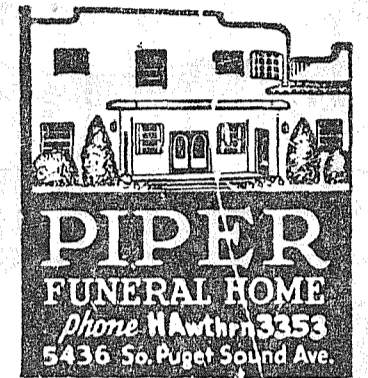

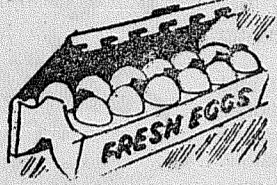

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Upside Down Ham Loaf

3 Tablespoons brown sugar
9-oz. can crushed pineapple, well drained
1/4 lb. ground lean pork
1/4 lb. ground smoked ham

1 cup fresh bread crumbs
1/4 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 teaspoons dry mustard

Sprinkle brown sugar in bottom of loaf pan holding about 5 cups. Spread pineapple over sugar. Mix well rest of ingredients. With back of spoon, press meat mixture firmly on top of pineapple in loaf pan. Bake on center rack of 350 oven (moderate) about 1 hour, or until loaf is brown. Let stand in pan 5 min. before turning out on platter to serve. Makes 4 servings.

They are up-to-date concerning any particular field-raising of livestock at least and in many other subjects too, I believe. Mrs. Cromwell, the librarian there, seems very anxious that the library be current with all the latest information.

Was out in the Eatonville-Kapowsin area the other day. Olaf and Peter Gund were about to start applying ammonium sulphate to their pastures, spread their barnyard manure and build a new homemade squeeze chute for treating their beef cattle. Mrs. Thiel, over at Kapowsin, was trying to interest other parents there in a new 4-H club. Floyd Larkin, down at Eatonville, was mentioning how enthusiastic the people there are over their community planning and development. Carl Langberg and the Eatonville boys 4-H club were planning a tour to see all the 4-H livestock projects, which he wants me to see with them too.

Precincts Listed For May 25 Vote

Roger Lunde VFW Would Outlaw Communism
Citizens in Parkland are urged to sign petitions asking Congress to outlaw the Communist party, as a result of action taken by Rodger Lunde Post No. 5052, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post Commander Richard Cogdill has announced.

The goal of the V.F.W., sponsored statewide campaign, is to secure 200,000 signatures to petitions, requesting Congress to enact appropriate legislation to outlaw the Communist party in the United States and making membership therein a criminal offense, Commander Cogdill said.

The Communist party in the U.S. is not a political party, the V.F.W. explains. Rather, it is part on an international conspiracy which seeks to overthrow the government of the U.S. by force of violence. Positive evidence that this international conspiracy has as its objective the destruction of our form of government has been presented before the Congress of the U. S. and is a matter of public record, State Commander Helbig declared. Post Commander Richard Cogdill announced a goal of 10,000 signatures to the petitions in the Parkland area. This is every citizen's chance to strike a positive blow against the Communist menace, said Commander Cogdill.

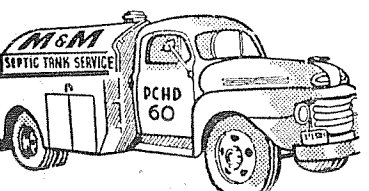

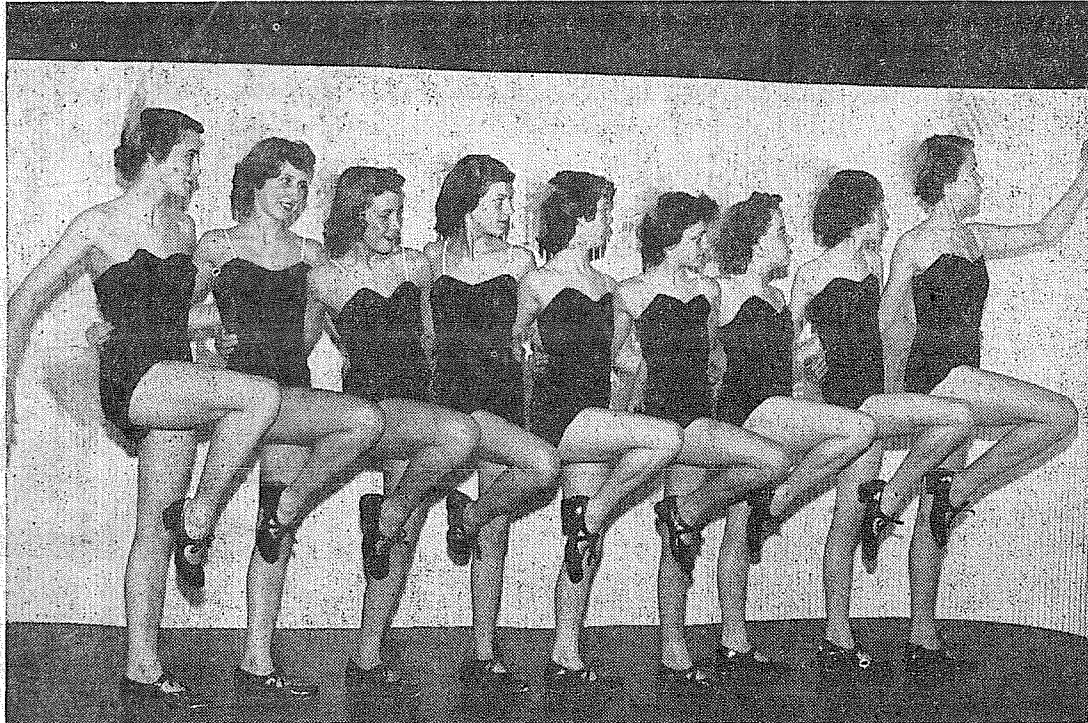

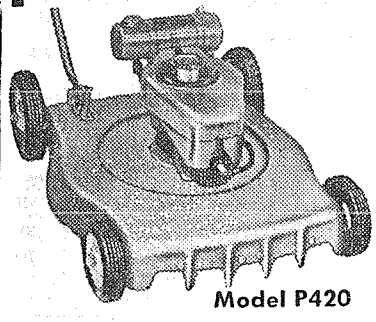
