

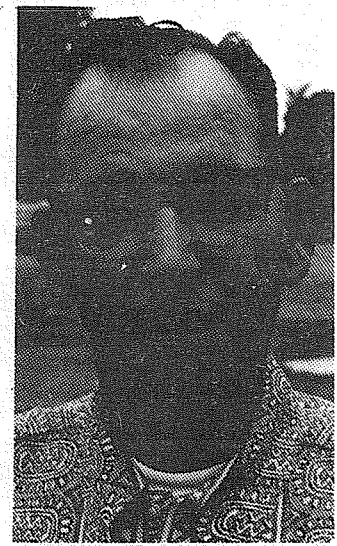

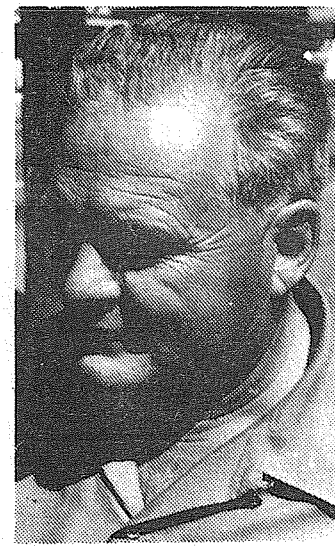

MORRIE ANDERSON, Parkland Lumber Dealer, saw the paper as the one thing that helped tie the community together.

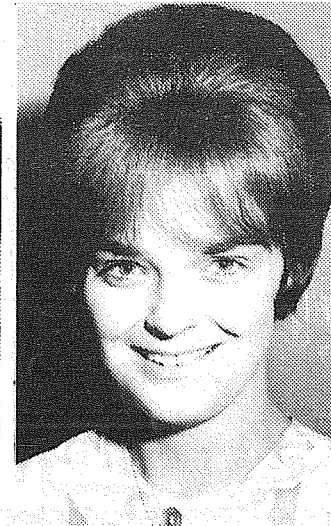
BOB MAGDANZ, manager Magdanz Hardware stated, "We've got to keep a paper in the community. I think subscriptions will give us a better paper."

Boeing Supplier First To Locate At Thun Field

PUYALLUP - A Boeing machine tool sub-contractor will be the first industry to locate in the Thun Field Industrial Park reported park officials Monday.

The sub-contractor will definitely be locating in the Park in 60 - 90 days said James Boyle, president of the Puyallup Valley Development Company. Declining to name the sub-contractor, Boyle said the industry would eventually have a working staff of 100 to 150 persons.

Negotiations are also underway for a second industry described by Boyle as a "electronics parts manufacturer" now located in California. The labor force would include 200-300 women in semi-skilled jobs. Boyle described the industry as "one of the greatest industries for the Puyallup Valley" in a talk before the Puyallup Valley Chamber of Commerce's noon forum meeting Monday at Anton's. He said the firm is not a

Boeing connected firm.

During the meeting Boyle described his recent trip to Los Angeles, Calif. as a delegate to the Ninth Annual Governors' Trade and Promotional Tour sponsored by the State Department of Commerce and Economical Development.

Boyle said the delegates chose industries from a key list of 200 to visit during the week - long conference. He said many of the progressive industries were looking to our State for possible future relocation and emphasized that many were definitely not interested in Oregon.

He told those attending Monday's meeting that many were working "energetically" for the Puyallup Valley and "respected" the goals established by the local Chamber of Commerce.

He estimated that 25 percent of the 125 industries visited by the local delegation in Calif. were specific prospects

6,000 High School Students To Seek Summer Employment

With all Pierce County schools ending classes this week for summer vacation nearly half of the almost 12,000 high school students will be seeking summer jobs according to R.E. Mathewson of the Youth Opportunity Center.

Those students will be searching for ways to finance their education or will be beginning their working career. "In addition to the high school students there will be thousands

of college students," said Eudora L. Peters, manager of the Washington State Employment Service's Youth Employment Center.

Federal departments and agencies have been directed by President Johnson to find meaningful work and training opportunities for these youth. Mrs. Peters emphasized, however, that the need cannot be met by government alone and that past success has been largely due to the favorable response of private employers.

She said more than 1,600 Pierce County employers have been contacted to develop additional job opportunities.

