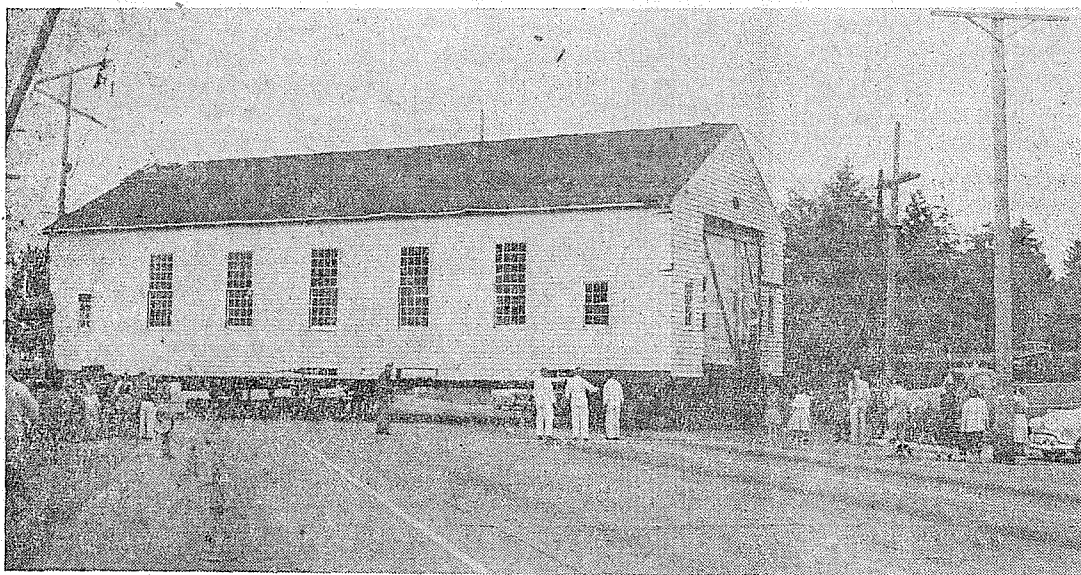

## Big Chapel Nears End Of Four - Day Journey



The chapel building shown above was moved through Parkland last week on its way from Fort Lewis to its new location at 12183 "A" street. There it will serve as the temporary sanctuary for the Parkland Methodist congregation while their present buildings at Pacific avenue and Wheeler streets will be used to house their expanding Sunday school. Electrical service was interrupted briefly as wires had to be cut to let the nearly 40-foot-high building pass. Traffic was held up for a short time on Pacific avenue as the building was moved across the highway and squeezed up narrow 121st

Work will begin immediately on repairing the building and constructing a small addition to it with the goal of having it in usable condition for a consecration service on Nov. 17.

This building marks the first step in a long range program to build a complete new sanctuary, fellowship hall and church school unit at this location. When construction of a new sanctuary has been completed, this chapel, then larger building, will be converted an integral part of the new and to use as church school space or a fellowship hall. Parkland's prep fans are concerned with the outcome of the West Central league and Puget Sound league conference which enter their fourth week games this coming weekend. Both league races seem to be developing into a two-team battle for the crown.

Renton and Clover Park have dominated play completely in the Puget Sound league while the Eatonville Cruisers and the Bethel Braves are riding high and handsome in the West Central. Franklin Pierce's Cardinals are still looking for their first win and are definitely out of the title picture though still hoping for a first division spot.

The Braves of Bethel have been winning on the ground in their first two league contests and Coach Ed Niehl hopes to come up with the passing attack for future games. It's difficult to win a prep title without a balanced attack. Eatonville, the other favorite, has not shown much in the aerial game, either, so the Braves may be able to take it after all.

travel alone. Take a buddy with you. If you should become separated, however, DON'T PANIC. Stay where you are and build a fire.

About your weapon—the shotgun or rifle with which you hope to bring home the big game:

The relentless accuracy of statistics each year show that about 2,200 persons will lose their lives due to the careless use of firearms. During hunting season the

The weapon doesn't control itself—YOU CONTROL IT! Never partake in horseplay with a weapon—whether it is loaded or not. Too many people are killed by weapons which aren't loaded.

