Members of the club are determined that this high school shall be the best possible. They have spent months investigating the high school situation to see just what kind of high school would be preferable and have endeavored to find out what steps are necessary to obtain the kind of high school they want. They have secured many authorities on education as speakers for their meetings so that the school situation could be explained to residents of Spanaway.

Recently they came out as being against using the CCC and the POW buildings for a high school building. They don't want to waste time and money on temporary high school buildings. They want to give their children a high school they can be proud to attend and one that will be safe from any possibilities of fire.

If this is being against a high school, maybe the Spanaway Progressive Community Club is. We don't think so.

### Protect Your Health

Pierce county's mobile x-ray unit, paid for by the residents in Pierce county through their purchases of Christmas seals, will soon be in Parkland and Spanaway to give free examinations for tuberculosis.

Everyone who possibly can should take advantage of this opportunity to check up on their health, not only for their own sake, but for the sake of the community.

Mass x-ray surveys are now becoming familiar to all walks of life; industrial workers, office workers, students, teachers, hospitals and clinics, professional people, civil service and military personnel. It is a pre-employment requirement for positions.

Why should one have such an x-ray picture made?

Because an x-ray to these different groups of people throughout the country means added assurance that they are in good health. Tuberculosis in the lungs can be found by taking a good x-ray picture, when the outward symptoms are still unnoticed. This, with an examination by a good doctor, will tell if a person actually has the disease.

If the disease is found in its early stages and treatment started at once, one has every chance of getting well.

Be sure you do your part in maintaining good health for your family and community, by having an x-ray when the mobile x-ray unit comes to your community.





(Continued from Page One) ant sections of the community. There are now 14 hydrants ready for use. Five more have been ordered and, if delivery is right, will be installed during 1948. Hydrants and installation cost around \$1,800. There are also eight 2-inch stand pipes on smaller mains, making in all 22 outlets available for fire protection.

Well No. 1, located at Harrison and "G" streets, was improved by installing special bronze screen at the bottom of the well to check sand and small gravel which had been giving trouble in that area when pumping was being done during the summer months. This cost about \$2,000 and should correct this difficulty.

The replacing of a large main rom the public school to the Colins Road in Brookdale on the Mt. Highway and from the water tower north on "A" to 98th street has not been started on account of inability to secure 6-inch mains. When this is done, it will improve much needed water pressure in those districts and also afford an emergency tie-in with Midland water supply in case of need.

These projects, along with our gradually and steadily rising over nead, together with our regular maintenance, will take most of our profits for 1948.

We now have \$4,000 in our emergency reserve fund. This is being built up at the rate of \$500 per month toward the amount of \$10,000, as resolved by the cor poration a few years back.
