## 350 Enjoy Parkland's Third Annual Community Banquet

Parklanders are still raving about the success of last Thursday evening's banquet of the Parkland Community Club. Over 350 persons were served, making this the biggest "feed" in Community Club history.

Charles Bryant, aide of Governor Langlie, was the featured after-dinner speaker. His address touched everything from civilian defense and Abraham Lincoln to a warning against the threat of centralized government taking over the functions heretofore reserved for state and local governments.

Superintendent Morris Ford disclosed that a 15-mill tax proposal would be submitted to the voters in the Franklin Pierce School district in the forthcoming election for the erection of additional classrooms to meet the district's growing needs.

Ray Renwick, chairman of the club's library committee, told of the progress that had been made to give Parkland a first-class library. He pointed out that the property is available and announced that the architect will present a set of plans to members of the club at the March meeting. Incidentally, all profits from the banquet were added to the library building fund.

Co-chairmen of the dinner were Mrs. W. W. Cline and Mrs. Ernie Perrault. This week they sent the following dispatch to the editor of the Times:

"To the 18 organizations who assisted with the banquet, we wish to express our gratitude for their participation in the third annual banquet, and especially to the 17 chairmen and all of their committees, totalling 126 people.

"We would like also to thank the Parkland Business Club for its donation of \$10, and to Trinity Lutheran Church, Parkland Methodist Church and Pacific Lutheran College for the use of their tables, chairs and dishes. We appreciate so much everyone's willingness to co-operate."

After the banquet, everyone was invited to become a registered member of the Parkland Community Club, at the newly-established rate of one dollar per year per family. Secretary Virginia Ellington reports that 57 families signed the club roll.

Woody Cline turned the gavel over to Roy Kreger, who was officially installed by Dr. J. P. Pflueger. Kreger urged everyone present to take an active role in promoting community projects and reminded them that the next meeting of the club will be March 9.

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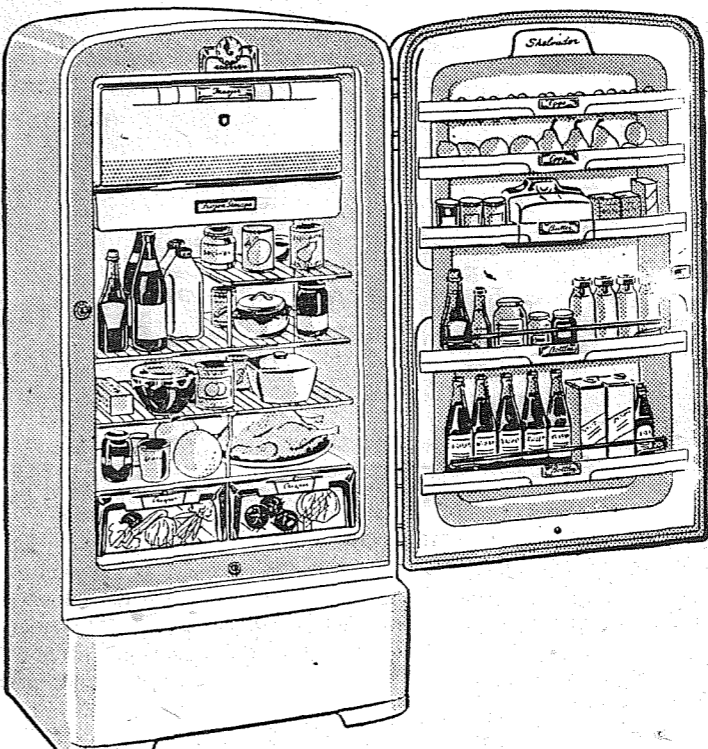
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### Elk Plain Teen Club Organized

