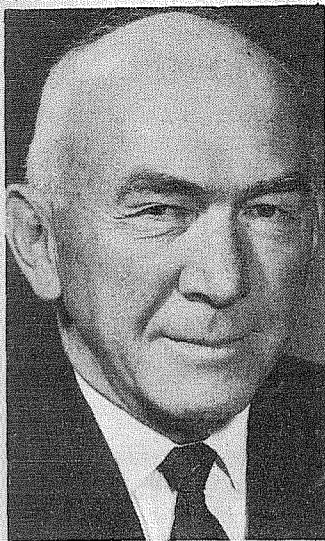


PLU Building To Be Named For C.O. Olson



Pacific Lutheran University's Board of Regents announced last Friday that the proposed physical education-auditorium building will be named in honor of Clifford O. Olson, former PLU coach and athletic director.

Olson, who lives at 874 120th St. S., is presently a Tacoma businessman.

In announcing the Board's decision, Dr. Robert A. L. Mortvedt, PLU president, said: "Few men have had a more distinguished career in the field of teaching and coaching than Cliff Olson. His teams brought glory to a small college and to the City of Tacoma."

The \$1,040,540 structure, complete with auditorium and

stage, will be erected this September. Completion is expected in the fall of 1968.

In his 14 years as head football coach, Olson's teams won the Washington Intercollegiate Conference title three years in a row, 1939-41, and gained national recognition in the process.

Following his resignation from PLU, Olson became manager of the Huth Estate in Tacoma. He held that position for ten years before becoming manager of the Lakewood Center.

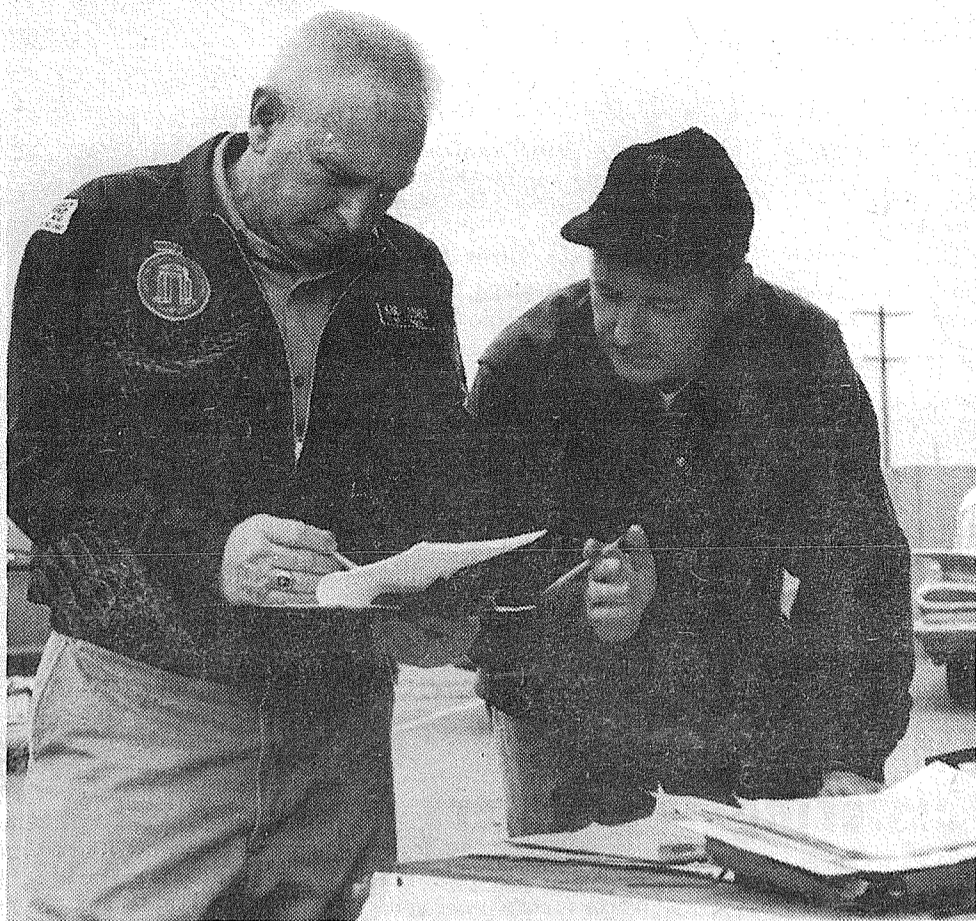
He joined the PLU staff again in 1963, this time as an associate in development. Olson stayed until 1965 when he became manager of the Medical Arts Building in downtown Tacoma.

