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## AMERICAN LEGION MEETS DRAW BIG ATTENDANCE HERE

What looms as one of the best state conventions of the American Legion in years, will open on Thursday, Aug. 14, in Tacoma.

The promise of a hot election fight between Lloyd Stoddard of Everett and Maurice Needham of Shelton for the post of department commander plus debates over scores of controversial resolutions will enliven the three-day business sessions of the veterans conclave.

Stoddard, a World War II veteran and two-term commander of Everett Legion post, is competing with Needham, a World War I veteran for the number one state legion position. Needham is a former district commander.

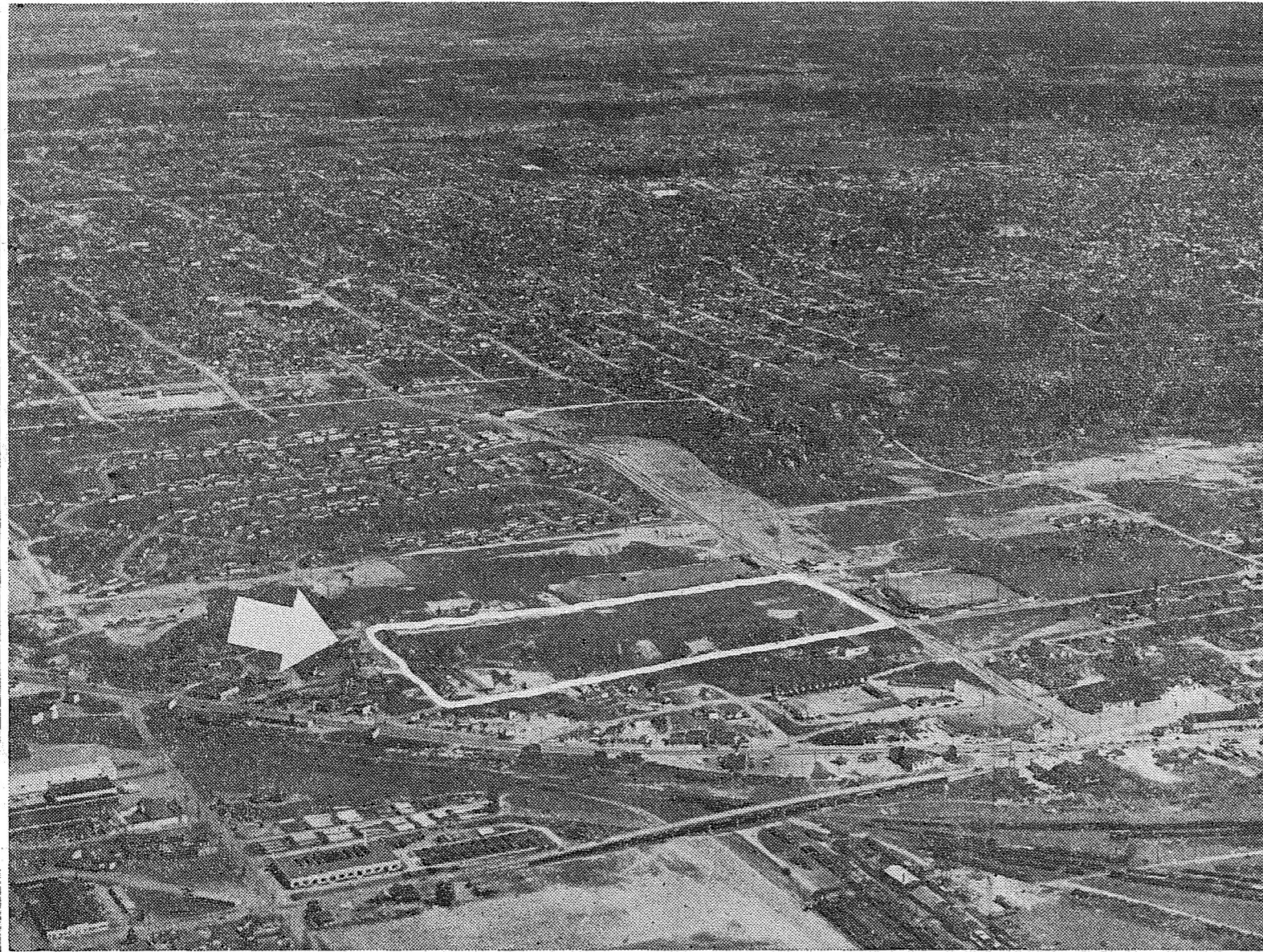
The fight over the Legion command will focus added attention on a resolution drawn up by Raymond post No. 150 asking an amendment of State Legion constitution to provide for a nomination committee composed of a chairman and representatives of all Legion districts to propose names of candidates for Legion elective positions.