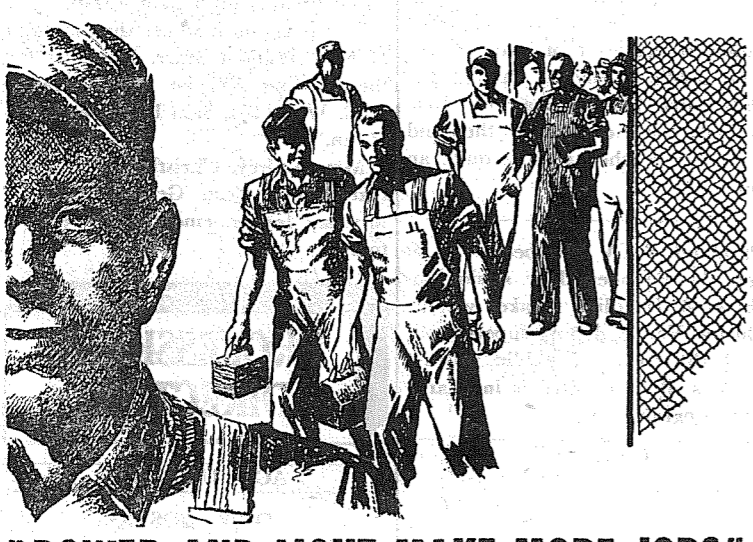


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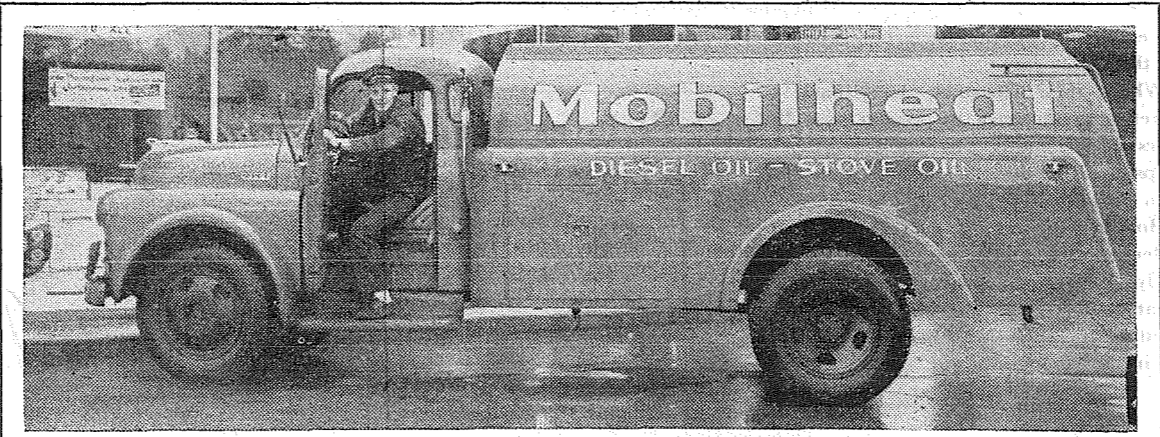
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## Span. P-TA Has Forum On Election Issues; New Couples Club Forming

## Western Store License Agent

In the last few years, Parkland has gotten its own community newspaper, its own bank, its own theater, its own modern shopping centers and its own beautiful residential additions—and now Parkland will have its own "courthouse."

County Auditor Jack Sonntag disclosed to the Times this week that the Parkland Western Store at Airport & Pacific had been designated as a permanent licensing agency.

The store is now equipped to handle the issuing of license plates for passenger cars, trucks and trailers, the re-issuing of certificates of title and registration and transferring of title as well as offering notary public service.

In announcing the appointment, Sonntag stated that he had long realized this area is entitled to the service of a full county-authorized licensing agency and therefore speeded steps to provide one here.

Parkland's Western Store opened in May, 1946, and is still under the efficient management of R. A. Ritter and Emil Beitz. They have handled auto licenses in previous years, but this is the first time that any establishments in the South End has been granted the year-around agency.

## Local Incident Heard On KVI

People who were listening to KVI at 9:15 Sunday night heard a graphic on-the-spot description of a drunken escapade that took place in Brookdale about a month ago.

The program was "Could This Be You?", a weekly 15-minute state patrol safety broadcast featuring tape-recorded interviews by Sgt. George Amans and traffic violators.

It was on a Friday evening early in January that a drunk soldier riding in a 2 1/2-ton Army truck with a buddy had decided to have a little "fun" as they headed east toward the Golden Slipper on 138th Street.

They swung the big vehicle over to the left side of the road and started clipping down every mailbox on that side of the road, sometimes striking three or four at a time. Aroused by all the commotion, residents called the state patrol, which immediately dispatched Sgt. Amans to the scene.

The cop had a hard time halting the soldier at first, and when he finally did, the soldier professed complete ignorance about why some 20 or 25 mailboxes were lying crushed and splintered in the ditch behind him. Nor could he explain why the front right wheel was wobbling or why he had a bloody nose.

After interviewing the doughboy, the patrolman rounded up some of the residents of 138th between Pacific Avenue and L Street to ask them what they witnessed of the incident. They testified that the truck went down the street twice, veering from one side to the other, almost tipping over on embankments.

Since that time, the tape recordings were edited to delete names and personal references and were presented on Sunday night's program.
