The 1965 graduate of Frank-

lin Pierce High School will receive 50 percent of all advance ticket sales. Pre-game ceremonies will begin at 7:30 p.m. and Terry will throw out the first baseball at 7:45.

To meet Terry on the street one could not realize that just a few months ago she was fac-ed with death because of her kidney failure. Following a case study at the Seattle Artificial Kidney Center, a kidney machine was installed in her

She and her mother recentcompleted a two-month training session at the Center and now spend three days each week going through the lifesaving process which is quite

Terry is placed on the machine for a period of six to seven hours a session. An artificial kidney must be constructed and placed on the machine before every treatment. Treatments, construction of a kidney and cleaning the artificial kidney machine require approximately 32

hours a week.
Other members of Terry's family include her father Arthur who is a wholesaler for equipment and materials used in installing and assembling interior flooring, her brother Jim who is a sophomore at Franklin Pierce, a sister Katty in the second grade and Mary who is enrolled in kindergar-

All six members of the family have adjusted their style

of living to Terry's problem The problem of finances was recognized and the challenge met by Mrs. Bud Hartman of Tacoma. Through the cooperation of the Bank of California a fund was established and as of May 17 the balance was \$6,545.88. It is estimated that \$14,000 will be needed the first year.

Members of the Tacoma Cubs visited Terry earlier this month to view the kidney treatment process. Visiting her were pitchers Arnold Earley, Bill Connors and Tom Mandile, catcher Vic Roznovsky and public relations director Ed Bowman.

Stevens Canyon Road Won't MakeOpeningDay

The Memorial Day target for opening the Stevens Canyon Road will probably not be met, Superintendent John To-wnsley reported today. b Crews working on the road

have encountered snow depths up to 40 feet and are already seven days behind schedule. Snow depths at Paradise on May 1 equalled the pre-

vious record of 259" in 1956. This is more than 8 feet over the 47-year average for May 1. Opening dates for other park roads are expected to be late also, Townsley said. The new target date for Sunrise is

July 1. No dates have been set for the West Side Road to Klapatche Point or for the Mowich Lake Road.

Trails at higher elevations are unlikely to be clear be-fore late July. Many of the lakes will be inaccessible when fishing season opens on the 4th of July. Park visitors planning to use the high country during July should be sure to check trail conditions be-

fore departing.
The road to Paradise, the East Side Road and the Carbon River Road, are all open Townsley said. Campgrounds at Ohanapecosh and Sunshine Point are open, as is the National Park Inn at Longmire. Paradise Inn will open on schedule on June 17.