Under present laws, any post may propose a candidate for elective office.

Resolutions asking for a permanent legislative committee to investigate un-American activities in Washington and the rescinding of the state legislature's endorsement of a World Government proposition, will face the delegates attending the meet.

Highlights of the convention will be the pre-conclusive memorial services on Wednesday evening, Aug. 13; the opening session featuring addresses by National Commander Donald Wilson and U. S. Senator Harry P. Cain on Thursday; the grand convention parade on Friday and the election of officers on Saturday morning, Aug. 16.

Present registration is exceeding expectations according to Fred Fucck, state adjutant of the Legion. Approximately 5,000 delegates and guests will attend.



## PROPOSED LOCATION OF CITY-COUNTY BUILDING

It is being proposed by a joint committee of businessmen representing Tacoma, Parkland, Puyallup, Gig Harbor, Buckley, Lakewood and other Pierce county areas that the location represented by the outlined portion of the above aerial photo be accepted by the commissioners as the location for the new City-County building.

The tract, as seen from the west, is bordered by So. 38th St. on the south, 36th St. on the north, Cedar St. on the east and Lawrence St. on the west. South Tacoma Way can be seen making a long loop in the foreground, joined at the lower right by the Union Ave. viaduct.

The benefits of this location over others presently offered, as pointed out by the county group advocating this location include the lower cost of

acquisition of property at this site over the downtown property and the lower cost of parking facilities which is estimated to be one million one hundred thousand dollars less at the 38th St. site.

The proposed location is easily accessible to all residents of the county and city because of the converging of all main highway arteries at this point.

The group has gone on record as favoring support of the construction of the new building provided that the planning commission, the county commissioners and the city council members include the clause on the ballot that a public hearing be held prior to the final selection of the site and that a ceiling be placed on the amount of money which could be spent for this new building.—(Engraving courtesy The Star.)

## STEILACOOM IN CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

Parkland is invited to the Steilacoom 1952 summer celebration to help commemorate 100 years of continuous United States postal service to Steilacoom. The dates and the celebration are Aug. 15, 16 and 17.

Friday, Aug. 15, there will be a card party in the Town Hall beginning at 8 p. m.—all games. The town chess and bridge championships will be announced.

Saturday starts at 10 a. m. with a spectacular parade. In line of march will be the color guard of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, drum and bugle corps, fun-making and also symbolic floats, decorated cars, a children's section, horses and riders and many surprise entries to add color to the cavalcade. The parade will pass in review before judges on the stand near the post office. A band concert and vaudeville acts will follow the awarding of prizes to the winning entries.

After the parade there will be a ball game, and antique and hobby show, bingo, tea in the Tollefson gardens, which feature tuberosus begonias at this time, dances at the Indian village near the Town Hall, and in the evening the big dance in the Town Hall with Elsdon's orchestra.

Sunday, the famous annual salmon barbecue dinner by the V. F. W. will start at 12:30 at Saltar's Point (in Steilacoom). At 1 p. m. a brilliant regatta of small craft will pass the Point. This delightful flotilla will be reviewed by the judges aboard the James V. Bennett, by courtesy of Fred T. Wilkinson, warden of the U. S. Penitentiary at McNeil island, and prizes will be awarded. Announcement of the winners will be made over a loud speaker system. At 2 p. m. the Gowitz Boating club from Kelso presents a series of motor boat races. These, too, will be just off Saltar's point.

If you care to attend church on Sunday before going to the salmon barbecue dinner, two of the oldest churches in Washington are in Steilacoom and hold services every Sunday. The Catholic Church of the Immaculate Conception is the second oldest church north of the Columbia river. Mass is at 9:30 a. m. The Oberlin Congregational Community church is Protestant and services are at 11 a. m. This is a continuation in congregation of the first Methodist church north of the Columbia river. Both churches have monuments commemorating their beginnings. Other historical markers have been placed at 20 points in Steilacoom for those seeking such information. As you may know, Steilacoom is the oldest incorporated town in Washington and has great historical significance for our part of the country.

