Parkland Post Office Receipts Show a 24% Increase Over 1944 Annual Business

Postal receipts at the Parkland Postoffice for the first three quarters showed an increase of over 24 per cent, according to Roy Peterson, Parkland postmaster.

The business for the first nine months reached \$9,624.67. Receipts for the same period in 1944 ran to \$7,275.07.

In addition to the postal sales, the Parkland postoffice sold approximately \$8,000 in motor vehicle licenses. War stamps sales totaled \$110,000, while war bond

Memorial Services For Lt. Robt. Benson

A Memorial Service for Lt. Robert J. Benson will be conducted at the Parkland Ev. Lutheran Church, W. C. Gullikson, pastor on Sunday October 7th at 2:30 p. m. Lt. Benson, co-pilot of a B-24, was reported missing in action over Germany on September 11, 1944. Recently the government confirmed his death.

Lt. R. J. Benson was a graduate of Parkland Public School and Lincoln High School (1940). He attended Knapp's Business College and was later associated with the United States Engineers stationed at McChord Field, at Yakima and at Euphrata, Washington. In April 1943 he was called into the Army Air Corp.

Lt. Benson received his training at Santa Ana, Rankin Aerological School, at Tulare and Merced, California. His advanced training was received at Fort Douglas, Arizona from which he graduated in February, 1944, and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant. Later transferred to Casper Field, Wyoming, he was made a co-pilot of a B-24 and left for overseas duty about the 8th of June, 1944.

The Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster for Meritorious Service was presented to his mother, Mrs. Jenny Benson.

Lt. Robert J. Benson also received the Purple Heart and Memorial Scroll from President Harry Truman.

IMPROVEMENTS TO COST MORE THAN \$97,000

MORE NEW BUILDINGS EXPECTED IN FUTURE

Seven new buildings are under construction in the South End and the approximate cost for the new business firms is over the \$97,000 mark.

A community grocery store by Gus Clemans, Tacoma Ave. and Sales Road, at a cost of \$10,000. The building is 36x72 in size.

Cold storage lockers by Harris Victor at Brookdale at a cost of \$10,000. The building will be 70x64.

Leroy Market on the Mountain Highway at an approximate cost of \$700.

The new Prairie Theatre, across the street from Parkland School, at \$50,000 figure.

R. E. Pochel, South End oil distributor, is putting up a warehouse and a service station building that will run well over \$20,000.
