Elect Seven To Confer **Bus Transit**

Parkland's transportation problem was laid in the lap of a seven-man committee elected at a joint session of the Parkland Business Club and the Parkland Community Club Tuesday night. The seven men, each representing a different civic organization, will draw up proposals to present to the Tacoma Transit Company.

Members of the committee are Don Eastvold, president of the Business Club; Jack Quill, postmaster and American Legion commander; Dr. Philip Hauge, dean of Pacific Lutheran College; Roy Kreger, president of the Community Club; Morris Ford, superintendent of the Franklin Pierce schools; Clay Roley, president of the Kiwanis; and Harry W. Smith, president of the Spanaway Progressive Community Club.

Naming of the committee was the climax of the session, which also included speeches by Neil Lee of Tacoma Transit, Gordon T. Jenkins of the state public service commission, S. C. Eastvold of PLC, Art Swindland of the National Bank of Washington, Kreger and Quill. One hundred persons listened attentively.

Dr. Eastvold pointed to the growth of the college and the whole community, and maintained that since many students and townspeople are dependent upon bus service, the 'area is worthy of more consideration by the bus company."

He declared that it was easier for the average commuter on Pacific Ave. to go 20 blocks toward Tacoma than five blocks toward Parkland.



Uncovering of a plot to annex the Parkland and Spanaway post offices into the Tacoma post office is resulting in a united surge of counter-action by civicminded residents of the two fast-growing communities.

Leader of the anti-annexation movement is Superinendent Morris Ford, who explains that the Tacoma P. O. wants to take over the Parkland P. O. because of its tremendously increasing revenue. Last year's receipts surpassed \$25,000, a three-fold increase in only a few years. Ford is chairman of the committee appointed by President Roy Kreger of the Parkland Community Club.

The salary of the Tacoma postmaster is based altogether on the total cash receipts during the year. The Tacoma P. O. grab might also be backed by the Tacoma Chamber of Commerce and other downtown interests who want to steal some of the South End's glory.

"If such a move were to be permitted, Parkland's and Spanaway's good postal service would immediately be curtailed," Ford claimed. 'Efficiency would be lost because the local stations would no longer cancel and case mail but would have to send it all downtown, resulting in a 24-hour delay."

This move comes at a time when South Enders are appealing for better, not worse, postal service. All hopes for house-to-house foot delivery or for the addition of 400 or 500 badly-needed rental boxes at Parkland would have to be abandoned.