Steilacoom especially invites you to come and bring your family and your friends for any and all events. There will be fun for everyone.

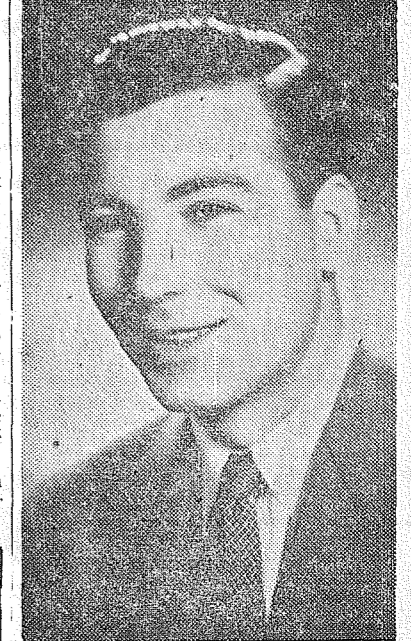

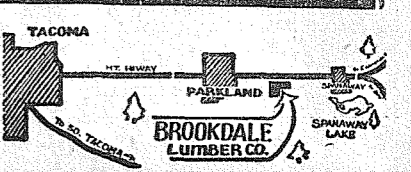

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Tuna Stuffed Tomatoes**

4 large, fresh tomatoes  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
2 Tablespoons vinegar  
1/2 cup Pet Milk

1/2 cup canned tuna, flakes  
2 1/2 cup diced celery  
2 diced, hard-cooked eggs  
1/4 cup finely cut pickle  
4 lettuce leaves

Turn blossom end of tomatoes down and cut almost through in 6 sections. Sprinkle insides with 1/2 teasp. salt. Chill. Put 1/4 teasp. salt, pepper, mustard, vinegar and milk into jar. Cover and shake well. Add dressing to mixture of tuna, celery, eggs and pickle. Chill at least 1 hour. Keep chilled until ready to serve. At serving time, put a lettuce leaf on each of 4 salad plates. Place a tomato on each leaf. Fill with equal parts of salad mixture.

The insurance in force of five billion dollars provides security and protection to Sun Life policyholders who own nearly two million policies; the amount includes Group life insurance which now stands at more than \$1-380,000,000, an increase during the first six months of the current year of more than \$125 million, or 10%. As a result, individuals on the Group Pension plans are not included in any of the above figures.