Interested employers, service clubs, unions and other groups able to provide summer jobs are urged to contact the Center at 514 S. 13th St., Tacoma, BR 2-4271.

Local high schools are also serving as "employment centers" for their students. Franklin Pierce High School vocational counselor Robert L. Boehlke has asked anyone with yard work, painting, repairing or any other type of work to contact him at LE 7-0211, Extension 28.

Quinton Smith of Orting High School is seeking summer work for Orting students and has asked employers to call him at 893-3581 if openings are available.

Counselor Randolph Hathaway of Puyallup High School and Frank Gustafson of Fife High School have both sent out appeals to local merchants or private citizens for summer jobs for members of their respective studentbodies.

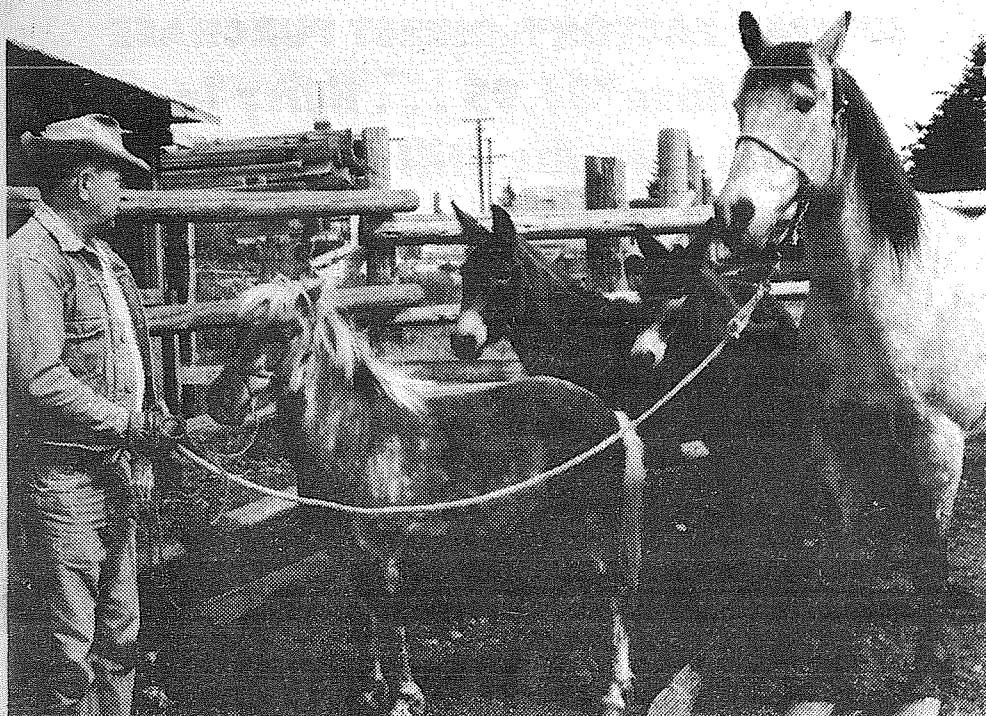

Sales Tax Hike Starts July 1

The new sales tax rate of 4.5% as passed by the Legislature will become effective July 1, according to George Kinnear, chairman of the Washington State Tax Commission.

Because different laws go into effect at different times, some confusion has resulted in the minds of the general public.

This date will be July 1, which is the beginning of the new biennium, or the start of the state's fiscal period.

The last of a series of public hearings was completed Monday before which the new rates could not become official. The Tax Commission will print the new schedule and distribute it to trade associations, banks and other public organizations.

Individuals may obtain a copy by writing the Commission office in the General Administration Building, Olympia, or any of the local Tax Commission offices, enclosing a self-addressed and stamped envelope.

Farm Youth Exchange Faces Active Season

The International Farm Youth Exchange Program, known as IFYE, will again be in its most active period locally this summer and fall, reports County Agent David Klemperer.

Delegates between age 20 and 30 from different countries will visit Washington and other states to live with host families for about two weeks at each home, learning about our way of life and explaining theirs. Although the foreign delegates are in some way connected with agriculture at home, they are interested in visiting not only farm families but those in urban or rural non-farm areas.

Any Pierce County family can apply to be a host family for an IFYE delegate by contacting County Agent David Klemperer at the County Extension office, 742 County-City Building, Tacoma, FU 3-3311, Ext. 511. Descriptive brochures about host family responsibilities and the IFYE program in general are available at the Extension office.

