## PLC CONTRACTS FOR BUILDING

\$200,000 SCIENCE HALL IOB IS LET WEDNESDAY TO START AT ONCE

Dr. S. C. Eastvold, president of Pacific Lutheran College, announced Wednesday, May 1, that VOL. 1, NO. 34 the contracts to build a new science hall on the college campus had been let and that construction of the \$200,000 building will begin immediately. The executive committee of the board of trustees of the school, together with some of the interested contractors, were present as the architect, Mr. John Richards, opened and read the sealed bids. The general contract was let to George Warter, the plumbing, heating and ventilating contract to the Bergh-Griggs Co., and the electrical contract was awarded to the Raymond Electric

The actual cost of constructing the building will be approximately \$170,000. With the equipment already on hand, which will be moved into the building when it is completed, in about six months, the total value of the structure will be over \$200,000.

Very Fine Building The following description of the building was written by Dr. Jordahl, who is the head of the Physisc department at PLC.

The new science building for PLC will be a three story structure of fire-resistant construction veneered with brick and stone to match the library building in appearance.

The building is to be 100 feet by 50 feet and will be located directly south of the library building and west of the present gym. The ground floor will accommodate the physics department and the main lecture room for the three science departments. The latter will have seats for about 80 students and has a stepped floor so that all will be able to see the lecture table. This room will have forced circulation of air and thermostatically controlled heat.

For the use of the physics department will be: a beginners' laboratory, 19 feet by 39 feet, which will accommodate up to 22 students; an advanced laboratory, 19 feet by 29 feet, for 16 students; a classroom, 27 feet by 20 feet; an aparatus room and office. Second Floor

The second floor of the science building is devoted to the biology department. There will be a classroom, 25 feet by 30 feet; three laboratories for animal zoology, physiology and bacteriology; office, preparation room, stock room and dark room.

The chemistry department is located on the third floor. Here are large laboratories (25 feet by 44 feet) for inorganic and for organic chemistry and a smaller laboratory (25 feet by 30 feet) for analytical chemistry, an office, a large centrally located stock room, a balance room, and a combined coat room and exit.


#### OLD-FASHIONED PIE SOCIAL FOR SOUTH END





#### Homes for Veterans

One hundred twenty-five thousand veterans have borrowed more than \$500,000,00 under the Veterans Administration loan guarantee program since the passage of the revised G.I. Bill of Rights 10 months ago. Over 90 percent of the money borrowed was used to build or purchase homes. These facts indicate that the loan provisions of the G.I. bill are working and that many veterans are receiving the benefits which were intended by the framers of the act.

However, there are many more applications for loans rejected than there are accepted. The chief reason being the disparity between appraisals made by the VA and the lending institutions. The price ceilings for new houses generally are 10 percent or more above the reasonable value on which G.I loans are based.

With the emphasis today upon homes for veterans it is urgent that the present system be made practicable. It is encouraging to note that General Omar N. Bradley, Veterans Administrator, has called the situation to the attention of Housing Administrator Wilson Wyatt in an attempt to get the financing of new homes for veterans in line with present day actualities in the building trades.

The reason for passage of the loan provisions of the G.I bill was to give the veteran who had been denied the normal Knees and Heels opportunities of working and saving the same oportunity to Need Healing have his own home, farm or business that he would have had if he had been allowed to stay at home and put aside through ordinary methods the collateral which lending agencies require. Unless the act can be revamped so that it will work for all, it is worse than nothing, as it has stirred the hopes of thousands of returning servicemen.
