





2½ lb. cut-up chicken 1 cup Pet Milk ½ cup flour 2¼ teaspoons salt

Put chicken into bowl. Pour milk over chicken; let stand in refrigerator over chicken; let stand in refrigerator 2 hours or more. Drain well; save milk for gravy. Roll chicken in mixture of ½ cup flour, 1½ teasp. salt and ½ teasp. pepper. Drain on paper towel. Slowly heat ¼ in. shortening in heavy skillet.