Past exchange experiences have proven to be very rewarding and enlightening for both hosts and delegates said Klemperer. "Host families have the satisfaction of know-

ing that they are making a contribution toward greater international understanding."

Klemperer stresses that host family applications should be made soon so that itineraries can be arranged for the visiting delegates. All families chosen to be hosts will be thoroughly briefed thru the Extension office about details of the IFYE visit and their responsibilities.

Members of the local IFYE committee, many of whom have been hosts themselves, will also meet with prospective host families to answer questions and familiarize them with procedures.

Wastate Rainier Heilo Laura 5086101, a five-year-old produced 20,770 lbs. milk and 739 lbs. butterfat in 365 days; Wastate Rainier Grandier Rita 5086106, a six-year-old, produced 21,880 lbs. milk and 722 lbs. butterfat in 305 days; Wastate Rainier Grandier Upton 5317973, a five-year-old, had 16,760 lbs. milk and 616 lbs. butterfat in 365 days. All are owned by State of Washington Rainier School, Buckley.

Can Inka Bess Dynamo 558-5930, a three-year-old owned by Wilcox Farms, Inc., Roy, produced 16,180 lbs. milk and 623 lbs. butterfat in 305 days.

These new production figures may be compared to the estimated annual output of 8,513 lbs. of milk and 315 lbs. of butterfat by the average U.S. dairy cow, notes the national Holstein Association.

Washington State University supervised the sampling, weighing and testing operations in cooperation with the Holstein organization's herd and breed improvement programs.

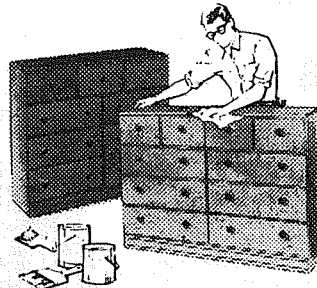

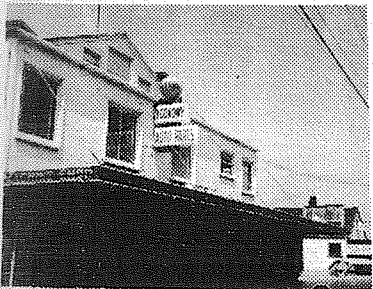

SPANAWAY - To the average fan attending Spanaway Speedway every Sunday, auto racing is super stocks in assorted horsepower and every color of paint imaginable banging through corners and straightaways in the least possible time.

True, that is the thrill of the sport, but there is another facet to the game that requires hours of concentration and attention to details in order for the racing card to run smoothly.

High atop the grandstand, a fairly large announcer's booth houses the nerve center of Spanaway. This is a communication center that is in constant touch with the pit area and is staffed by people who are as much a part of racing as the drivers themselves.



Al McLain

The voice of Spanaway belongs to Al McLain, who can be best described as a mobile card index. Al knows cars and drivers on sight, memorizing color schemes the same way a thoroughbred announcer learns the silks. He can spot

Ethel O'Neil

Probably the most exciting task during a 50 lap main is keeping track of the laps of each car. This responsibility falls under the rapidly moving pencil of Ethel O'Neil, a gal who attends every race but never sees any of them. Ethel's day at the track starts with the time trials, keeping an accurate ledger of times compiled by every car appearing on the 3/8 mile-asphalt surface. After completion of trials, the trophy dashes, heats and mains are organized and passed on to the pits and to starter Lucky O'Neil. By far the most hectic part of Ethel's job comes during the early laps of a 50 lap main when up to two dozen super stocks roar away to the wave of the green flag, each taking about 17 seconds to complete a lap, and every car must be logged as to position and laps completed. It is simply a "numbers" game with only one winner.



Hap Kemp

Another of the behind the scenes workers is timer Hap Kemp, an avid race fan as well as driver. Hap operates the clock from the first time trial to the final main of the day. It requires constant attention to detail and accuracy, each car being timed to the hundredth of a second in order to get his starting position. Hap is a big, raw boned man whose cherub faced features are split by a constant smile. A stickler for detail, he is all business at all times.

When you attend Spanaway Speedway this Sunday, take an occasional glance up to the announcer's booth and note the activity. There is constant communication between the pits, track and nerve center in order to give you the exciting race program you came to watch.