There are many things which common sense will dictate that you do with or about your weapon; they apply whether you are on a rabbit or a bear track: carry the weapon so that it will point away from you and others, and never point it at anything you do not intend to kill. Open the breech before you inspect the barrel and never leave a loaded weapon unattended. Keep weapons and ammunition out of the reach of children, PERIOD!

Anchorage, Alaska, 8/17/57—A strange "ball of fire" flashed through the sky over the Matanuska Valley and plunged into the near mile-high Chugach mountain range. The "fire ball" sent up a plume of black smoke that was visible for more than 15 minutes over the Pioneer peak which dominates the scenery in the Palmer area. Clouds shrouded the majestic mountain a short while later, preventing a check by air of the nature of the "fire ball". The location of the peak is only 30 miles north of Anchorage on the main Anchorage-Palmer highway. In Anchorage it was learned that no planes were overdue or missing. The CAA and the Air Force both reported they had no inkling as to the nature of the crashing object. The "fireball" was reported at 6:30 p.m. to Territorial Policeman Gordon Nelson at Palmer by Aaron Houston who lives in the northern section of the Matanuska Valley agricultural town. Houston pointed out to Nelson a thin finger of smoke rising from towering Pioneer peak, thus confirming that something actually had plunged to Earth there.

El Cajon, Calif., 5/18/56—El Cajon police received six reports of a bright object moving across the valley from east to west about 7:35 p.m. First to call was Nelson Eshelman, who lives one and one-half miles north of Santee on First Street. Five members of the family were sitting outside when the brilliant object moved over their heads. "It was a bright ball of light," said Eshelman. "It was hard to describe, but it moved about as fast as a jet and was about a foot across. There was no sound. It disappeared over Fletcher Hills.

Mr. and Mrs. Warren Taylor said they saw the object twice. "It came from the north and circled to the west," said Mrs. Taylor. "It disappeared and I ran to the corner. I then saw it come back from the north and it moved rather slowly. It was a bright incandescent glow; hard to describe. It disappeared the second time north of Black Mountain.

The Francis McCormick family said the object traveled slower than a jet. "I heard the commotion across the street and ran out," said McCormick. "It came from the northeast and travelled across the valley disappearing in the west." Michael McCormick, a freshman at El Cajon High and an amateur astronomer, ran to the backyard to get the object in his telescope, but it disappeared before he could catch it. "The object was soundless and about as big as a full moon," Michael said. "Later I saw several jets come over the valley and follow the same flight pattern."

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Butler reported seeing the object twice. "I saw it first over the hills north of us," said Butler. "It was more than a foot across and gave off a light something like an arc welder. Later while driving to town we saw the same thing again. This time not more than 300 feet off the ground. It disappeared in Fletcher Hills. We went up there and talked to some small boys who saw the thing too." "I was fascinated. It moved slowly enough that I could get out of the car and watch it. I sure wish I knew what it was."

Jersey City, New Jersey, 10/22/55—A "very large, round shiny thing" flying exceptionally fast, was seen by a woman witness over Jersey City. She said the object was so bright "I thought at first it was a shooting star." The day was bright and clear. The time 11:00 a.m. The object was described as slightly larger than most four engine airplanes, flying in a northeasterly direction at extremely high speed.

She said it was not a jet. It sounded more like the engine of a conventional plane, "But much, much louder," she said. A national uproar resulted in July 1952, when the Jersey City Ground Observer Corps reported an unidentified craft with the typical round, glowing form linked to the saucers.

Salta, Argentina, 4/13/56—National police headquarters in Buenos Aires, Argentina said an aluminum, cigar-shaped craft was spotted flying at great speed over northern Argentina on April 13, 1956. More than 50 persons in the province of Salta were said to have seen the craft, police said. The police statement said the craft was flying north to south, that it took less than three minutes to disappear from sight and that it left behind a miles-long trail of white vapor.