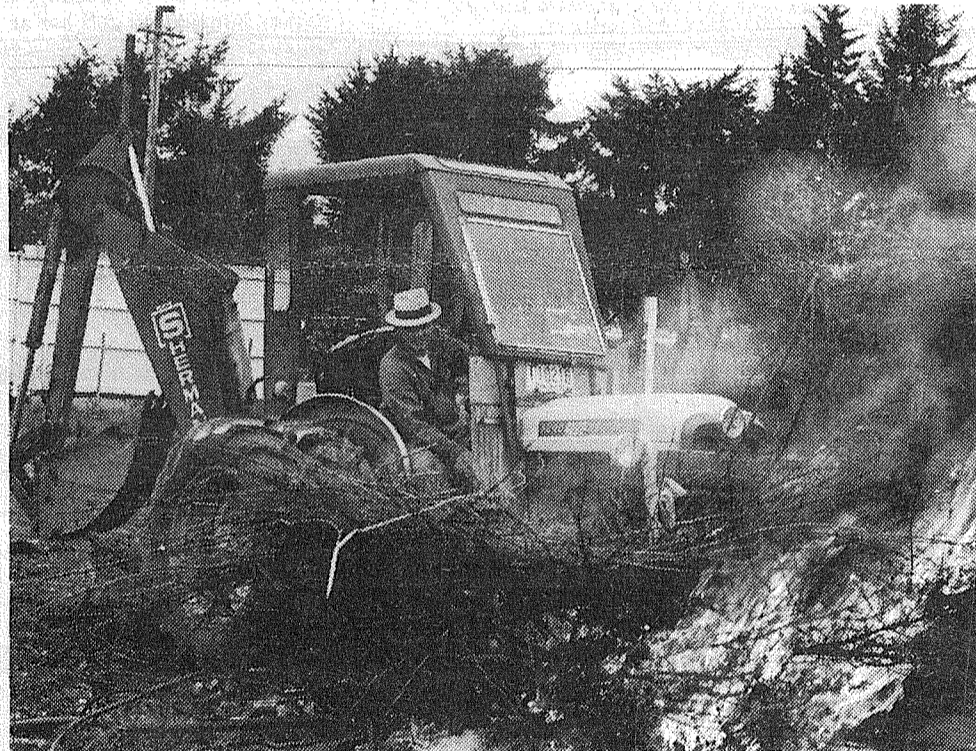

Reading Improvement Center To Be Offered At Franklin Pierce

A reading center for students who want to improve their reading ability will be offered in the Franklin Pierce summer school program.

Held in cooperation with Pacific Lutheran University, the center will involve more than 300 students in small classes of four to eight. Six master teachers and 20 graduate students from the university will work with the reading students to diagnose their problems and improve their reading ability.

Mrs. Elizabeth Sullivan, first grade teacher at Harvard Elementary School, will direct the over-all program, as well as teach a reading seminar in the afternoons for the graduate students cooperating in the program.

The graduate students, for the most part, will be teachers from surrounding elementary schools. The children enrolled in the program are expected to come from several local area school districts.

A similar reading program offered last year in the Franklin Pierce summer school drew more than 100 students from the district, Howard Motteler, summer school director, said. He said he expects the program to be even more popular this year because of the cooperation of Pacific Lutheran University and the reduced cost to the students.

Several elementary students in the Franklin Pierce schools are being recommended for enrollment in the center by their teachers. Application for enrollment may be made by calling the sum-

mer school office in the Franklin Pierce administration building.

Classes will be held Monday through Thursday in the morning, from June 19 thru July 20.

Many other improvement courses and special interest classes are also available in the summer school program for elementary and secondary students and adults, Motteler said.