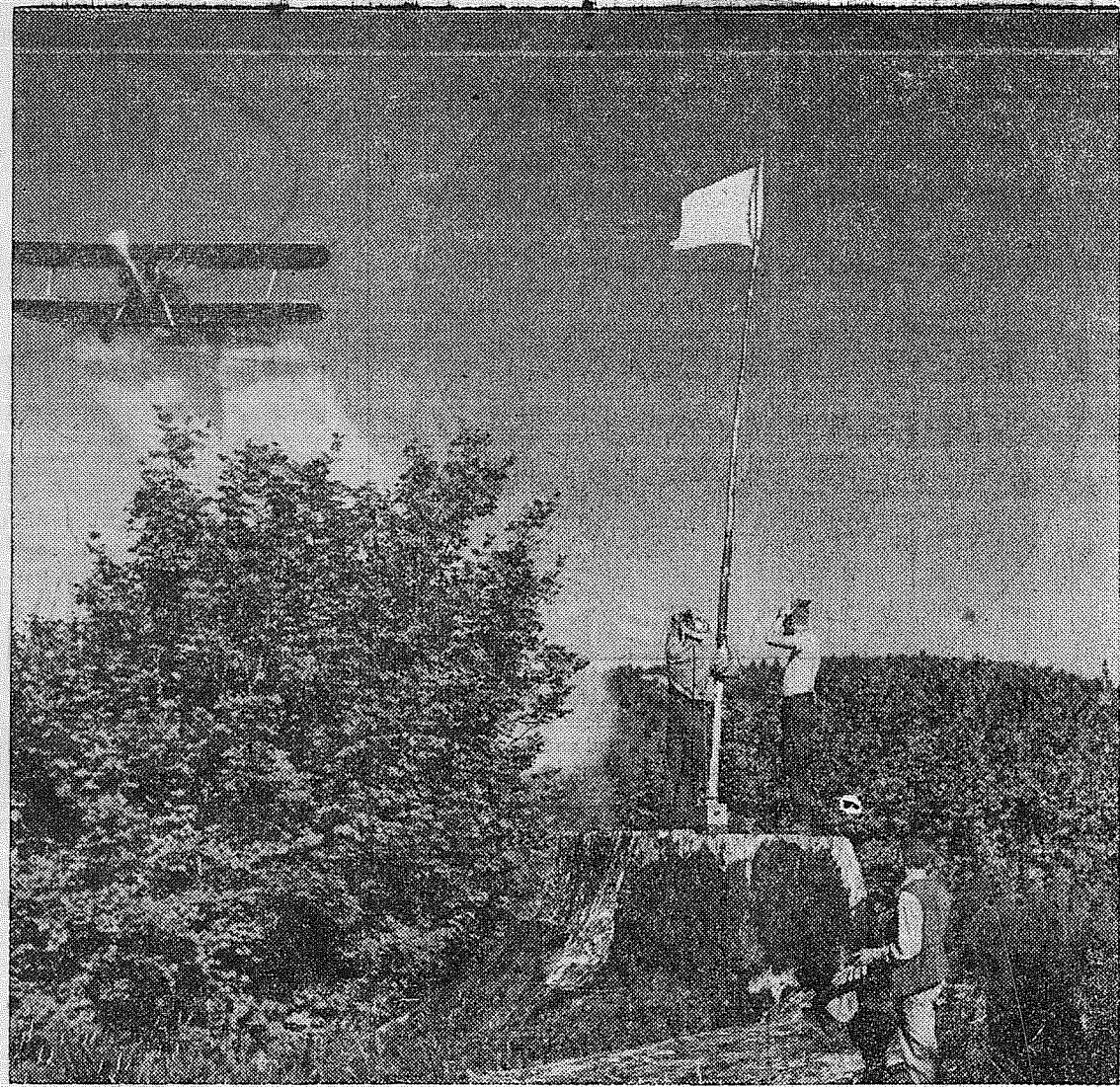

## Legal Advice Available To Military Personnel

### Personal Affairs Officers Are Base Contacts for Assistance

Many of us in the Armed Forces are not acquainted with a lawyer, or are unable to pay for a lawyer's services. Yet we may need the advice of a lawyer to help in putting our personal affairs in order.

To meet this need, legal assistance officers have been appointed in most military organizations. They can help you in many ways, but don't ask them to act as process servers or collection agents.

Cases requiring the assistance of a civilian lawyer are referred by the legal assistance officer—through the appropriate state bar association—to capable legal advisers.

Whether you will be charged for services rendered by a civilian lawyer and the amount of the charges, if any, are matters to be decided by the lawyer and yourself. He is entitled to a fee, but often will charge a member of the Armed Forces a nominal fee or, for simple cases, no fee at all.

If you or your dependents are not

able to contact a legal adviser, you may address a request for legal advice to the Legal Assistance Branch, Officer of the Judge Advocate General, Department of the Army, Washington 25, D. C.; or to the Chief Legal Assistance Branch, Office of the Judge Advocate General of the Navy, Washington 25, D. C.; or to the personal affairs officer at the nearest Air Force base.

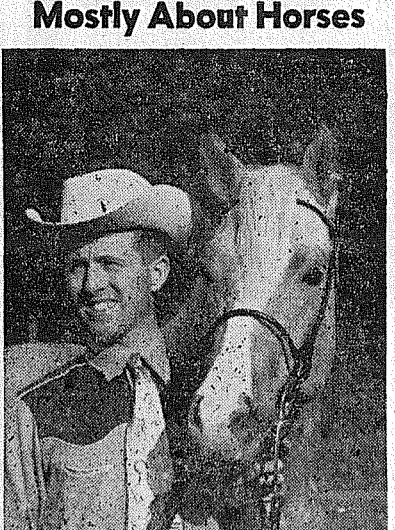
