EISENBACHER WILL APPEAR BEFORE CLUB MEETING APRIL 10

Tacoma's Fire Chief Chas. J. Eisenbacher will appear before the Parkland Community Club next Thursday night at its meeting in the Parkland school, starting at 8 o'clock. This is the regular April meeting of the group. Ray Renwick, president of the club, said Monday that with the coming election for more Parkland department funds, he felt that a full presentation of fire department benefits to the community should be given. Therefore, Mel Pedersen, chairman of the program committee, arranged to have Chief Eisenbacher speak. He will explain what it takes to keep a fire company up to top efficiency. There has been fine cooperation between the Tacoma firemen and Parkland's department and the club officials expressed pleasure at having been able to secure Chief Eisenbacher at this time.

On the lighter side, the club members will be entertained with music by the "Hungry Five" and a vocal solo by Rev. Walther C. Gullixson of Parkland. The group of five boys which make up the Hungry Five, are students in the Puyallup high school and they ave gained considerable fame. throughout the Puget Sound area. Library Facilities

Of prime importance for the business session is the providing of adequate space for the Parkland station of the Pierce County Library. The station is now located in a small room in the basement of the Parkland school. better housing facilities. It is expected that this committee will have a ull report on the matter next Thursday night and some definite action by the Comnunity Club is planned.

The Meaning of Faster

HE doctrine of immortality was not entirely new when Ð Iesus came. Easter, the spring festival, gave a hint of life immortal. The caterpillar changing to the butterfly, which was called "pysche," the Greek word for soul, and the flowers rising from the dead earth spoke eloquently, if faintly, of the hope of life immortal, that springs eternal in the human breast.

The resurrection of Jesus intensified that hope, purified and enriched its meaning, gave it assurance, authority, conviction and power. The resurrection of Jesus sanctifies our sorrow, gives a note of victory to the dying, imparts strong comfort and consolation as we weep over passing loved ones. It teaches the sacredness and essential greatness of human personality and the great worth to God of the individual soul, despite its deepest humiliations. The resurrection of Christ has thrown a splendid light on human nature and given us a new sense of self respect. It has deprived death of its sting and the grave of its victory, it has delivered us from the paralyzing power of fear and revived all human life with a mighty hope which shall not fail.

But Jesus rose from the dead not merely to show that a dead body could live again, but to demonstrate that He has the power to raise to newness of life souls dead in trespasses and sins. The resurrection stands for the possible emancipation of individuals and nations from the evils which are destroying them. Every sinful man must be saved by a spiritual resurrection within himself or there is no salvation for him. There is no hope except by a spiritual transformation. We need the miracle of Easter within the soul, the power of His resurrection. Individual souls have experienced it and rejoiced in its mystic power and marvelous energy. They have been raised from moral death to spiritual life.

Glorious as that is the resurrection means much more than individual salvation. In these days when the moral order has been turned upside down by war and all the passions of hell let loose and glorified by patriotism, the cross of Christ still proclaims the sinfulness of sin, and the resurrection of Christ promises the resurrection of truth and the victory of righteousness.

Whole nations need and may come under the power of the resurrection. Dead religions and dead civilizations can be touched by the power of the risen and living Christ. After the temple in Jerusalem had been destroyed and the Jewish people scattered, it was th power of the risen Christ which re-inspired its chief doctrines. In the resurrection of Christ Judaism rose from its ashes in transfiguration splendor. Its laws became vivified by the spirit of life in Christ Jesus. In the ministry of the apostles who "proclaimed in Jesus the resurrection from the dead" these truths of Judaism became a missionary power, a converting and civilizing power. In the power of the resurrection at pentecost the great truths of a failing religion were given a new interpretation, clothed with power from above and became a lifting and driving power, the power of God unto salvation. Spiritualized, energized, glorified in Jesus Christ great truths taught by ancient priests and prophets became the supreme moral factor in the life of mankind.

What the resurrection of Christ has done for religion it can do for civilizations. It has the power of concretion, gathering all truth and goodness to itself. It has the power of resurgence, coming again and again until men, taught by experience, accept it and practice it. Breathe that truth out as a message of comfort and hope to those who have lost loved ones, and who see the little crosses that stand in the fields of Normandy, Italy and the Pacific lands thick as daffodils in Puyallup valley. These crosses are not final. God has not finished. There is a triumph ahead for men of righteousness and goodwill. Evil is not eternal. There will come a day when men will have learned the ways of God and when wars will cease. He is alive! He is risen! and because he lives truth and peace and honor shall also live and reign.