Sewer District Approves Area To Be Annexed

The Commissioners of the South Suburban Sewer District approved petitions for the annexation of one more area at their meeting May 1.

The new annexation includes most of the territory between A and D Streets from 103rd Street to the Puyallup Freeway. Signatures were received representing a total of 67.4 per cent of the land ownership in the area. This is the sixth annexation petition that has been received.

Three other petitions are now being circulated to extend the boundaries of the sewer district in order to serve more people.

The Commissioners also authorized Harstad and Associates, consulting engineer for the district, to prepare applications for construction grants from the Housing and Urban Development Administration and the state Pollution and Control Commission.

The Commissioners received the resignation of Commander Anders Nelson, who is moving out of the state. Nelson has served as secretary to the Commission. Dr. Robert Mortvedt was elected secretary. The Commissioners will appoint a resident of the sewer district to fill the unexpired term of Nelson.

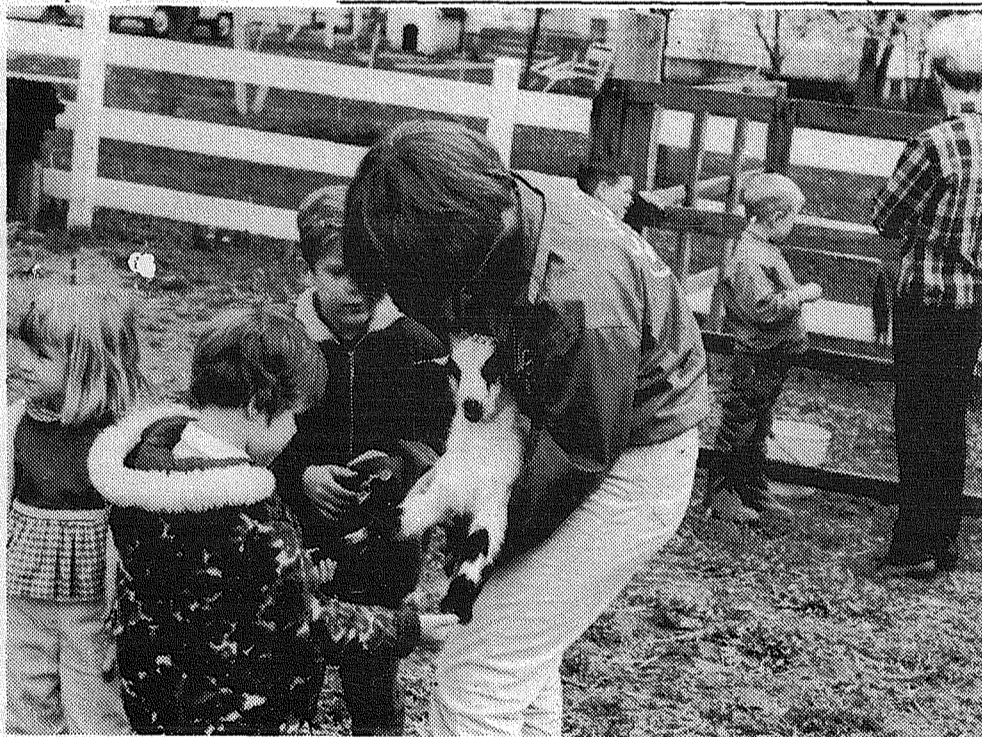

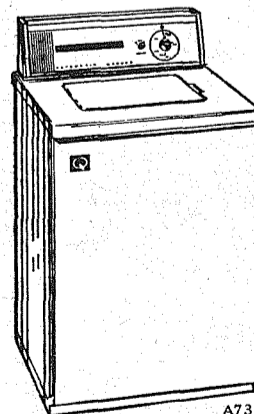

Heart Ball To Be Held At Tacoma Union Depot

A colorful Tacoma landmark, the Union Depot, will be alive with formals, orchestral music and mementos of a Victorian age May 26 for the Pierce County Heart Association's "heart ball".

Northern Pacific Railway Company has granted permission for use of the train station from 10 p.m. to 3 a.m. for the festivity.

