Event

will take aerial photos at 1 p.m. to determine and verify winning boats.
