

This tower being assembled on a hilltop near Tenino is one of the four being erected at the relay points between Seattle and Portland. The other three sites are Orting, Castle Rock and Kalama. All of the towers are $37\frac{1}{2}$ feet high except that at Orting is 52 feet high. The steel in the structure will weigh 20 tons. Two antenna horns, each weighing a ton, will be mounted on top of each of the towers. All tower construction work is scheduled to be finished by the end of next week (June 7) after which the antennas will be mounted and the highly technical operation of aligning the horns and testing will proceed up to July 6. Also shown above is an artist's sketch of how the relay tower will look when it is completed.






