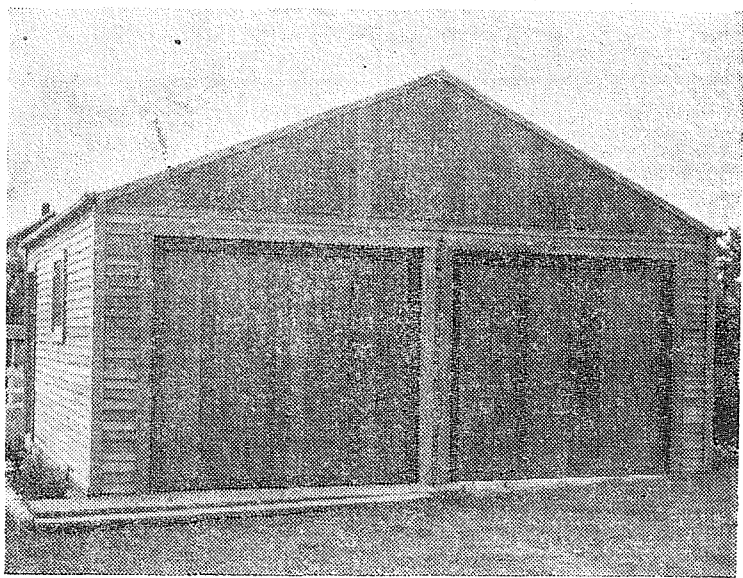

### Parkland National Guard Corps Open For Enlistments

The draft bill has passed and is now waiting for the President's signature. Men between the ages of 19 and 25, unless signed up in the National Guard or an organized active reserve corps, will be called to duty in the regular army for 21 months service.

"Many men in Parkland and vicinity, especially college students, have taken advantage of the opportunity to join the National Guard," according to Major M. M. Fletcher, commander of the National Guard unit now being formed in Parkland.

"All men between the ages of 19 and 25 are eligible to join the National Guard until the president signs the draft bill," Fletcher said. "However, men 17 and 18 years old may join the organization at any time."

"Many college students are finding that by joining the National Guard they can complete their college course," he said. "Each man attends only 48 drills a year and spends two weeks in summer camp."

Fletcher asked that all men interested contact him at GRANITE 8550 or at the Parkland Market Center as soon as possible for the quota for the 41st Signal Corps is being filled fast.

Transportation will be furnished for all personnel this week and from Fort Lewis where papers are being made out and physical exams given, he said.

### Postal Notes

FROM THE PARKLAND POST OFFICE . . .

**Women To Be Honored**  
The post office department will issue a stamp commemorating 100 years of progress of American women. 115,000,000 of these stamps in the 3-cent denomination will be printed and the first issue will be at the Seneca Falls, N. Y., post office on July 19, 1948.

The central design of the stamp is composed of portraits of Elizabeth Stanton, Carrie C. Catt and Lucretia Mott, under which will be the wording, "100 years of progress of women, 1848-1948."

This stamp will not be available locally until after the first of August.

### Pay Raise

Good news came to employees of the Parkland office when announcement was made that Congress had passed a pay raise bill for all postal employees. These workers have been in the low wage bracket ever since the war years, and while the \$450 a year boost is a big help it still does not bring the pay scale up to standard for this class of work.

### New Stamps Received

This office was able to get a small supply of the "Wisconsin" and "Four Chaplains" commemorative stamps last week. These are of the 3-cent denomination. Collectors should buy at once, so as not to lose out.

### Business Up

Revenues at the Parkland post office are showing a general upswing, with stamp sales for May being \$113.79 more than the month of April. Total sales for April were \$1,218.20 while in May they jumped to \$1,331.99. These amounts represent sales of postage stamps and stamped envelopes only. The volume of money orders issued is also on the increase, a comparison of quarterly figures shows. Up to June 7, which is approximately two months of the April-May-June quarter, \$34,710.35 in money order cash was handled. During the same period of the January-February-March quarter, the sum was \$32,290.59. This is an increase of \$2,419.76.

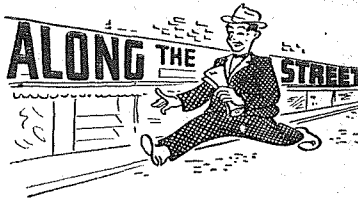
A triple celebration was held recently at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Nelson in Kirby.

## Volunteers Build Outstanding Fire Dept. in Past Four Years

Granite 8122 is an important telephone number for Parkland residents to remember. It's the way they can contact their volunteer firemen.

"Never hesitate about calling the firemen the minute any sort of a fire breaks out," warned Fire Commissioner Fred Danielson this week. "Many people feel apologetic when they call us and then have the fire out before we get there, but we'd sooner they called us right away than take a chance on the fire spreading."

Many of you may wonder just how the firemen get to the fire when the alarm is turned in. The phone number is, of course, a private line to the fire hall where two men are stationed each night.

An extension has been put at Beitz' Service Station for daytime alarms. When a call comes in, either the air whistle at the service station or the siren at the fire station is sounded. At the same time Mrs. Harry Beitz and Mrs. Fritz Beitz are phoned the location of the fire. They each have a list of firemen to call which they promptly do, giving only the location of the fire. The firemen catch the truck if they can, or go to the location given them, whichever is the fastest.

So that the district would still be protected in case another fire broke out, six men are listed each month to report to the fire hall. If both trucks are needed, one man is left at the fire hall.

The group was organized in the spring of 1944 by a group of 25 men with only 50 feet of garden hose. Civilian defense pump cans were soon added and after 4 or 5 months the group was able to obtain a surplus civilian defense truck and pumper.