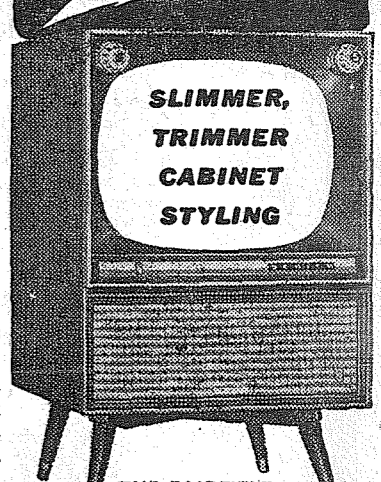

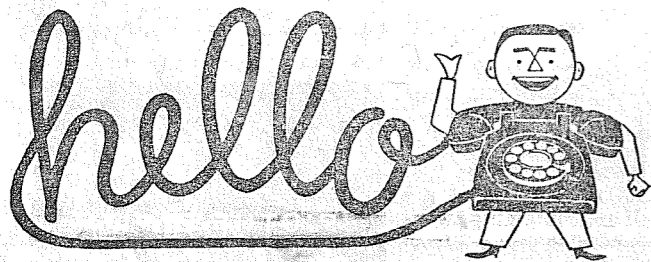

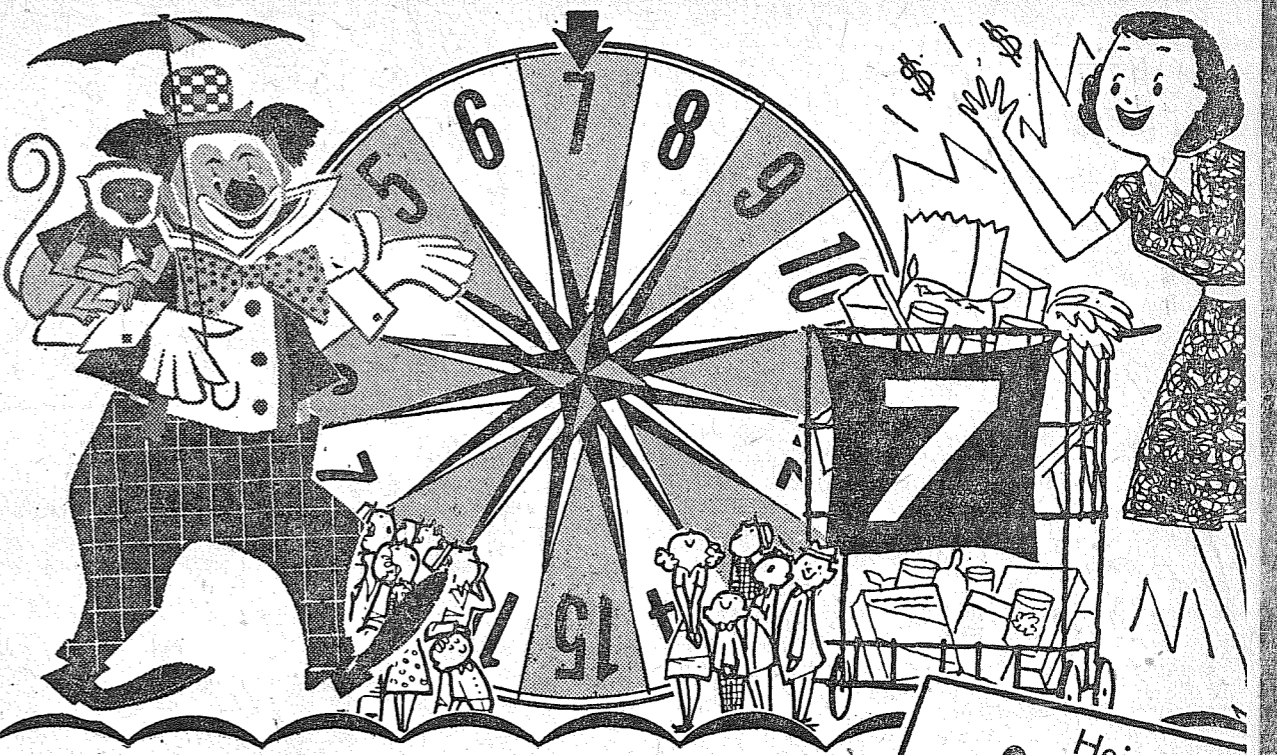
