The American Legion was founded n Paris, France, March 15-17, 1919. It was granted a charter by the Congress of the United States on Sept. 16, 1919. The charter was amended in 1942 to make World War II veterans eligible for membership and again in December, 1950, to include Korean veterans. An honorably discharged veteran need not have served overseas to belong to the American

Commander Linder, while setting he opening date, also stated, "the four basic programs of the American Legion—rehabilitation, child welfare, national security and Americanismdeserve the active support of all former servicemen. Through the American Legion the veteran can best safeguard those ideals and institutions

for which he fought." The "GI Bill of Rights" was conceived and sponsored in Congress by the American Legion. As a result of this legislative achievement by the Legion, millions of World War II veterans received a college education, learned a trade, or took on-the-job training. Others secured loans to buy homes or start businesses. The American Legion is pledged to secure the same benefits for Korean veterans and other members of the armed forces subsequent to June, 1950.