A movement was then started to form a fire district. The biggest problem they faced was skepticism but after the men had saved

a few houses and after the college gymnasium had burned down, the men obtained their goal and now receive revenue to buy equipment and operate their trucks from a 4-mill tax levy. Since the fire district has been formed they have obtained a '47 Chevrolet truck with a 500 gallon pump and an Edwards 150 gallon pump for fighting brush fire. On one they have 800 feet of 2 1/2-inch hose, 600 feet of 1 1/2-inch hose, 150 feet of booster line hose and an Emerson rescuator. (Eight of the firemen took first aid classes to learn the use of the rescuator.)

The firemen have ordered a 145 horsepower Ford truck with duplicate equipment and an extra 100 feet of hose, which is expected to arrive any time. An addition to the fire hall will also soon be made, allowing them to move all living quarters upstairs and have the entire downstairs for equipment.

These volunteer firemen receive no pay for the service they give. They report every Monday at the fire hall for practicing fire fighting in addition to night duty every two weeks. Last year these men answered 115 calls.

Besides safeguarding your property this group performs another service for the community. Residents here can now get 33 percent to better than 50 percent rebate on their insurance policies since the organizing of the fire district.

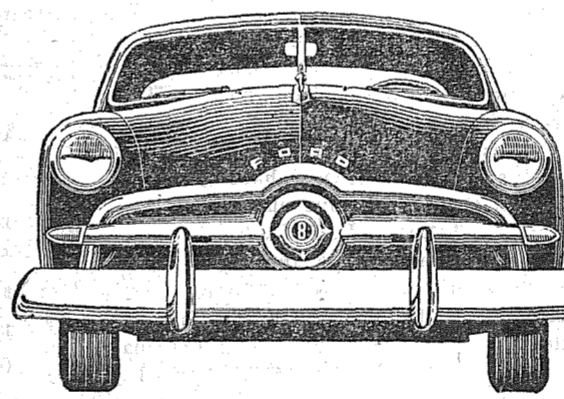
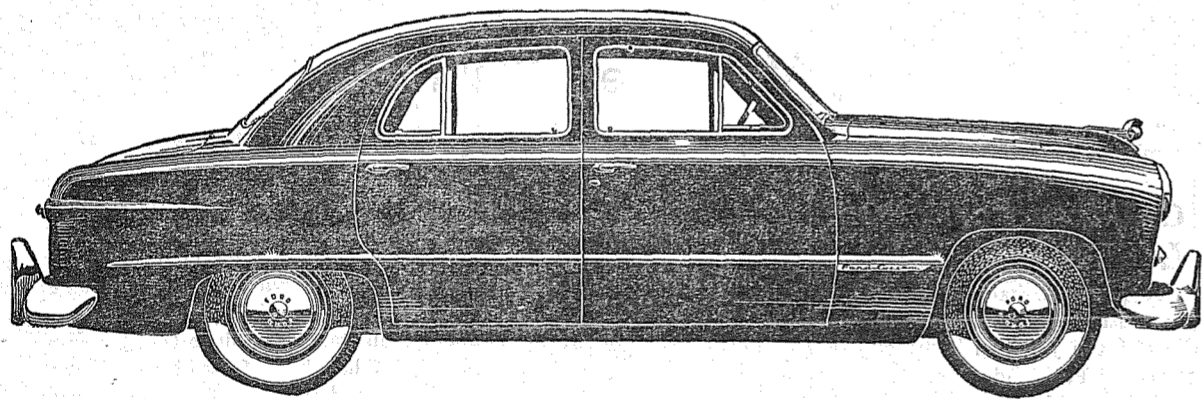
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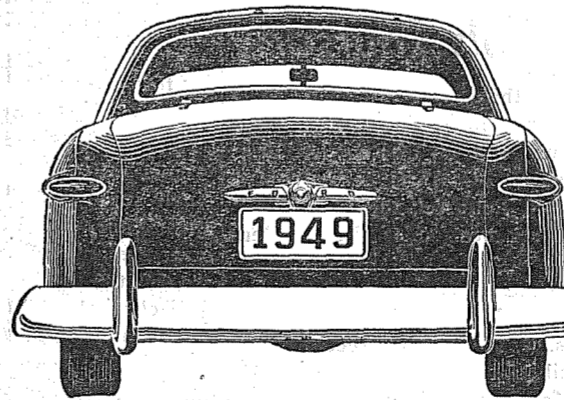

Bink's Hobby Shop Now Official AMA Licensing Station

Aviation's junior partner - The sport of building and flying model airplanes - was given new impetus here with the announcement from Washington, D. C., by the Academy of Model Aeronautics, governing body for model aviation in America, that an official branch licensing station has been established at Bink's Hobby Shop, Garfield street, Parkland.

Grant of the licensing franchise means that the new station will serve as local headquarters for the issuance of model aero flying licenses necessary for participation in officially sanctioned contests and record trials. In addition, late bulletins on contest announcements, interpretations and changes in regulations governing aeromodelling competitions and news of interest to all model aeronauts will be disseminated from A.M.A. headquarters through the new station.

Building and flying model airplanes has become America's fastest growing hobby. Nearly 5,000,000 enthusiasts each year design, build and operate miniature aircraft powered by various means - from rubber bands to real gasoline engines and true scaled down jet motors.

The Academy of Model Aeronautics was established in 1936 to supervise all model flying. It is the model representative in this country of the international sporting aviation body, the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

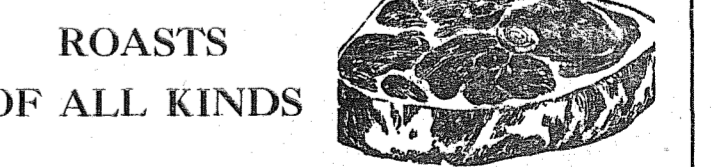