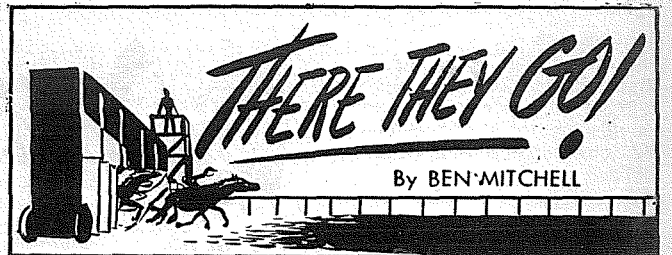

Pasture Management

\$1,000 Worth Of Milk Per Acre Within Reach

"\$1,000 worth of milk per acre is within reach of good pasture managers," promised County Extension Agent Frank Jackson in describing the Pierce County Soil & Water Conservation District annual pasture management tour.

Scheduled to start on the Bert Inglin farm west of South Prairie at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, June 20, grass farmers will see extra returns from rotation grazing.

"A former South Prairie town councilman and long-time farm leader, Inglin will have new seedings and irrigated pasture to show visitors", said Soil Conservationist Herb Gaines, tour chairman.

Moving on to the Arnold Ochsner farm on Werron Road, to top quality seeding of alfalfa and orchard grass can be compared to the silage it yields. Weed control plots will also be shown by County Weed Supervisor Harrison Ford.

"Lunch will be served on the Walt and Dave Schodde farm," promised Paul Morton, Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation office manager, and tour quartermaster.

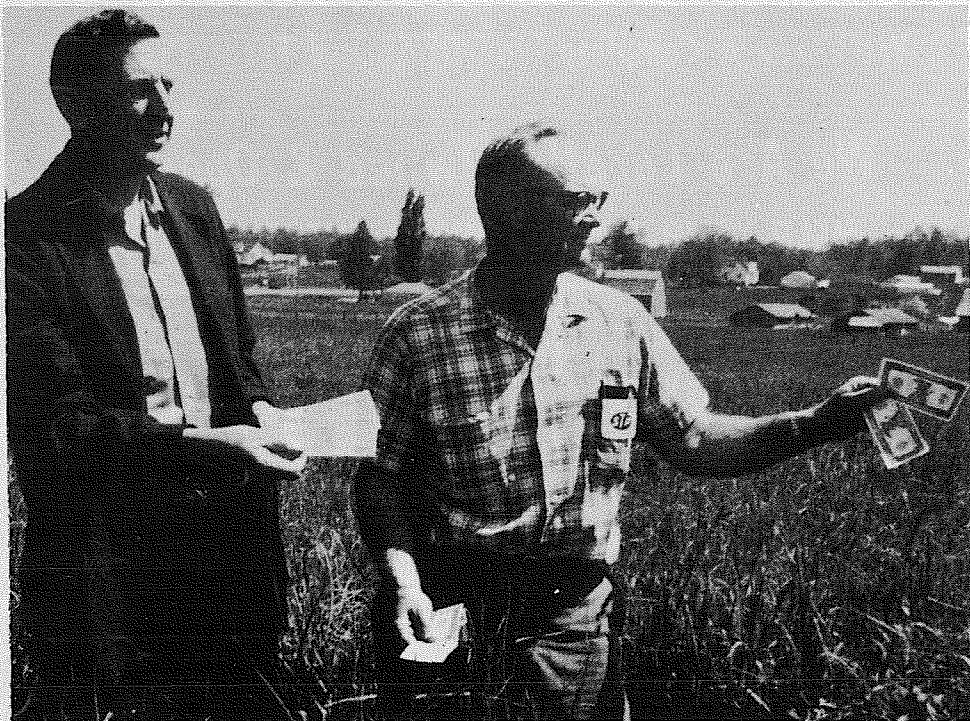
Visitors will be greeted after lunch by farm implement dealers, several of whom will demonstrate their latest forage harvesting and handling equipment.

For the first time in Western Washington, inexpensive plastic airtight silage storage will be demonstrated.

"Air-tight storage is the key to making haylage (low-moisture silage)", explained Jackson. "This development puts low-cost home-grown forages within the reach of even the part-time, small acreage grass farmer."

"I foresee the early re-

placement of custom hay balers," Jackson prophesied, "by custom haylage harvesters, right here in Pierce County."
