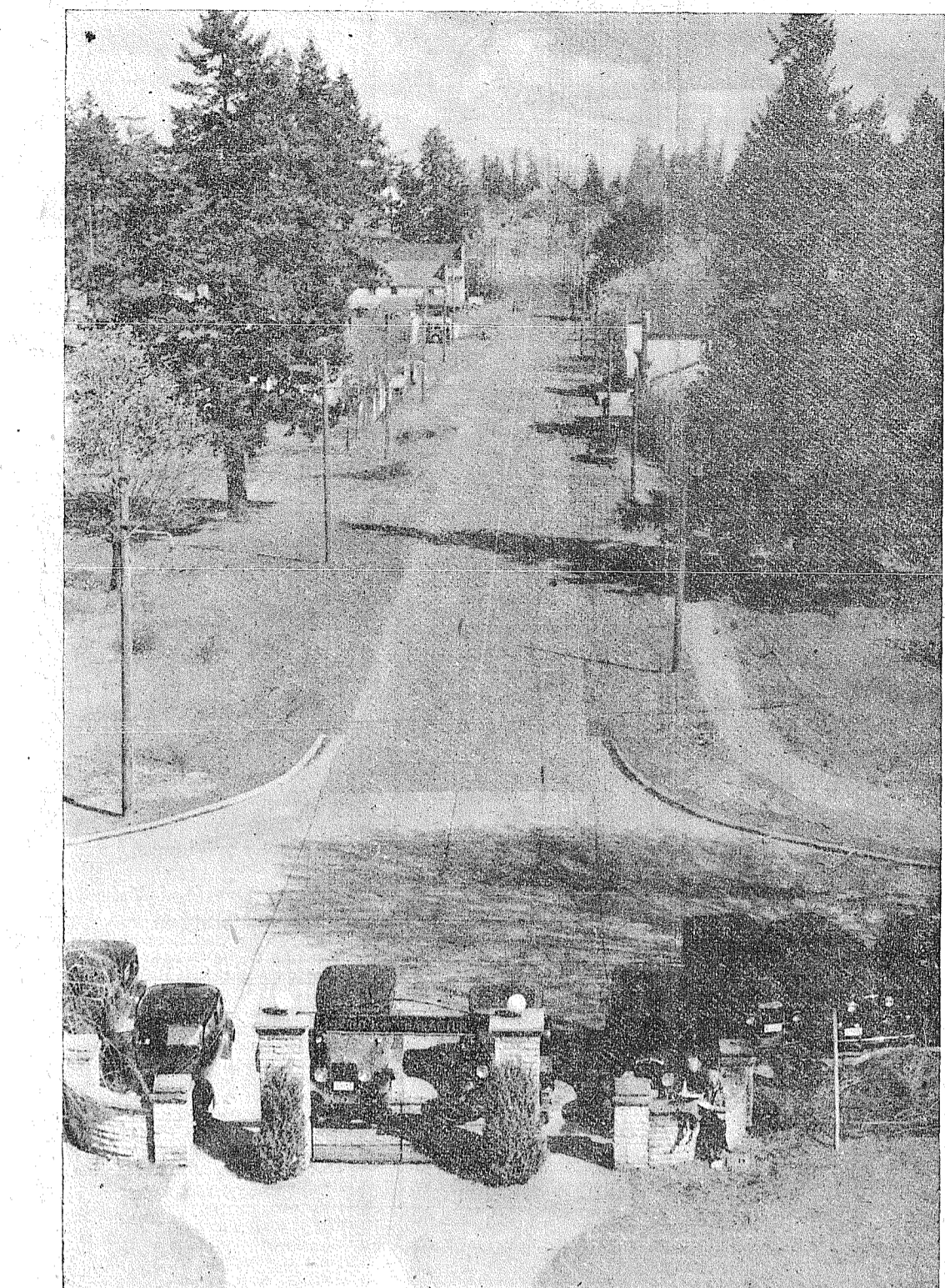

It's nice to be back in peaceful old Parkland after a rough trip on horseback over some 150 miles of very mountainous trails, evidently developed mostly by the elk with an occasional sign stuck on the trail by those guardians of the forest, the rangers. Oh sure, we had the time of our lives. My dad and brother and myself certainly took off a few pounds of fat from our horses as we put them over fallen timber, rough shale trails and steep climbs. We followed the Cascade crest trail quite a bit of the way but took a lot of side trips, where there wasn't much of a trail except as developed by the elk.