The cost will be \$30 per couple and it's expected that between 800 and 900 persons will attend the formal gala.

Proceeds will be used to support the Heart Fund's local services and research program, according to Dr. James D. Lambing, president of the Association.

Virtually all of the depot's open spaces will be used, including the main entry area, balconies and concourse. Dancing, a turn-of-the-century floorshow, supper and special exhibits are planned for the charity event.

The decorations, nostalgic trappings of a bygone era, will be contrary to the depot's opening 56 years ago; ornamentation was not used in

1911, as the marble walls were considered "too grand to cover". Local architects, under the direction of A.L.A. president Alan Liddle, will arrange an overall revamping of the depot in a "Victorian" motif.

Dimmers will be used to subdue the mass lighting in the huge rotund ceiling, while a large array of flickering candles set in red bowls will accomplish a soft lighting effect on the main ballroom floor. Helium-filled balloons circulating in the dome area by means of a fan will add motion in an unexpected area, and, for the same general purpose, motion pictures of trains flashed on the side walls were suggested.

Another inside focal point will be a girl perched on a red velvet swing in front of the large balcony window facing Pacific Avenue. In addition to the inside remodeling, the exterior will be heavily spotlighted to emphasize the rococo style architecture. As guests promenaded down a specially laid carpet under the lighted marquee, they will hear their names announced, train fashion, over a loud-speaker.

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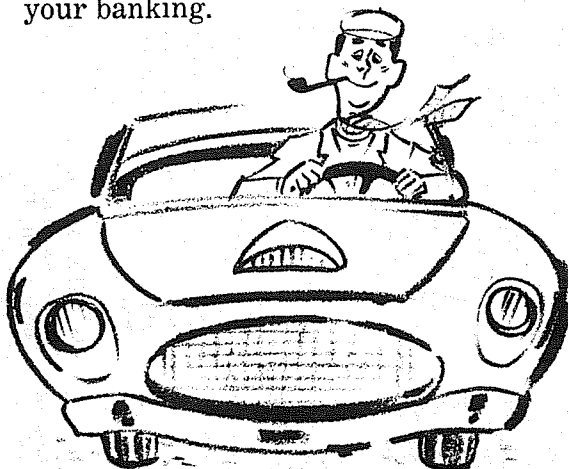
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Next Week Set For Mail Box Improvements

