WIFE OF KOREA VET WINS BUICK; 25,000 PRESENT

M/Sgt. Arthur C. McAllister of 9645 Patterson St., in northern Parkland, came "marching home" from the war this week after ten months with the Second Division in the thick of the Korean conflict. And, thanks to the luck of his charming wife, he rode the final miles in a spanking new 1951 Buick sedan.

Mrs. McAllister copped the top award at the gigantic Jackpot drawing on the PLC lower campus last Friday night.

Some 24,999 other people who had come in hopes of winning the auto went home—not too disappointed but satisfied that they had participated in the biggest event of its kind in South End history. It was easily the largest crowd in local annals. In fact, some of the sheriff's deputies estimated the throng at 30,000.

Mrs. McAllister had never before won any contests; that is why she had bought a '51 Pontiac just three weeks ago so she would have a new car in which to greet her soldier-husband.

She had only 60 tickets in her collection, many of them acquired through her gasoline purchases at Nelson's Service, which supplied her with the winning ducat. Altogether, Parkland merchants handed out 918,000 tickets in the 13-week promotion. These were mixed up by a big cement mixer.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Fried Chicken with Milk Gravy
2 1/2 lb. cut-up chicken
1 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup flour
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
3 tablespoons flour
3/4 grains pepper
1/2 cup water
Put chicken into bowl. Pour milk over chicken; let stand in refrigerator 2 hours or more. Drain well; save milk for gravy. Roll chicken in mixture of 1/2 cup flour, 1 1/2 teasp. salt and 1/2 teasp. pepper. Drain on paper towel. Slowly heat 1/4 in. shortening in heavy skillet. Brown chicken slowly until drumstick is tender when pierced with a fork. Remove chicken; keep hot. Drain off all fat; measure and return 2 tablesp. fat to skillet. Blend in 3 tablesp. flour, 3/4 teasp. salt and few grains pepper. Stir in water. Boil and stir 2 min. Add milk drained off chicken; stir and heat until steaming hot, but do not boil. Serve with chicken. Makes 4 servings.

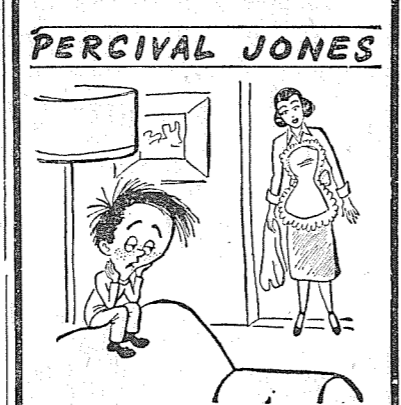

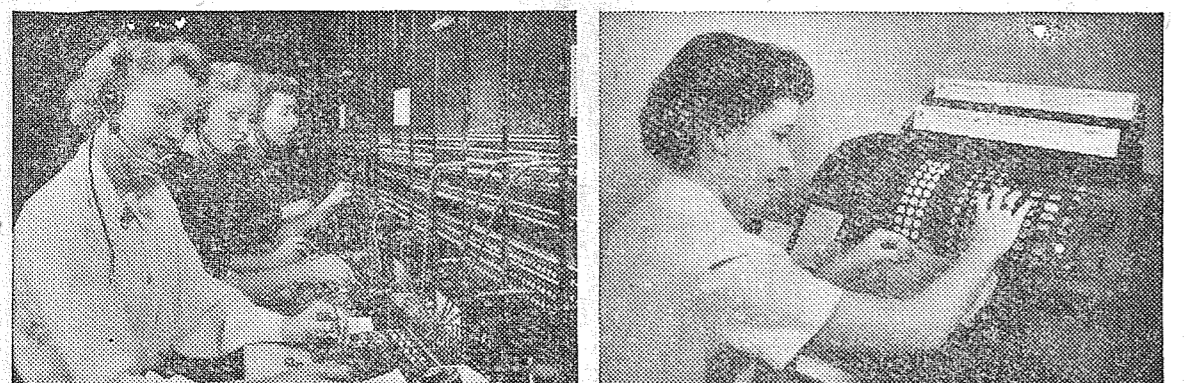

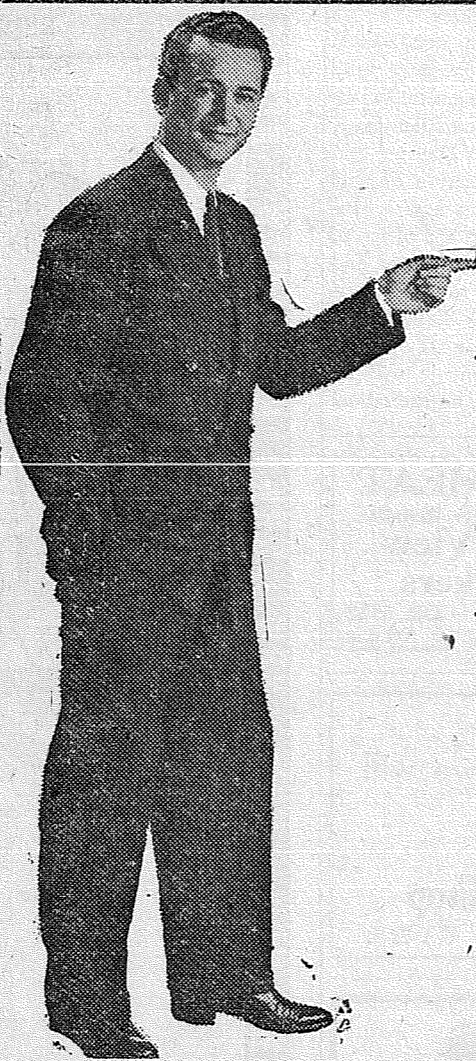