## Elk Aplenty

Elk are bountiful this year. Never before have we seen so many calves as this year. At the five thousand foot level they seem to be hanging out at present. The older cows and bulls like to get as high up as they can, staying till snow and hunters force them out in the fall. Coyotes are having feasts every night on some unfortunate young calf. We were awakened several times by the howl and yapping of coyotes on the prowl for their midnight snack of elk steaks ala rough.

One herd which we aroused from their afternoon siesta had 200 or more. Several smaller herds were seen. They seem quite tame. One night in the camp about twenty-five cow elk came right up to the meadow and went right about their business of eating. Only when we attempted to walk up to them did they alert themselves to the extent that they ran off into the timber. Come hunting season, I bet

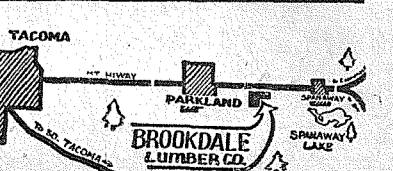

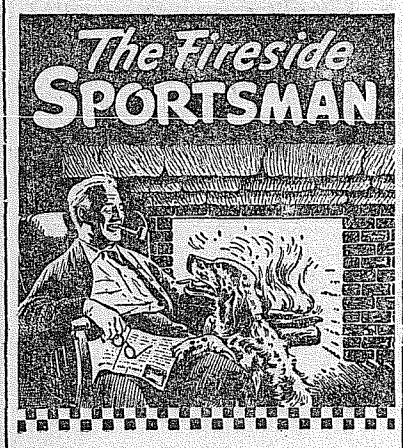

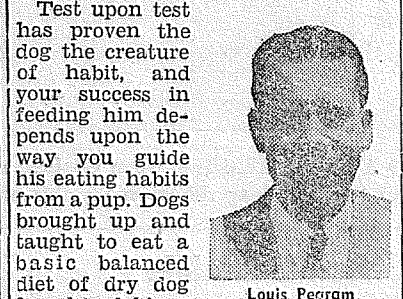

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**  
By Mary Lee Taylor  
**Tuna Creole**  
1/4 cup finely cut green pepper 1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons finely cut onion 1 1/2 cups tomatoes, cooked or canned  
2 tablespoons shortening 1/2 cup Pet Milk  
3 tablespoons flour 3 cups hot cooked rice  
Cook slowly 5 min. green pepper and onion in hot shortening. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Stir in tomatoes, milk and tuna. Cook and stir over low heat until thickened, but do not boil. Pack drained rice into shallow bowl. Turn out on warm platter; then press a hollow in center with back of spoon. Fill center with tuna mixture. Makes 4 servings.

**Don't Overfeed Your Dog**  
The most mistaken theory in the feeding of a dog is giving him only what he wants to eat. In their anxiety to do the right thing, most owners spoil their dogs, so that within a very short time it becomes a very difficult task to get your dog to do the very normal chore of cleaning his feed pan each night. At no time underestimate the ability of your four-legged friend in being able to sense your desire in getting him to eat, and he will play your patience no end in requesting only the things he likes the taste of best.  
Test upon test has proven the dog the creature of habit, and your success in feeding him depends upon the way you guide his eating habits from a pup. Dogs brought up and taught to eat a basic, balanced diet of dry dog food, adding table scraps, meat, etc., only when available or when the dog goes off diet, is assured of getting everything his body requires for normal health. If you try to alternate his diet from day to day, he will soon learn and demand of you only those things he likes, and not the balanced diet he needs to remain in top condition.  
Most owners, especially one dog owners, overfeed their dogs. It is always well to follow feeding instructions printed on the bag, and take food away from your dog if he does not clean his pan in 10 minutes.