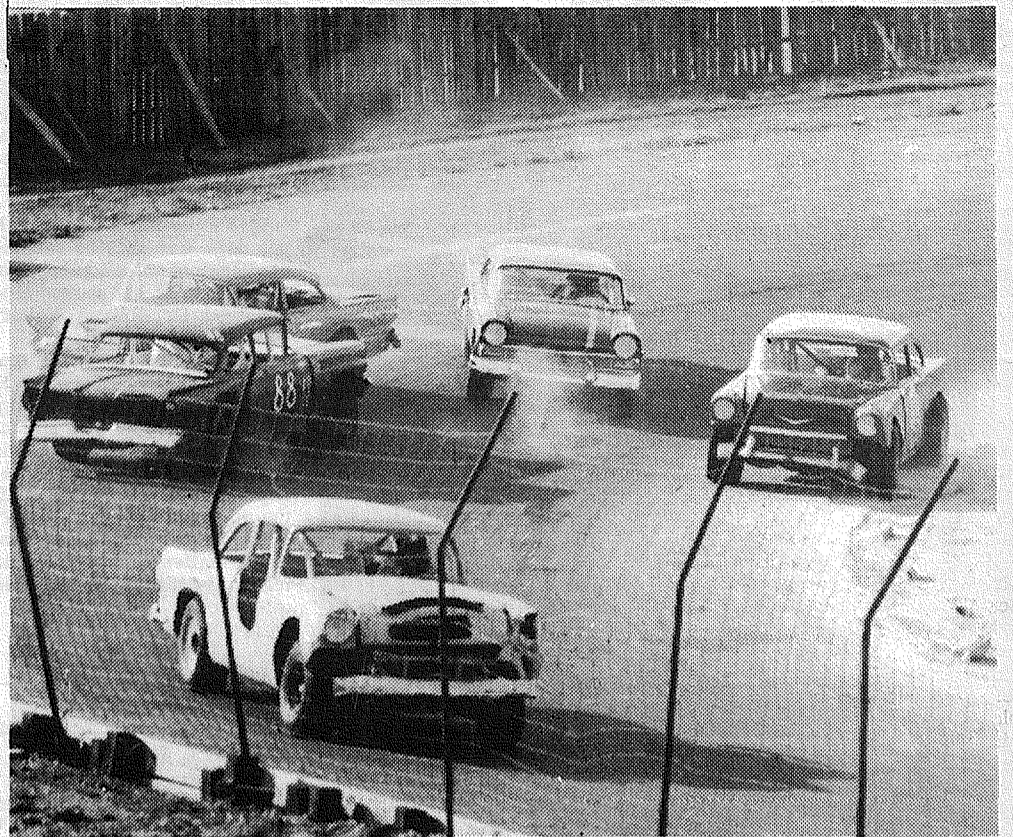

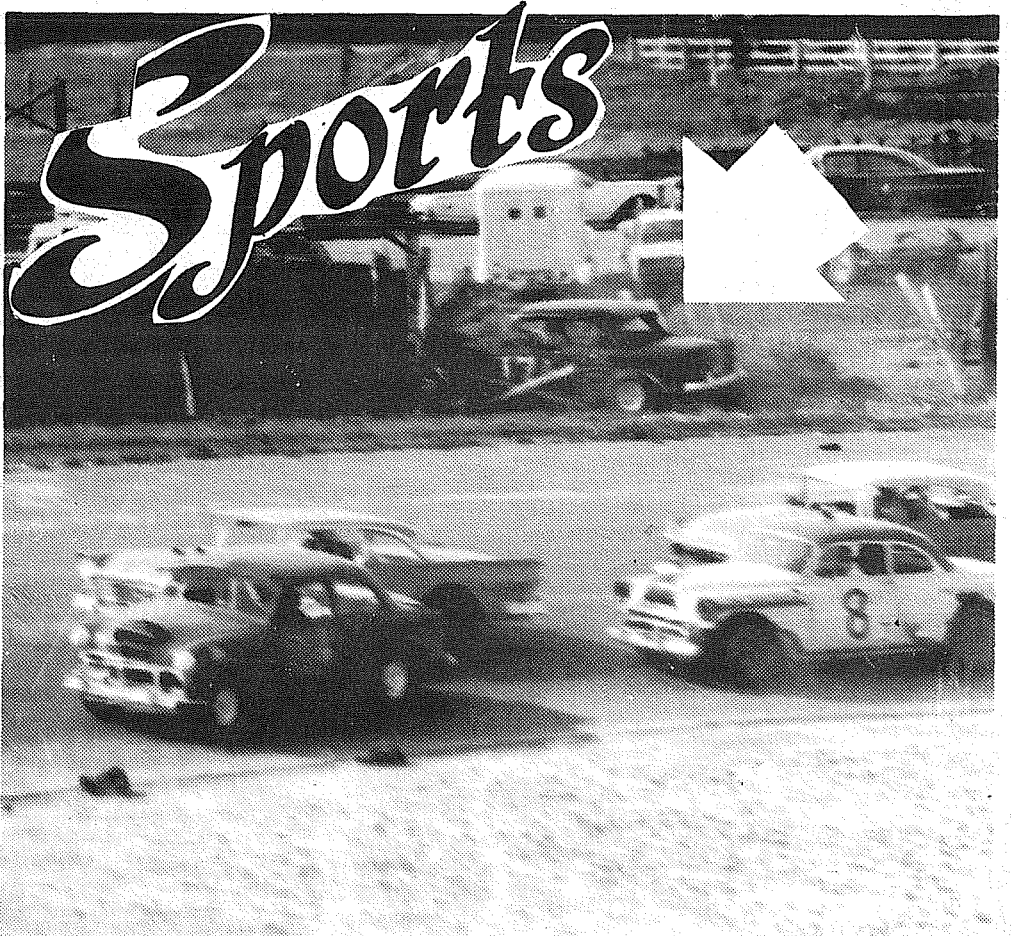
