PUYALLUP - A Boeing machine tool sub-contractor will be the first industry to locate in the Thun Field Industrial Park reported park officials

The sub-contractor will definitely be locating in the Park in 60 - 90 days said James Boyle, president of the Puyallup Valley Development Company. Declining to name the sub-contractor, Boyle said the industry would eventually have a working staff of 100 to

Negotiations are also underway for a second industry described by Boyle as a "electronics parts manufacturer" now located in California. The labor force would include 200-300 women in semi-skilled jobs. Boyle described the industry as "one of the greatest industries for the Puyallup Valley' in a talk before the Puyallup Valley Chamber of Commerce's noon forum

meeting Monday at Anton's. He said the firm is not a Boeing connected firm.

During the meeting Boyle described his recent trip to Los Angeles, Calif. as a delegate to the Ninth Annual Gov-ernors' Trade and Promotional Tour sponsored by the State Department of Commerce and Economical Development.

Boyle said the delegates chose industries from a key list of 200 to visit during the week - long conference. He said many of the progressive industries were looking to our State for possible future relocation and emphasized that many were definitely not interested in Oregon.

school closes in June.



Sales Tax **Hike Starts** July 1

The new sales tax rate of 4.5% as passed by the Legis-lature will become effective July 1, according to George Kinnear, chairman of the Washington State Tax Commission.

Because different laws go into effect at different times, some confusion has resulted in the minds of the general public.

This date will be July 1, which is the beginning of the new biennium, or the start of the state's fiscal period.

The last of a series of public hearings was completed Monday before which the new rates could not become official. The Tax Commission will print the new schedule and distribute it to trade associations, banks and other public organizations.

Individuals may obtain a copy by writing the Commission office in the General Administration Building, Olympia, or any of the local Tax Commission offices, enclosing a self - addressed and stamped envelope.







Farm Youth Exchange Faces Active Season

The International Farm Youth Exchange Program, known as IFYE, will again be in its most active period locally this summer and fall, reports County Agent David Klemperer.

Delegates between age 20 and 30 from different count-ries will visit Washington and other states to live with host families for about two weeks at each home, learning about our way of life and explaining theirs. Although the foreign delegates are in some way connected with agriculture at home, they are interested in visiting not only farm families but those in urban or rural non-farm areas.

Any Pierce County family can apply to be a host family for an IFYE delegate by contacting County Agent David Klemperer at the County Extension office, 742 County-City Building, Tacoma, FU 3-3311, Ext. 511. Descriptive brochures about host family responsibilities and the IFYE program in general are available at the Extension of-

Past exchange experiences have proven to be very rewarding and enlightening for both hosts and delegates said Klemperer, "Host families have the satisfaction of knowing that they are making a contribution toward greater international understanding."

Klemperer stresses that host family applications should be made soon so that itineraries can be arranged for the visiting delegates. All families chosen to be hosts will be thoroughly briefed thru the Extension office about de-tails of the IFYE visit and their responsibilities.

Members of the local IFYE committee, many of whom have been hosts themselves, will also meet with prospective host families to answer questions and familiarize them with procedures.

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

SPANAWAY - To the average fan attending Spanaway Speedway every Sunday, auto racing is super stocks in assorted horsepower and every color of paint imaginable banging through corners and straightaways in the least possible time.

True, that is the thrill of the sport, but there is another facet to the game that requires hours of concentration and attention to details in order for the racing card to run smooth-

ly.

High atop the grandstand, a fairly large announcer's booth houses the nerve center of Spanaway. This is a communication center that is in constant touch with the pit area and is staffed by people who are as much a part of racing as the drivers themselves.



Al McLain

The voice of Spanaway belongs to AlMcLain, who can be best described as a mobile card index. Alknows cars and drivers on sight, memorizing color schemes the same way a thoroughbred announcer learns the silks. He can spot

Probably the most exciting task during a 50 lap main is keeping track of the laps of each car. This responsibility falls under the rapidly moving pencil of Ethel O'Neil, a gal who attends every race but never sees any of them. Ethel's day at the track starts with the time trials, keeping an accurate ledger of times compiled by every car appearing on the 3/8 mile-asphalt surface. After completion of trials, the trophy dashes, heats -and mains are organized and passed on to the pits and to starter Lucky O'Neil. By far the most hectic part of Ethel's job comes during the early laps of a 50 lap main when up to two dozen super stocks roar away to the wave of the green flag, each taking about 17 seconds to complete a lap, and every car must be logged as to position and laps completed. It is simply a "numbers" game with only one winner.



Hap Kemp

Another of the behind the scenes workers is timer Hap Kemp, an avid race fan as well as driver. Hap operates the clock from the first time trial to the final main of the day, It requires constant attention to detail and accuracy, each car being timed to the hundredth of a second in order to get his starting position. Hap is a big, raw boned man whose cherub faced features are split by a constant smile. A stickler for detail, he is all business at all times.

When you attend Spanaway Speedway this Sunday, take an occasional glance up to the announcer's booth and note the activity. There is constant communication between the pits, track and nerve center in order to give you the exciting race program you came to

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



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
