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Anchorage, Alaska, 3/17/57-A strange "ball of fire" flashed through the sky over the Matanuska Valley and plunged into the near mile-high Chugach mountain range. The "fire ball" sent up a plume of black smoke that was visible for more than 15 minutes over the Pioneer peak which dominates the scenery in the Palmer area. Clouds shrouded the majestic mountain a short while later, preventing a check by air of the nature of the "fire ball". The location of the peak is only 30 miles north of Anchorage on the main Anchorage-Palmer highway. In Anchorage it was learned that no planes were overdue or missing. The CAA and the Air Force both reported they had no inkling as to the nature of the crashing object. The "fireball" was reported at 6:30 p.m. to Territorial Policeman Gordon Nelson at Palmer by Aaron Houston who lives in the northern section of the Matanuska Valley agricultural town. Houston pointed out to Nelson a thin finger of smoke rising from towering Pioneer peak, thus confirming that something actually had plunged to Earth there.

El Cajon, Calif., 5/18/56—El Cajon police received six reports of a bright object moving across the valley from east to west about 7:35 p.m. First to call was Nelson Eshelman, who lives one and onehalf miles north of Santee on First Street. Five members of the family were sitting outside when the brilliant object moved over their heads. "It was a bright ball of light," said Eshelman. "It was hard to describe, but it moved about as fast as a jet and was about a foot across. There was no sound. It disappeared over Fletcher Hills."

Mr. and Mrs. Warren Taylor said they saw the object twice.
"It came from the north and circled to the west," said Mrs. Taylor. "It disappeared and I ran to the corner. I then saw it come back from the north and it moved rather slowly. It was a bright incandescent glow; hard to describe. It disappeared the second time north of Black mountain.

The Francis McCormick family said the object traveled slower than a jet. "I heard the commotion across the street and ran out," said McCormick. "It came from the northeast and travelled across the valley disappearing in the west." Michael McCormick, a freshman at El Cajon High and an amateur astronomer, ran to the back yard to get the object in his telescope, but it disappeared before he could catch it. "The object was soundless and about as big as a full moon," Michael said. "Later I saw several jets come over the valley and follow the same flight pattern."

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Butler reported seeing the object twice.

"I saw it first over the hills north of us," said Butler. "It was more than a foot across and gave off a light something like an arc welder. Later while driving to town we saw the same thing again. This time not more than 300 feet off the ground. It disappeared in Fletcher Hills. We went up there and talked to some small boys who saw the thing too." "I was fascinated. Jersey City, New Jersey, 10/22/55-A "very large, round shiny thing .\(. flying exceptionally fast,"\) was seen by a woman witness over Jersey City. She said the object was so bright "I thought at first it was a shooting star." The day was bright and clear. The time 11:00 a.m. The object was described as slightly larger than most four engine airplanes, flying in a northeasterly direction at ex-

She said it was not a jet. It sounded more like the engine of a conventional plane, "But much, much louder," she said.

A national uproar resulted in July 1952, when the Jersey City Ground Observer Corps reported an unidentified craft with the typical round, glowing form linked to the saucers.

Salta, Argentina, 4/13/56-National police headquarters in Beunos Aires, Argentina said an aluminum, cigar-shaped craft was spotted flying at great speed over northern Argentina on April 13, 1956. More than 50 persons in the province of Salta were said to have seen the craft, police said. The police statement said the craft was flying north to south, that it took less than three minutes to disappear from sight and that it left behind a miles-long trail of

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

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

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
